

MESSAGE FROM THE CEO

Dear Colleagues,

November was a busy month for our volunteers as committees, task forces, and collaboratives bore down on presidential charges ahead of the December Committee Summit and in anticipation of the Board's first look at draft resolutions in January. Even without these obligations, other volunteer groups continued to provide reviews for architects seeking certification through alternative paths, adjudication of disciplinary cases impacting Record-holder status, future visioning and policy recommendations to be forwarded to our Board, materials to augment the Health, Safety, and Welfare (HSW) qualified Continuing Education pipeline, and ongoing development of examination items for future exam use and to inform the business continuity exam.

As we enter into a season of thankfulness, reflection, and commemoration, we are extremely grateful for the focus of our volunteers ranging from those involved with committee charges to those appointed to jurisdictional boards and elected to regional and national leadership. We add to the mix our greater licensing advisor community composed of education advisors at National Architectural Accrediting Board (NAAB) accredited programs, state and auxiliary firm advisors provided through the auspices of the American Institute of Architects (AIA) state component community, student advisors provided through American Institute of Architecture Students (AIAS) chapters, and our own Member Board Executives wearing their advisory hats.

A manifestation of volunteer initiative, focus, and support has been our monthslong, accelerated development of an online option for the Architect Registration Examination® (ARE®). For a number of years, our Examination Committee had been researching and organizing around the eventuality of an online option. As the pandemic closed test centers in the spring, our candidate community clamored for an online option to assure minimal delays in pursuing licensure. This summer, our Board challenged our volunteers, consultants, and staff support teams to move at a quicker pace, framing this effort as our "moon shot" opportunity. Our committees and subcommittees went to work, partnering with our psychometric consultants to repackage existing ARE 5.0 content into a workable format that would ensure deliveryagnostic, consistent rigor, as well as add some new flexibility and delivery improvements.

Thanks to the resilience of over 100 volunteers from around the United States, we are now delivering an online option that comes as the pandemic is once again impacting test centers. Their confidence has assured acceptance by our Member Boards. Their willingness to persevere in light of misinformation and intense scrutiny is laudable. We are in the vanguard of licensing exam developers regarding the online option, along with our colleagues in landscape architecture and a handful of other disciplines, who are all adopting similar approaches to assure rigor and security.

Other parallel efforts involving volunteers are exploiting a new emphasis on virtual engagement, including a joint initiative with the Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture (ACSA) to curate and develop online professional practice curricula under the ProPEL (Professional Practice Education Library) moniker. Our partnership with



ADMINISTRATION

- Preparing for the closeout of our old office property at 1801 K Street. The lease formally ends on December 31, 2020.
- With the Regional Leadership Committee's decision to host a virtual Regional Summit, events have been canceled in Charlotte, North Carolina, for March 2021. This site has been rebooked to host the event in March 2022.
- Completed open enrollment for the selection and renewal of employee benefits.
- Implementing a new travel tool, Travel Perk. This system will allow volunteers to book flights online to improve the customer experience.

COUNCIL RELATIONS

- Hosted a webinar to share the latest updates regarding online proctoring of the ARE. The webinar covered security measures, candidate experience, and timeline for implementation. A recording of the webinar is available to Member Board Members and Executives and can be found on the Member Board Community.
- Hosted two "Council Hours"—virtual check-ins for Member Board Executives that provided an additional opportunity to discuss the role of the Professional Conduct Committee and the status of online proctoring, as well as recent updates on individual licensing board operations. Recordings are available to Member Board Members and Executives and can be found on the Member Board Community.
- Collaborated with the Professional Conduct and Member Board Executives committees to issue a survey to inform the committees' charges to develop a recommended definition of discipline and what defines administrative versus more serious infractions. The survey is available to Member Board Members on the online community until February 15.
- Collaborated with Council committees to develop the programming for the 2020 virtual Committee Summit.






NCARB staff host an NCARB Live webinar for candidates regarding the new demo exam and upcoming launch of online proctoring.

CUSTOMER RELATIONS

- Collaborated with the Examination Department and exam vendors in preparation for the launch of the online proctoring option in December. Shared insights from the customer and administrative views regarding ongoing support to be provided in this next phase of NCARB service.
- Provided support to the MBE Committee planning for the annual Quality Assurance Audit.

EXAMINATION

- Released the new demo exam to candidates on Thursday, November 12. The demo exam is a three-hour practice exam designed to give candidates exposure to all six divisions of the ARE, with new tools and features, including a digital whiteboard and new functionality for breaks. The new tools and features will launch in mid-December.
- Completed all user testing events for the online proctored delivery of the ARE in advance of the online proctoring option going live Monday, December 14.
- Examination Committee reviewed the progress of the online proctoring launch and established plans to address completing cut score recommendations to the Board of Directors as soon as possible after the launch.
- Item Development Subcommittee continued to review and finalize newly authored items.
- Forms Assembly Subcommittees finalized examination forms that will go live with the online proctoring option launch.
- Business Continuity Work Groups continued their efforts to author the final remaining items necessary for secure storage of one form for each division of the ARE.



NCARB's Education Committee met virtually to focus on each of its four charges.

EXPERIENCE + EDUCATION

- Program Continuum Advisory Collaborative held discussions related to their charge on fairness in licensure.
- Education Committee worked in four small groups focusing on each of the four charges related to critical and creative thinking about current and future components of architectural education.
- Ethics Case Study Work Group completed drafts of ethics-focused continuing education courses and conducted peer review.
- The Think/Re-Think Tank Alumni met for the first time and had discussions on the effects of the pandemic and provided feedback on updates to the ARE and online proctoring.
- Deployed updated continuing education platform with the ability to offer more interactive courses.
- Launched the Architectural Experience Program® (AXP®) Portfolio training course as part of the Continuum Education Program. AXP Portfolio supervisors are now required to complete this course prior to reviewing and approving their candidate's portfolio to document completion of the AXP.

