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Location

The Yukon-Kuskokwim region includes the greater Yukon-Kuskokwim Delta region including Nunivak Island. The Yukon-Kuskokwim Region includes 8,933 miles of coast, and a coastal zone of 15,364 square miles. Forty communities are located in the Yukon-Kuskokwim Region: Akiachak, Akiak, Alakanuk, Aniak, Atmautluak, Cheforak, Chevak, Eek, Emmonak, Goodnews Bay, Hooper Bay, Kasigluk, Kipnuk, Koliganek, Kongiganak, Kotlik, Kwethluk, Kwigillingok, Lower Kalskag, Marshall, Mekoryuk, Mountain Village, Napakiak, Napaskiak, Newtok, Nightmute, Nunam Iqua, Nunapitchuk, Oscarville, Pilot Station, Pitka's Point, Platinum, Quinhagak, Russian Mission, Scammon Bay, St. Mary's, Toksook Bay, Tuluksak, Tuntutuliak, and Tununak.

The Yukon-Kuskokwim Region (see map, below) covers approximately 48,000 square miles of which roughly 36,000 square miles are in the coastal zone. The Coastal Zone includes only the land and water below an elevation of 200 feet. Exceptions to this rule are isolated highlands, such as the Askinuk Mountains at Scammon Bay, the Kaluyut Mountains that cover most of Nelson Island, and the Kusilvak Mountains located on a line between Scammon Bay and Mountain Village. Several Isolated peaks—Nushkolik, Ingrisarak, Ingrisvak and Ungulungwak—are also included.

- The PD will conduct annual Project Coordinator evaluations
- The PD will conduct annual project evaluations
- The PD will conduct annual equipment inventories
- The PD will annually evaluate Advisory Partnership Committee strengths/weaknesses
- The PD will conduct project close out tasks
