Rolan Ruoss' Draft Proposal #1

Proposal to amend 12 AAC 75.450 Transporter Contract Requirements to exempt Part 135 air taxis from the contract requirement.

### Proposed change:

Amend 12 AAC 75.450 Transporter Contract Requirements by adding the following:

(d) A transporter is exempt from the requirement to complete a contract if

1) the transporter is an on-demand Part 135 air taxi, and

2) the transporter does not charge more than the usual tariff or charter rate for transporting big game hunters, and

3) the transport to the field originates in a community where the transporter has a permanent business office (staffed at least 6 months per year), and

4) the transporter posts at the location where the transport originates a notice to the public that includes the following statement: "A big game transporter may provide transportation services only, and may not accompany or remain in the field with a big game hunter, or provide big game guide services in the field, or provide fuel, vehicles, or equipment to big game hunters in the field. It is the hunter's responsibility to salvage all meat and follow all hunting regulations."

Who is likely to benefit? The fixed-base on-demand air taxis who provide charter services to a variety of clients including big game hunters, for which services those air taxis do not and would not write contracts with clients as a normal business practice. A transporter that chooses to write contracts with its clients is free to do so, but will not be required to. Clients of transporters who charge more than the usual tariff or charter rate for the transport of big game hunters will still be protected by the contract requirement of 12 AAC 75.450, as amended.

Who is likely to suffer? No one. Supporters of the current contract requirement explain that written contracts protect clients against failure to provide agreed services by itinerant "gypsy" air taxis who operate temporarily out of bush communities. Itinerant air taxis who do not operate from a fixed base will still be required to write contracts. Established fixed-base on-demand air taxis are not creating the problem that the current regulation is intended to address.

What will happen if nothing is done? Fixed-base on-demand air taxis and their charter clients will continue to be unnecessarily burdened by a regulation that provides little practical benefit.

Discussion: The current regulation requires a transporter to deliver a written contract to the client within 90 days of receiving a deposit or as soon as possible before transporting. The contract must include: names, signatures type of game, price, weight limits, refund policy, communication method while in the field, a statement that the services are transportation only and that the Transporter may

not provide guiding services or equipment in the field, and a statement that the client is responsible for salvage of meat. Transporter must keep contract copies for 4 years.

Fixed base Part 135 air taxis have transported hunters for decades without written contracts, a successful business practice with very few complaints. The transporter contract requirement of AAC 75.450 is widely ignored and not enforced because it is impractical and unecessary - a clear example of a solution for a problem that doesn't exist. If there is a problem that this regulation is intended to address, it is not being caused by fixed base operators. Fixed base air taxis are visible established businesses who are are motivated to provide quality service in order to maintain a positive reputation or risk losing future customers. They are mostly small to medium sized operations that don't have the staff or time to generate more needless paperwork. If there is a proven service advantage in written contracts, the most successful operators in the industry will adopt them. If and when contracts become a standard in the industry, then it would be appropriate for regulation to require them.

Rolan Rouss Draft Proposal #2

Proposal to amend 12 AAC .02.230. Big Game Commercial Services Board, to reduce the transporter activity report filing fee from \$50 to \$5.

Amend 12 AAC .02.230 Big Game Commercial Services Board, as follows:

- (c) The following fees are established for big game transporters:
  - (4) Transporter activity report filing fee, \$5.

Who is likely to benefit? Transporters who comply with the regulation and participate in reporting big game transporting activity will not be subject to unreasonably high fees to pay the cost of the guide license program. The BGCSB program will retain and attract Part 135 air taxis as licensed transporters.

Who is likely to suffer? Guides who will be assessed higher fees to pay their full share of administering their licenses. Division of Licensing employees who will have to take the heat from dissatisfied guides.

What will happen if nothing is done? Transporters will continue to be unfairly charged to subsidize the guide licensing program. Some Part 135 air taxis who currently hold transporter licenses will elect to leave the BGCSB licensing program by utilizing the air taxi exemption, resulting in reduced BGCSB revenue.

Discussion: The Division of Licensing failed to provide sufficient public notice of this new fee that was enacted Nov. 20, 2016. On Aug 25, 2015, Division director Janey Hovenden mailed a letter of notice to licensees announcing the Division's proposal to increase Big Game Commercial Sevices licenese fees. Her letter stated "A breakdown of the proposed fees is enclosed and located on the Board's web page at professionallicense.alaska.gov/BigGameCommercialServicesBoard", and "contact information (for public comment) is enclosed on the public notice." The referenced "breakdown of proposed fees" and "contact information" for public comment was not included with the letter, and the referenced web page did not (and still does not) have any information about the proposed fee increase or instructions for public comment to the proposal. Licensees received this notice in the middle of their busy season and apparently everyone, including Div. of Licensing staff, overlooked the omission in the Aug. 25 notice because there was no follow-up communication from the Division to licensees regarding the missing information and it is only just now (Feb & March 2016) becoming apparent that there was a failure in the public notice process.