- Certification Alternatives Review Team (CART) participated in a training focused on the new 2020 NCARB Education Standard. The NCARB Education Standard defines the subject areas architects must address when building an NCARB Certificate Portfolio to obtain NCARB certification under the Education Alternatives for Certification.
- CART completed their review of and proposed modifications to the lists of credible exhibits an architect may include in a NCARB Certificate Portfolio demonstrating their evidence of learning in relation to the subject areas of the *Education Standard*.
- Interiors Task Force reviewed Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP) Codes definitions for architecture, interior architecture, and interior design. Discussions included the importance of the current ambiguity in the language of these CIP Codes as they are used to define academic education programs.
- Released two new Continuum Education courses:
 - Historic Preservation Part III: How to Plan, Design, & Construct the Preservation Project (1.75 HSW LU)
 - AXP Portfolio Supervisor Training (0.5 HSW LU)

INFORMATION SYSTEMS

- Partnered with the Examination, Administration, and Customer Service teams to complete systems integration enabling candidates to redeem a \$50 stipend toward a webcam to prepare for online proctoring.
- Conducted mandatory annual cybersecurity awareness program for all NCARB staff. This comprehensive security training covered social engineering, remote work protection, and next generation antivirus mitigation. These efforts minimize risk from cyber-attacks and phishing attempts.
- Licensing System customers now have the ability to upload documentation for moral character affirmative responses directly to initial, renewal, and reinstatement applications.

MARKETING & COMMUNICATIONS

- Announced the release of the new ARE demo exam and other video resources to licensure candidates. Also moderated an NCARB Live to highlight the new tools and strategies for taking a test starting December 14. The live broadcast had over 1,000 attendees, and a recording of the webinar has over 1,700 views.
- Met with the team from NOMA to continue progress on the *Baseline on Belonging* report, focused on identifying programmatic/firm culture impediments to licensure, based on a joint survey conducted by the organizations earlier this year. The first report will be focused on the experience phase of the licensure process.
- Began development of possible resolutions based on committee charges. The Board of Directors will review the resolutions in January, and draft resolutions will be released to the membership in late-January/ early February.
- Provided staff support for the Futures Collaborative.
- Think/Re-Think Tank Alumni will be serving as a focus group on a variety of topics over the next few months.
- Reminded Certificate holders about upcoming continuing education deadlines and promoted NCARB's Continuum Education courses.
- Supported the Committee Summit's registration process, branding, and leadership presentations.
- Began work behind the scenes to migrate to a new version of our website content management system.
 Over the next few months, the team will be cleaning up and reorganizing some sections of the website to better highlight important information.

MESSAGE FROM THE CEO

Dear Colleagues,

With December a shorter month for many as folks took much-needed time away, we've combined our December and January Updates. The two months combined saw a heightened focus on finalizing draft resolutions for the Board of Directors to review in late-January. The resolutions package included three resolutions postponed from last year's Annual Business Meeting (including a *Certification Guidelines* adjustment clarifying education information, sunset of an interior design resolution, and a makeover of NCARB's *Model Law and Regulations* document), two resolutions from the Diversity Collaborative proposing governance changes regarding Board of Directors service, an "omnibus" resolution to sunset outdated older resolutions, an adjustment to the *Certification Guidelines* regarding foreign license candidates for certification, and an adjustment to Member Board dues. The Board also released Resolution 2021-01, which would amend our *Bylaws* to allow electronic voting at NCARB business meetings, for member consideration at a special meeting to be held in May.

These eight draft resolutions will now be issued to the Member Boards for initial feedback running through the March Regional Summit, and then be reconsidered for amendment and approval at the April Board meeting. The approved final drafts will be issued for consideration in advance of the late-June Annual Business Meeting.

Our Board is hopeful that the hard work undertaken by volunteers over the past two years, along with the years leading up to these resolution drafts, will result in a very full and exciting annual meeting in June.

Along with finalizing resolution drafts, many of our key committees and task forces convened to interact regarding joint charges in December for the annual Committee Summit. The virtual format provided fresh opportunities for special guests to observe and contribute while maintaining a rigorous schedule.

Despite the challenges of the pandemic and the pressing needs of their practices, our hundreds of volunteers continue to focus on our evolving programs and services. A mid-year review of committee progress with President Calvani and staff liaisons indicated that these volunteers are grappling with thorny issues and complex problems impacting the relevance and value of reasonable regulation. Resolving these issues will yield a more comprehensive, contemporary, and inclusive approach to protecting the public.

We are sensitive to the sacrifice of time made by our volunteers. With the pandemic negating the feasibility of face-to-face meetings, volunteer work frequently can be in conflict with business and personal obligations. Further, health and safety concerns have curtailed our ability to fully enhance the volunteer experience by providing opportunities for networking, relationship development, and the dividends of on-site interaction over multiple days.



Our thanks to Ohio MBE Shannon Himes and North Carolina MBE Cathe Evans for piloting an expedited transmittal process for initial licensure. Final updates are underway based on their feedback, with an expected release to other Member Boards coming soon.
- Effective, March 2021, the use of the form 155 to report initial licensure will officially sunset. State registration, previously reported on this form, is to be reported through the Online License Verification system, which can be accessed through the Member Resources portal, where the transmittal is **accessed**. The Online License Verification System launched more than two years ago and significantly reduces time and other impediments to the reciprocal licensure process. We are happy to provide support for Member Boards making this transition. Archived copies of Form 155 will continue to be included in reciprocal licensure packets for the time being.


