2023 Work Plan

- ➤ Grade the upper road STA 169+00 to STA 193+50 (2,450-feet), constructed in October 2022.
- ➤ Place E-1 gravel on all house pads constructed in September 2022.
- Alaska Line Builders will install the remaining power poles on the upper road and connect homes as they are completed.
- Alaska Line Builders to install power poles to the new well, the future location of the tank farm, and the future location of the equipment shop.
- Complete the Domestic Violence Shelter. Work includes interior painting, flooring, kitchen cabinets, interior doors, deck, front steps, and interior flooring. This unit has been connected to the power grid.
- Complete the six 4-bedroom homes. Work includes electrical and interior framing, interior walls and insulation, interior painting, flooring, kitchen cabinets, interior doors, deck, front steps, and interior flooring. Work will start after the materials barge arrives.
- Construct 1,200-feet of road from STA 157+00 to STA 169+00. Rock has been purchased and is stored up at the Brice Pit.
- Possible construction of "D" Street (675-feet). Pending Approval.
- Crag Taylor Equipment Mechanic to repair Rock Truck #2.
- Crag Taylor Equipment Mechanic to repair Loader #2.
- ➤ Replace hydraulic line on the Dozer. This ruptured in March during snow removal.
- Purchase oil, gear oil, hydraulic oil, and filters for all the equipment. This will be shipped on the spring barge.

Known issues being worked.

- Install replacement Indirect Hot Water Heater in the Old Man Camp Bathroom.
- Install replacement push button for the watering point.
- Add an eve venting system to prevent blowing snow from getting into the attic of homes. The venting system was shipped to Mertarvik in December 2022.
- Check all foundation footers and level homes as needed. This task has been done yearly since 2021 on all homes east of the MEC.
- Door Replacement.

2022 and 2023 purchased.

- A new Ram 2500 was purchased in 2022 and delivered in August. This truck is for sanitation only. Three people are insured to drive it.
- ➤ A new V619 Bobcat Telehandler with snowblower attachment will be arriving on the Spring Barge.

- Fairly allocate so everyone has house

- Get agency support for more funding

Can't agencies pay for the houses?

- Agencies have paid some....
 - Some of Denali Commission grant
 - FEMA Hazard Mitigation grants
 - BIA Housing Improvement Program
 - HUD Programs
 - CARES Act Isolation units
- But they won't pay all
- Many grants require "matches"

How policies made?

- Council assigned score to every house in Newtok in July 2018
- Council drafted policies in Anchorage in spring 2019
- Committee with state and federal agencies reviewed and supported


Higher priority







The Denali Commission prepared an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to evaluate the potential environmental impacts associated with proposed infrastructure development in Mertarvik, Alaska. In March 2018, the Denali Commission published the Final EIS. The Record of Decision was signed on April 19, 2018.

TRIBAL UTILITY SUPPORT (TUS)	 ACTIVE In 2022, we redid all the electrical and indoor plumbing and installed the clothes dryers in the Washeteria. In 2023, all that's left is to install the wastewater sumps under the building and connect them to the lagoon discharge line. Staff is trying to get out there to complete that work as soon as the snow melts.