Beyond the issue of failure to provide required public notice, there is a stuctural error in the filing fee that would have been identified if there was a thorough public process prior to implementation. There is good reason to set the Transporter Activity Report fee to a lower rate than the Hunt Report fee. Due to significant differences in business models between guides and transporters, applying the same \$50 dollar filing fee to HRs and to TARs delivers a very uneven result. For example: a guide operation that grosses \$400,000 guiding 30 hunts will file 30 Hunt Reports and pay \$1500 in filing fees, whereas a

transporter that grosses \$400,000 transporting 180 groups of hunters will file 180 Transporter Activity Reports and pay \$9000 in filing fees. There is no reasonable justification for such an unbalanced fee structure.

In an attempt to justify the high fees resulting from the \$50 TAR filing fee, some guides state that a transporter using the state's game resources should pay their "fair share" of managing the resource. The fact is, these license fees are not spent on resource management, the entire BGCSB budget is spent administering guide and transporter licenses, and over 90% of that expense is the administration and enforcement of guide licenses.

BGCSB member Dave Jones has recently done an informal budget analysis using materials provided by the Division at the March 2016 board meeting. His analysis shows that transporter license fees already generate revenue in excess of the administrative cost of transporter licensing and record keeping, even without additional revenue from the new TAR filing fee. At its March meeting the board discussed measures intended to increase transporter license purchases by operators not currently in compliance, which, if successful, will increase the gross revenue and the budget surplus attributable to transporters.

Div. of Licensing staff have made it clear that addressing the budget deficit requires a fee increase. BGCSB board members have stated numerous times that they want everyone to pay their fair share. Transporter license fees are already paying more than their share of the BGCSB operating budget. Transporters accept the increase in license fees as a reasonable part of retiring the budget deficit, but the addition of the \$50 TAR filing fee is excessive and unjustified.

Division of Licensing Director Janey Hovenden stated in a Feb. 22, 2016 email: "The Board and the Division, in partnership, have taken the unpopular and difficult steps to increase licensing fees and implement new fees that would be borne by those licensees who enter into contracts and who create the administrative expenses of the program. This protects the non-contracting licensees from having to pay for maintenance of hunt records and transporter activity fees". Her statement clearly acknowledges the responsibility of those who create an expense to pay for it, and an obligation on the Division to fairly distribute the burden. Ms. Hovenden's desire to protect some classes of the licensees from expenses created by others is appropriate and welcome.

BGCSB chairman Kelly Vrem is on the record stating that the cost of enforcing the guide regulations is the cause of the accumulated deficit. Dave Jones' informal analysis of the budget confirms that the revenue from transporter licenses is greater than the cost of administering them and that excess transporter revenue is already contributing to retiring the deficit. Applying Ms Hovenden's fairness philosophy stated above, the BGCSB should be collecting at least 90% of its operating budget through fees on guides, and the Division should enact policy that ensures that result. Perhaps the Division will examine the BGCSB budget to refine Mr. Jones findings. If the Division confirms Mr. Jones' analysis, then transporters deserve protection from guide-created expenses responsible for the BGCSB deficit. A fair and simple way to accomplish this is to reduce or rescind the \$50 TAR filing fee. Rolan Rouss Draft Proposal #3

Proposal to amend to 12 AAC 75.400. Transporter Activity Report, to simplify the transporter activity report process.

Amend 12 AAC 75.400 Transporter Activity Report, as follows:

(a) Each transporter activity report required by AS 08,54.650 must be on a form provided by the department, titled Transporter Activity Summary Report, dated \_\_\_\_\_\_ 2016, and adopted by reference. This form is established by the board for review of the information required by AS 08,54.650.
(b) On the day a client is transported, a transporter shall collect the names and hunting license numbers of each member of each party, and the date and location of the transport activity, and enter that information on a summary form ( ref: transporter activity annual summary report form \_\_\_\_\_ 2016) provided by the department.

(c) Immediately after transporting the client out of the field, the transporter shall complete the applicable remaining portions of the transporter activity report (the date and location).

(d) For the purposes of this report, "a party" is defined as one or more big game hunters traveling together to the same destination. A transporter is not required to report parties transported to/from a camp operated by a big game guide, or parties transported to/from another big game transporter, or parties transported to/from a private property or vessel owned by a member of the party.

(e) The transporter shall retain the transporter activity annual summary report form at the transporter's main business premises and make it available for inspection upon request by an agent of the board or department or any state or federal enforcement agent authorized to enforce guiding, game, or game management statutes or regulations.