- Launched the online proctoring option and new exam forms on December 14, 2020.
- ARE volunteers completed additional item writing and review efforts, wrapping up their final homework assignments for the calendar year.
- The Program Continuum Advisory Collaborative, the Think Tank/Re-Think Tank Alumni group, and the Responsible Charge Task Force participated in Committee Summit.
- Launched a new online proctoring support tool, known as a "test run." This tool allows candidates the ability to schedule a 30-minute appointment and complete all the necessary systems checks and testing area evaluation with a live proctor prior to their ARE appointment.
- The Examination Committee worked with NCARB's psychometricians to review early exam results from each division of the ARE to ensure a fair cut score recommendation to the Board of Directors. The earliest division, Practice Management, had its scores released in late-January, and the remaining divisions are expected to be released in early-February. Information about the updated cut score process can be found on the NCARB Blog.
- Monitored the ongoing delivery of the ARE. Approximately 20 percent of all ARE administrations are now being delivered via online proctoring.
- The Forms Assembly Subcommittee completed its efforts for this fiscal year by finalizing the quality assurance review of two additional forms for each division of the ARE.
- Business Continuity Exam Work Groups finalized their item writing efforts, allowing their work to advance to its final stage of coordinating development of pilot forms for use in the case of a major security breach.



- The Program Continuum Advisory Collaborative collaborated with the Futures Collaborative during Committee Summit to discuss topics for future research and key issues that a future licensure framework will need to solve; collaborated with Think/Re-Think Tank Alumni to discuss pinch points and topics related to equity in the licensure process.
- The Experience Committee discussed experience setting opportunities in the Architectural Experience Program® (AXP®) and their relevance to the current AXP tasks. The committee also met virtually to continue their work evaluating current experience opportunities in AXP.
- Education Committee members discussed outcomes of recent research related to assessing educational achievement; health, safety, and welfare (HSW) related education; the current state of professional practice education; and analysis of a hypothetical four-year degree path to licensure.
- Interiors Task Force members attending Committee Summit collaborated with the Think Tank/Re-Think Tank Alumni to hear candidates' and recently licensed architects' experiences working with interior designers; collaborated with the Licensure Advisory Forum to understand impressions and interests among allied organizations in reasonable regulation, including interior designers; and collaborated with the Incidental Practice Task Force to discuss/consider any interest or need to develop definitions of incidental practice to include interior design. Discussions will continue as the task forces work on their joint charges.

EXPERIENCE + EDUCATION (CONT)

- The 2020 NCARB Education Standard became effective on January 6, 2020. The Education Standard is used to evaluate the educational background of individuals who do not have a degree from a NAAB-accredited program—typically those pursuing licensure or certification as a foreign applicant, or those pursuing NCARB certification through the Education Alternative.
- Received 30 NCARB Certificate Portfolios from applicants pursuing NCARB certification through the Education Alternative. Applicants made eligible for this process under the previous *NCARB Education Standard* were given a November deadline to submit their portfolio, or the option to meet the requirements of the new *Education Standard*. The Certification Alternatives Review Team (CART) evaluators are currently reviewing the portfolios for compliance with the previous *Education Standard*.
- Ball State University has been added as a new IPAL program.
- Coordinated with NAAB to identify applicable changes to the requirements of the NAAB's Education Evaluation Services for Architects (EESA) to align with the new *Standard*.
- Collaborated with the Information Systems and Marketing & Communications teams to launch the new NCARB Certificate Portfolio online system and applicant guide in response to the implementation of the 2020 NCARB Education Standard.

- The Ethics Case Study Work Group submitted final drafts of their case studies for editorial review.
- Launched the new AXP Supervisor Training course, worth 1.5 HSW learning units (LU), on www.ce.ncarb.org. This course explains NCARB's requirements for AXP supervision, as well as practical and ethical considerations for supervisors and mentors. The course also examines unconscious biases in the workplace and how they may affect candidates' professional development. This course is available free to anyone with a My NCARB account.
- In addition to the supervisor course, launched one additional new Continuum Education course: Planning for Sustainable Development Part I, worth 2.25 HSW LU.
- In collaboration with the architectural collaterals, released two new resources for <u>pre-collegiate students</u> and <u>counselors</u>. These two booklets provide an introduction to the profession of architecture and the path to licensure, and will be utilized by all six collaterals in outreach.
- Collaborated with AIAS student-appointed Architect Licensing Advisors on the development and delivery of two presentations at AIAS's first virtual AIAS Forum. One presentation was on the basics of path to licensure, and one focused on busting myths about the value of licensure and NCARB.

NCARB and our collateral partners worked together to create booklets for students and school guidance counselors providing an overview of a career in architecture.

INFORMATION SYSTEMS

- Delivered key elements for the new online proctoring option for the ARE, including integrating the option with core NCARB systems, facilitating the prepaid card rebate for a webcam for online candidates, creating additional candidate notifications, and coordinating a new exam delivery survey.
- The North Dakota State Board of Architecture will be implementing NCARB's Licensing System, joining the Louisiana State Board of Architectural Examiners in utilizing this system to enhance and streamline the board licensing process.
- Our Licensing System has been migrated to a new platform which improves the deployment, scalability, and management of the product.
- Recent upgrades to cloud-based cyber security protection have caught over 300,000 potential harmful activities, including over 150,000 malware items.
- Prepared the annual snapshot of NCARB data to be used in the upcoming *NCARB by the Numbers* publication.
- Implemented a series of small optimizations for NCARB's data warehouse that will support more frequent refreshes of information used in visualizations and analytics.
- Exam candidates will now receive a reminder email three days prior to their scheduled appointment.
- New deficiency standards for the Certificate Portfolio launched on January 6.
- In collaboration with the Examination team, launched the test run feature, giving candidates the ability to test their computers and workspaces with a live proctor prior to their exam date.
- Infrastructure team is overseeing security updates to ensure users are able to continue to work securely while remote.

- Released the **FY20 Annual Report**, providing a review of NCARB's work during the last fiscal year.

- Worked with cross-departmental team to launch the online proctoring option for the ARE and communicate the launch to candidates, members, and other key stakeholders.

Regional Summit Update

The following is on behalf of the Regional Leadership Committee:

We hope this communication finds you and your families safe and well. We are writing on behalf of the Regional Leadership Committee (RLC) to inform you that after careful consideration and weighing all options, the RLC has decided to host the 2021 Regional Summit in a virtual format in early-March 2021.

Considering the circumstances of the coronavirus pandemic and travel restrictions imposed on executives and board members by some state governments, the committee felt that a fully virtual summit was the best way to proceed to maintain the safety of everyone involved and to maximize opportunities for participation.

The committee is working hard to plan an engaging summit, which takes full advantage of a virtual platform to allow for collaboration within and across regions. We invite you to share your perspectives about what topics you would like to see covered at Regional Summit by **completing this** <u>brief survey</u> by November 24.

We regret that we will not see each other in person, but protecting everyone's safety is the top priority. We hope that circumstances will improve so that we can all be together in person again very soon!

PCC/MBE Survey

The 2020-2021 Member Board Executives Committee (MBEC) and the Professional Conduct Committee (PCC) have been assigned joint charges by President Robert M. Calvani, FAIA, NCARB, to provide recommendations on how to define "discipline" in relation to what actions are entered into the Disciplinary Database, as well as define what constitutes "administrative violations" (or infractions) that would not warrant potential disciplinary action.

As part of this charge, we ask that you please respond to this <u>survey</u> no later than **February 15, 2021**. Responses are requested from individual professional members, public members, and Board Executives. The survey should take 10-20 minutes to complete.

Background

NCARB Record holders and Certificate holders are required to adhere to the Council's professional conduct policies. Language regarding professional conduct can be found in the <u>NCARB Bylaws</u>, <u>Professional Conduct Committee</u>: <u>Rules</u> <u>of Procedure</u>, <u>Policy for the ARE</u>: <u>Exam Candidate Conduct</u>, and <u>Certification Guidelines</u>. These policy documents are also available on NCARB's website.

Many organizations with credentialing or certificate programs have professional and/or ethical conduct requirements. In addition, there are policies and procedures related to addressing professional conduct that define discipline, define administrative violations, minor infractions, and outline disciplinary sanctions.

NCARB reviews disciplinary actions entered into the Disciplinary Database by Member Boards. Disciplinary actions by Member Boards may be flagged for review by the PCC when there is an indication of a potential violation of NCARB's professional conduct policies. Possible professional conduct violations are also brought to the PCC in connection to the Council's exam policies (such as an exam security breach), NCARB Certificate renewals, whistleblower reports, and NCARB staff engagements with Record or Certificate holders.

Online Proctoring Update

Online proctoring and the related exam changes are scheduled to launch on December 14, 2020. Candidates were reminded on November 12 about the new exam format and were encouraged to practice using the new digital whiteboard through our updated <u>demo exam</u>, available through their My NCARB account.

Additionally, we've created several free resources to help candidates best prepare for the upcoming launch of online proctoring and familiarize themselves with changes to the exam's navigation, tools, and timing. Keep in mind, upcoming exam changes will impact all exam appointments—whether candidates are taking the ARE online or at a test center—starting on December 14.

Updated Demo Exam—Including Digital Whiteboard

Through the whiteboard, candidates can add text, create shapes, and sketch. We recommend that candidates become familiar with the functionality of the new whiteboard tool before taking the updated exam. The <u>updated</u> <u>demo exam</u> also features 75 practice items, a three-hour testing duration, and all the updated navigation features and tools candidates will see when testing from December 14 onward, including the new digital whiteboard.

They should also make sure to test the new break feature in the demo exam. When candidates indicate they are ready to take a break, they'll be directed to the Exam Summary screen, where they'll have the chance to review and return to any seen items before beginning their break. Once candidates return from their break, any seen items— whether answered or incomplete—will be locked, and they won't be able to revisit them.



The full-length demo exam isn't scored, but candidates can find answers to many of the sample items in the <u>ARE 5.0</u> <u>Handbook</u>. Candidates can check out the <u>ARE 5.0 Online Community</u> to discuss all of the sample items.

ARE 5.0 Test Prep Videos

To help candidates make the most of all the exam changes, we've updated our ARE 5.0 Test Prep video series, available free on <u>YouTube</u>. Watch our updated <u>ARE 5.0 Navigation</u> and <u>ARE 5.0 Strategies</u> videos to get a walk-through of all the updated exam features.

We've also created a new <u>digital whiteboard video</u> featuring an in-depth review of how to use the new whiteboard tool, with tips on making the most of its features and functionality. In addition, we've updated the videos on each of the <u>six ARE 5.0 divisions</u> to include the latest information, including the new exam timing details and latest suggested references.

Online Proctoring and ARE Changes Update

The updates to the Architect Registration Examination[®] (ARE[®]) 5.0 and the option to test via online proctoring officially launched on December 14. Candidates can now schedule an online proctored exam in <u>My NCARB</u> or reschedule an existing in-person appointment to be taken online. Keep in mind, these <u>exam changes</u> will apply to all future exam appointments, even if candidates are testing in person.

Scheduling an Appointment

Whether a candidate is scheduling an in-person or online appointment, they may notice some changes to the scheduling process, but the basics are the same. To schedule a new appointment, candidates should navigate to the "Exams" tab in their NCARB Record, purchase a seat credit, and select "Schedule" next to the division they would like to book. They can then follow the steps <u>outlined in this article</u> to complete the process.

Rescheduling an Existing Appointment

Candidates can also reschedule an existing exam appointment and, if desired, switch delivery methods. To reschedule, candidates can navigate to the "Exams" tab in My NCARB and select "Reschedule" under the previously scheduled appointment they'd like to change. From there, they'll select a delivery method and then follow the same scheduling steps as above. As a reminder, rescheduling fees are waived through December 31, 2020, and will be reinstated at a reduced rate starting January 1, 2021. NCARB will continue absorbing its internal administrative cost for rescheduled appointments. It is anticipated that the reduced rates will remain in place for the foreseeable future.