(f) The transporter shall file the transporter activity summary report form annually with the department before Jan. 31 of the year following the transport activity.

In adopting this amendment to AAC 75.400 the board will create a new simplified transporter activity report form ("the form titled Transporter Activity Summary Report, dated \_\_\_\_\_\_ 2016") that will be a summary of all big game hunting parties transported by a transporter in each calendar year. This amendment eliminates the current policy of completing and filing an individual form for each hunting party. It will not require number of animals harvested or estimated weight of meat to be reported.

This new report form will only be required to be filed annually.

The department may develop an online filing form to further simplify the filing process, improve data entry efficiency, and reduce cost.

Who is likely to benefit?

1) Transporters, by reducing unnecessary paperwork.

2) Div. of Licensing staff and the State of Alaska, by reducing unnecessary and redundant paperwork and the associated cost.

3) The BGCSB by more efficient and comprehensive data collection.

Who is likely to suffer? No one. The data that the BGCSB wants to collect will still be collected. Enforcement personel will still have immediate access to the information they need for their tasks. Big game harvest data is already being collected by ADF&G and is available to other State agencies.

What will happen if nothing is done? The Div. of Licensing will continue to require, and transporters will continue to complete, unnecessary paperwork and pay unjustifiably high filing fees.

The existing supporting statute is:

AS 08.54.650. Transporter License.

(2)(c) A transporter shall provide an annual activity report on a form provided by the department. An activity report must contain all information required by the board by regulation.

Discussion: Instead of increasing fees across the BGCSB system, the Division ought to be looking for opportunities for cost reduction. Transporter Activity Reports should be evaluated for effectiveness and modified or streamlined to reduce expense. TARs are collecting some resource information from hunters that is already being collected by ADF&G on harvest tags and hunter surveys, and the ADF&G information is available in a searchable database. Coordination and data sharing between Div. of Licensing, AK State Troopers, and ADF&G will save the Division and transporters time and money.

Although some board members state that the TAR information is necessary for "resource management", in fact, its main use is for enforcement actions. To have value as an enforcement reference, the TAR (which currently is a sworn statement by the transporter) should only include information that is verifiable by the transporter (name, address and hunting license copied from client's license, dates and location of transport services), not number of animals harvested and estimated weight of meat.

Filling out and filing a TAR for each party is an expensive and time consuming burden for transporters. The real-world value of transporter report data is for occasional use by enforcement personel. If the BGCSB wants accurate and comprehensive information on hunting activity and insists on making transporters collect it, then they ought to concentrate on making the task less burdensome by developing a simplified report that does not collect what ADF&G is already collecting, and consider making it an online form so the data entry task is done when it is filed.

The new \$50 transporter activity report filing fee is guaranteed to result in fewer reports being filed by transporters. Transporters who are currently reporting all their big game transports will reduce their participation in the TAR reporting system, or drop their transporter license by exercising the air taxi exemption, simply to avoid the abusive cost.

Dear members of the Big Game Commercial Services Board:

On April 17, 2016, the Alaska State Legislature adopted SB 254 reauthorizing the Big Game Commercial Services Board. The text of the bill reads as follows:

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

Section 1. AS 08.03.010(c)(9) is amended to read:

(9) Big Game Commercial Services Board (AS 08.54.591) - June 30, **2019** [2016]; **\* Sec. 2.** The uncodified law of the State of Alaska is amended by adding a new section to

read:

REPORT. The Big Game Commercial Services Board shall submit to the legislature a written report that outlines in detail the board's plan to be financially solvent by December 31, 2019. The board shall submit the report required under this section not later than October 31, 2016. The board shall deliver the report to the senate secretary and the chief clerk of the house of representatives and notify the legislature that the report is available.

\* Sec. 3. This Act takes effect immediately under AS 01.10.070(c).

While the bill has not yet been transmitted to the governor, we expect it to be signed within the next month. The timeframe of this board extension will require aggressive action by both the board and division. To be solvent by the time the legislature considers the board's next reauthorization bill in 2019, the program must collect enough revenue by December 31, 2018, to erase the deficit and cover expenses through the renewal of licenses in 2020.

At its June 15 meeting, the board will need to discuss this reporting requirement and make plans to deliver a completed report to the division no later than October 1, 2016. This will allow time for the division to assist the board with any editing and formatting, after which the report will require review by the offices of the commissioner and governor before transmittal to the legislature. The board may need to hold additional teleconferences or assign a member to lead the drafting process since many members will be actively guiding or transporting during these months.

The division advises the board to make a strong recommendation regarding overall fee structure at the June 15 meeting. While the topic has been placed on the agenda by the transporter subcommittee, the timeliness of the legislature's requirement reinforces the need for action.