Preparing for an Online Proctored Exam

Before candidates schedule an online proctored exam, they should <u>review the requirements</u> for setting up an online proctored testing space, and <u>watch our video</u> on how to prepare for the check-in process. In addition, Prometric provides a helpful video on <u>what to expect during an appointment</u>. Candidates who can't meet the requirements for testing online should plan to test in person.

Candidates testing from a computer with a firewall or antivirus software or from a Mac may need to <u>take additional</u> <u>steps</u> to prepare for their online proctored appointment. To facilitate the ID verification portion of the check-in, candidates should use an external webcam that can autofocus.

Requesting Exam Accommodations

NCARB is committed to making sure the ARE is equitable and accessible, which is why we work with our testing partners to provide accommodations for individuals with disabilities or temporary medical conditions. Receiving a \$50 Prepaid Card

To help offset the cost of purchasing an external webcam, NCARB is offering all candidates a one-time, \$50 prepaid card the first time they schedule an online proctored appointment. <u>Learn more</u> about the prepaid card and how candidates will receive it.

PCC/MBE Survey

The FY21 Member Board Executives Committee (MBEC) and Professional Conduct Committee (PCC) have been assigned joint charges by President Calvani to provide recommendations on how to define "discipline" for purposes of what actions are entered into the Disciplinary Database and to define what constitutes "administrative violations" (or infractions) that would not warrant potential disciplinary action.





As part of this charge, we ask that you please complete this <u>survey</u> no later than **February 15, 2021**. We also encourage participation from individual design professional members, public members, and board executives. This survey should take approximately 10-20 minutes to complete.

Background

NCARB Record holders and Certificate holders are required to adhere to NCARB professional conduct policies. Language regarding professional conduct can be found in the <u>NCARB Bylaws</u>, <u>Professional Conduct Committee</u>: <u>Rules of Procedure</u>, <u>Policy for the ARE: Exam Candidate Conduct</u>, and <u>NCARB Certification Guidelines</u>. These documents are all readily available on NCARB's <u>website</u>.

Many organizations with credentialing or certificate programs have professional and/or ethical conduct requirements. As such, there are policies and procedures related to addressing professional conduct that define discipline, administrative violations, minor infractions, and outline disciplinary sanctions.

NCARB reviews disciplinary actions entered into the NCARB Disciplinary Database by Member Boards. Disciplinary actions by Member Boards may be flagged for review by the PCC when there is any indication of potential violations to NCARB professional conduct policies. Possible professional conduct violations are also brought to the PCC in connection to the Council's exam policies (e.g., an exam security breach), NCARB Certificate renewals, whistleblower reports, and NCARB staff engagement with Record or Certificate holders.

Advocacy & External Engagement Update

FY20 End-of-Year Report

NCARB's Advocacy and External Engagement team is excited to share our recently published End-of-Year Report for Fiscal Year 2020. Now available on the <u>Member Board Community</u>, we encourage you to take a moment and read about our efforts from the past year. Within the report, you'll find highlights on legislative activities, a commitment to study the public perception of licensure, as well as <u>Alliance for Responsible Professional Licensing</u> (ARPL) related accomplishments. We also outline emerging trends and challenges moving forward into 2021 and beyond. Feel free to contact us for additional information and details regarding the report.

Legislative Update

Despite interruptions to regular legislative operations due to the COVID-19 pandemic, several jurisdictions have begun to pre-file bills. Our <u>legislative and regulatory tracking tool</u> allows you to monitor architect-related legislation across the country with ease. As we move closer to 2021 legislative sessions, we anticipate further attention on professional and occupational licensing.





The Council Relations team will continue to support your efforts with a wide range of available resources and tools, including talking points, legal expertise, data, leave-behinds, and other related services. Below are some updates on existing legislation, and highlights from new bills we have seen so far. As always, we will continue to monitor their statuses and inform you of any pending developments.

- Michigan: Among other jurisdictions that have proposed legislation to provide additional accommodations to members of the military, the Michigan Legislature recently introduced several related bills. Governor Gretchen Whitmer hailed the package of bills in a recent press release.
 - <u>Michigan House Bill 6329</u> <u>Michigan Senate Bill 1223</u>: These companion bills would provide an additional pathway to reciprocal licensure for specific members of the military community. It would require the Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs to issue a reciprocal license to an out-of-state applicant, under certain conditions. While similar to other military-related bills we have seen, this legislation would provide certain reciprocal licensing authority to the overarching regulatory agency rather than retain complete authority with the board.
 - Michigan House Bill 6330: This bill would waive initial licensure fees for members of the military community.
 - <u>Michigan Senate Bill 1222</u>: This bill would clarify the process of issuing temporary licenses. It would require the Michigan Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs to issue a temporary license under certain conditions.
- Ohio Senate Bill 246: Introduced on November 26, 2019, this recently amended bill would require the Ohio Board of Architects to issue a license to an out-of-state applicant under a new reciprocal licensure pathway, while still meeting certain criteria. It would complicate an already streamlined path to licensure and would confuse future applicants. Ohio Senator Kirk Schuring, who is also chair of the Senate General Government and Agency Review Committee, contacted NCARB for comments. Working alongside the Ohio Board, NCARB provided a written testimony to the review committee. Within the testimony, we highlight Ohio's straightforward reciprocity system and address the bill's potential unintended consequences. We will continue to follow the committee's discussion on the proposed bill.
- Wyoming Draft 21LSO-0135 | Wyoming Draft 21LSO-0040: While these bills are still drafts and not officially introduced, we'd like to bring them to your attention. The Wyoming Corporations, Elections & Political Subdivisions Interim Committee recently met to discuss the proposed legislation. We are working alongside the Wyoming State Board of Architects & Landscape Architects to provide resources and support, if necessary.
 - Wyoming House Bill 21LSO-0135 is similar to other "universal licensure" bills and would also provide additional accommodations to members of the military community. This bill had significant support from the Wyoming military community and the Department of Defense. We anticipate similar efforts in other jurisdictions moving forward into 2021. This bill would require the Wyoming Board to issue a license to a military spouse if the spouse is licensed in another state. It would modify the board's current authority that requires a military spouse's license to be "substantially equivalent," among other criteria. Additionally, the bill would allow temporary licenses for qualified military spouses to be extended from 120 days to three years.
 - Wyoming House Bill 21LSO-0040 would allow the board to waive or modify examination or continuing education requirements, under certain conditions.



Council Relations Update

With bittersweet sentiment, we must share that after more than five years with the Council, and the last three years as assistant vice president of Council Relations, Nefertari Carver will be leaving NCARB at the end of the year.

Nefertari has been such a key part to NCARB's success, building a great team and leading a broad range of efforts dedicated to supporting our members and volunteers, including:

- Serving as the key liaison to our Member Boards, designing an engagement program that enables NCARB to develop resources and services to help boards accomplish important public health, safety, and welfare responsibilities
- Leading NCARB's board pipeline effort to develop a more diverse pool of MBMs for state governors to appoint to licensing boards
- Being an integral part of the planning and execution of several of our major meetings like MBE Workshops, Regional Summits, Committee Summits, Member Board Chairs/Executives Leadership Summits, and Annual Business Meetings
- Orchestrating the volunteer appointment process, working with staff liaisons, executive leadership, and the Board president-elect to help design diverse and effective committees

In the new year, Nefertari will be joining a global strategy, communications, and philanthropic consulting firm, working with CEOs and corporations to leverage their resources to benefit society. She has been a trusted partner and a joy to work with, and we will greatly miss her contributions. We wish her well as she moves on to her exciting new role.

Special Meeting

The NCARB BOD has called a Special Meeting on May 12-14, 2021, so that the membership can consider and vote on a resolution that amends the *NCARB Bylaws* to permit remote meetings. Voting on this resolution early would allow it to be implemented ahead of the June ABM and allow the Council to more efficiently conduct its business in June.

Background

Recent events have highlighted more than ever the need for NCARB services and processes to be adaptable for unforeseen circumstances—including the governing structure outlined in the *NCARB Bylaws*. Iowa law, under which the Council is incorporated, permits member meetings to be conducted by telephone and/or video-based meeting tools only if specifically authorized by the articles of incorporation (articles) or bylaws of an organization. Currently, neither NCARB's Articles nor its *Bylaws* include such an authorizing provision. <u>Resolution 2021-01</u> creates that option.

Adding this section to the *Bylaws* does not change the BOD's preference for in-person meetings as the standard approach to conduct membership business. In-person Annual Business Meetings and other special meetings of the Council offer invaluable opportunities to share information, connect, and hear from the membership beyond just what the *Bylaws* require. However, the need to be able to conduct the Council's most basic business each fiscal year, which includes voting on resolutions and electing the BOD, is essential to keeping the Council running no matter the circumstances.



Currently, this year's ABM is expected to be conducted as a hybrid meeting, blending in-person and virtual attendees, to accommodate those who will not yet be allowed to or are ready to travel. To accomplish this, the vote is being scheduled so the requested change can be in place prior to consideration of other resolutions and elections at the ABM. Having this provision in place will allow the Council to take advantage of electronic tools to make voting, potential amendments, or other actions a more seamless and efficient experience for the membership.

We hope that you will take the time to review and discuss this resolution with your fellow board members. More information on how this special meeting will be conducted will be available closer to the dates. FY21 Resolutions

Please note: There is no Resolution 2021-A because the Board has already considered that resolution and decided to move it forward as Resolution 2021-01 at the special meeting in May 2021. Resolutions with letter names are drafts, and then become numbered resolutions after the Board has officially voted to move them forward to the membership.

We hope that you will take the time to review and discuss these resolutions with your fellow board members. We look forward to receiving your feedback and answering questions during the upcoming Regional Summit.

NCARB Launches Get on Board Initiative

NCARB's "Get on Board" initiative is partnering with licensing boards, external organizations, and appointing authorities to advocate and encourage more diverse representation on jurisdictional licensing boards to reflect the communities they serve. The Council's primary goals are to ensure appointing officials for jurisdictional licensing boards have a diverse slate of qualified candidates to choose from, raise awareness on the importance of serving, and encourage members from traditionally underrepresented groups to seek out these opportunities.

The Get on Board initiative is also partnering with various national and state organizations to broaden its outreach and help spread the word about upcoming and current board opportunities.

ARE Update

We are pleased to share that the updated cut scores for all six Architect Registration Examination[®] (ARE[®]) 5.0 divisions have been set, and score reports were released to candidates on Friday, February 5, 2021. Moving forward, candidates will have the option to view provisional scores at the end of each exam.

Based on early results, pass rates have risen slightly for five divisions and decreased slightly for one division. Early findings also reveal that candidates generally perform equally well, whether testing online or in person. Updates to the exam's timing have also been positive, with candidates taking advantage of the flexible break option, as well as spending less time answering some questions—like the new three-option multiple choice—and more time answering complex questions that require calculations. Additionally, performance on questions that require calculations has not dropped, and in the majority of cases, it's increased slightly. These initial findings demonstrate that the exam's latest updates help ensure the ARE is a test of competency, not speed.

How We Can Help With Technical Issues

We're sorry that the recent increase in technical issues is causing additional stress and uncertainty for candidates. Unfortunately, NCARB—along with other organizations who use the same testing software—has seen an increase in reported technical issues (now up to about 13 percent). These issues range from error messages that don't impact the exam delivery, to more serious interruptions that prevent a candidate from completing their exam. Monitoring and addressing these issues continues to be a top priority for NCARB, and we are actively working with our vendors to resolve them as soon as possible. If a candidate experiences a technical issue, please share these steps so we can log their incident and provide next steps:

- 1. Immediately notify the test center administrator or online proctor
- 2. Contact NCARB in writing within 15 days

If a candidate was unable to complete the exam due to a major technical issue, we will work with them to reschedule the division at no cost. For questions, please reach out to the Council Relations team at <u>council-relations@ncarb.org</u>.

Legislative Update

With most legislative sessions currently underway, we would like to inform you of a few developments. The Council Relations team is prepared to support your efforts with resources and tools, including talking points, data, leave-behinds, and other related services. Our <u>legislative and regulatory tracking tool</u> allows you to monitor architect-related legislation across the country at ease. As always, we will continue to monitor these bills and inform you of any pending developments.



Universal Licensure: A continuing theme we have seen in several jurisdictions is "universal licensure" or "universal recognition." This type of legislation seeks to require a board to issue a license to an individual who was granted a comparable license in another state. The intent is often to improve interstate mobility and build on workforce development initiatives. While the applicant would still be required to meet certain criteria, this broad-brush approach to legislation does not adequately consider the specifics of individual professions or the authority of our Member Boards. So far, we have seen a variety of universal licensure proposals in jurisdictions, including <u>Wyoming</u>, <u>Kansas</u>, and <u>Mississippi</u>. The NCARB Council Relations team has engaged with each of these boards to help monitor developments, plus provide resources and support.

Alliance for Responsible Professional Licensing

In response to increasing legislative challenges to professional licensing, state members across the <u>Alliance for</u>. <u>Responsible Professional Licensing</u> (ARPL) have expressed interest in creating state ARPL groups. Creating a version of ARPL within your state will strengthen your ability to collaborate with other ARPL members on strategies to protect and promote strong licensing systems. We have developed a guide on how to get started, along with a few things to consider as you create your group. Find more information on <u>forming your state's ARPL</u>.

Survey of Registered Architects

Every year, NCARB collects data on the number of registered architects from our Member Boards. This information is included in our annual data publication, *NCARB by the Numbers*, and highlights the valuable role that licensing boards play in ensuring the health, safety, and welfare of the public.

In late-January, an email was sent to all MBEs requesting information about in-state licensees and reciprocal licensees. If you're an MBE and haven't responded yet, please do so before February 12, 2021.

PCC/MBE Joint Survey

The 2020-2021 Member Board Executives Committee (MBEC) and the Professional Conduct Committee (PCC) have been assigned joint charges by President Robert Calvani, FAIA, NCARB, to provide recommendations on how to define "discipline" for purposes of what actions are entered into the Disciplinary Database and to define what constitutes "administrative violations" (or infractions) that would not warrant potential disciplinary action.







Cut Scores Set for All Exam Divisions

The <u>updated cut scores</u> for all six ARE® 5.0 divisions have been set, and score reports have been released. Starting tomorrow, candidates will have the option to view provisional scores at the end of each exam. Thank you to all the candidates who were part of the early testing process!

Based on early results, pass rates rose slightly for five divisions and decreased slightly for one division. Early findings also reveal that candidates generally perform equally well whether testing online or in person. Updates to the exam's timing have also been positive: Candidates are taking advantage of the flexible break option, plus spending less time answering some questions (like the new three-option multiple choice), and more time answering complex questions that require calculations. Plus, performance on questions that require calculations hasn't dropped—and in the majority of cases, has increased slightly. 

ARE update



Hi Candidate,

NCARB would like to update you regarding the ongoing delivery of the Architect Registration Examination[®] (ARE[®]) 5.0.

NCARB continuously monitors exam delivery performance, including all reported technical issues. Our ongoing audit has identified an uptick in the number of technical issues reported since the updated exam launched. <u>However, our test</u> <u>delivery vendors have confirmed that this increase in technical issues is not isolated</u> <u>to the ARE, as it is impacting candidates across multiple programs.</u> Currently, around 13 percent of ARE candidates are reporting technical issues, including both in-person and online exams. These "technical issues" range from a simple error message that may appear on screen and needs to be cleared before continuing, to more serious interruptions when the exam stops responding completely and must be restarted. NCARB has made it clear to our vendors that this performance level is unacceptable. We are working with our vendors to identify and resolve the cause of these issues as quickly as possible.

Should you experience a technical issue with the exam, please report it to the test proctor and to us by contacting our Customer Relations team at <u>ncarb.org/contact</u>, so that we can address your situation as necessary and include an assessment of your incident in our system diagnosis and refinement.

We know that technical issues can be stressful and distracting—especially under pressure—even if they do not impact your ability to complete the exam administration. Please report any technical issue you experience both to Prometric during your appointment, and to NCARB after your appointment. NCARB will continue to use all candidate-reported data and work with our vendors to identify and troubleshoot all exam delivery issues.

BODbrief

January 2021

This publication is designed to provide timely updates on the actions and discussions of the NCARB Board of Directors immediately following meetings. Please remember that the information provided here may be confidential and will be indicated as such when necessary.

Executive Summary

President/Chair of the Board Robert M. Calvani, FAIA, NCARB, virtually convened the winter session of the FY21 Board of Directors meeting on January 21 – 23, 2021. During the meeting, the Board engaged with leadership from the Council for Interior Design Qualification (CIDQ) and the Council of Landscape Architectural Registration Boards (CLARB) as well as with an equity, diversity, and inclusion (EDI) consultant to discuss opportunities identified during focus groups recently conducted with Council members. The Board also discussed performance on the Council's Strategic Plan, met with the investment advisors, and conducted a blue-sky session to identify opportunities and risks for further discussion and future study.

The Board set the passing score for one division of the Architect Registration Examination[®] (ARE[®]), approved a recommendation from the Professional Conduct Committee (PCC) to reinstate a previously revoked NCARB Certificate, established a "special membership meeting" to take place in May 2021, and approved Resolution 2021-01 to be presented during the special meeting. The Board also approved the release of eight additional draft resolutions for Member Board consideration. In other actions, the Board passed an amendment to the Council's agreement with its Lineup[®] subsidiary, updated the Council's investment policy, approved several funding requests, and discussed developing a slate of nominees to the board of directors for the National Architectural Accrediting Board (NAAB).

President Calvani and CEO Michael Armstrong updated the Board on recent and upcoming activities including the agenda for the March 2021 Regional Summit and plans for a hybrid Annual Business Meeting that will provide full engagement for both in-person and virtual attendees. Treasurer Jon Alan Baker, FAIA, NCARB, LEED AP, reported on the state of the Council's financial funds, and Secretary/NCARB liaison to the Lineup® Board of Directors (NCARB's for-profit subsidiary) Kenneth R. Van Tine, AIA, NCARB, LEED AP, provided a financial update on subsidiary activities. The Board also provided feedback regarding a Credentials Committee proposal to increase transparency for Board elections.

The Executive Committee met the day before the Board meeting to review financial outcomes and trends for the first six months of the fiscal year and to engage with the investment advisors for the annual review of the Council's investment strategy. The committee also developed recommendations related to financial actions to be proposed for Board consideration.

Generative and Strategic Discussions

NCARB strategic consulting partner—Jay Younger, President and CEO of McKinley Advisors—led the Board of Directors through an assessment of NCARB's Strategic Plan performance including review of two metric dashboards and a summary of current special initiatives executing on the plan. Younger indicated that the plan provides a necessary framework while the goals of facilitating licensure, fostering collaboration, and maximizing value are sufficiently broad, providing flexibility for the organization to adapt to changing environments while simultaneously serving as a catalyst for identifying new opportunities and priorities.

A sample of recent NCARB initiatives sorted by the Strategic Plan objective they support.

President Calvani facilitated a "What If" blue-sky session focused on opportunities and risks, building off of a study conducted by the Board of Directors in the previous fiscal year. A key theme that emerged was promotion of NCARB alternative paths to support underrepresented populations and those without resources for an accredited degree. Topics included emphasizing the role of community colleges, seeking collaborative clarification on the role of interior designers, enhancing firm outreach, and designing an architectural census, as well as new opportunities for continuing education that meet health, safety, and welfare criteria.

Diversity, Inclusion, and Board Governance

The thread of elevating the commitment to diversity, inclusion, and equity in the volunteer leadership context was woven throughout several other Board activities including the discussion with Younger, an engagement with CLARB, resolutions from the Diversity Collaborative, and a session with consultant Effenus Henderson, President and CEO of HenderWorks, Inc. and Co-Director of the Institute for Sustainable Diversity and Inclusion. Henderson's services were included as part of NCARB's sponsorship of the National Organization of Minority Architects (NOMA). He provided feedback to the Board regarding his facilitation of recent focus groups composed of Member Board Members from underrepresented groups, along with results of an EDI "best corporate practices" survey he issued to the Board.

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Henderson outlined several areas of focus for future Board efforts including: identifying and mentoring individuals as candidates for state licensing boards; helping provide diverse candidate slates for Member Board appointments; recruiting diverse candidates for critical access points in NCARB's governance structure; examining gaps in governance structure, processes, and practices and providing ways to close those gaps; building outreach to influence future leaders to participate in NCARB activities; and developing a more intentional approach highlighting why there is a need to have increased diversity in the governance structure.

Collateral Regulatory Organization Engagement

CIDQ President Aandra Currie Shearer, President-elect Scott MacMeekin, and CEO Thom Banks joined the Board for an inaugural conversation acknowledging current joint efforts and future opportunities between the two organizations, which jointly share support for many of the same Member Boards and a mutual mission to protect the public. CIDQ is a member of the Interorganizational Council on Regulation (ICOR) along with NCARB, the National Council of Examiners for Engineering and Surveying (NCEES), and CLARB, as these organizations jointly support a number of multi-disciplinary boards and share a common mission. Discussion topics included scope of practice and joint efforts stemming from the NCARB Interiors Task Force to compare analyses of practice and test specifications from each organization. Following the engagement, the Board agreed to continue growing the partnership with CIDQ including exploring how the role of CIDQ could be elevated within the advocacy arena.

CLARB CEO Matthew Miller and Chief Strategy Officer Veronica Meadows presented on the results of CLARB's recent governance restructure initiative. The restructure was designed to address a shrinking leadership pool, leadership diversity, and deliver an agile, balanced governance structure that can adapt to meet changing needs while maintaining focus on smart regulation of landscape architects.

The Board of Directors discussed a slate of nominees to be submitted for a seat on the NAAB's board of directors to fill a seat that will be vacated in October by former Utah Member Board Member Jeanne R. Jackson, FAIA, NCARB, LEED AP. The Board will make a final decision on the list of nominees to be submitted in early-March.

Resolutions

The Board of Directors approved *Resolution 2021-01: NCARB Bylaws Amendment—Remote Meetings* for release to Member Boards. The Board also approved holding a special meeting of the membership in May 2021 to take action on this resolution so that the resolution is implemented ahead of the June Annual Business Meeting.

When passed, this resolution will allow electronic voting on resolutions and elections during the June Annual Business Meeting. Currently, Iowa law, under which the Council is incorporated, allows meetings to be conducted in this manner only if permitted within the Council's Articles of Incorporation or *Bylaws*. Currently, neither document permits remote meetings.

Secretary Van Tine submitted eight additional draft resolutions, which the Board cleared for initial release for membership review. These resolutions, released in early-February, will be introduced during the March Regional Summit. Feedback from Member Boards will be considered by the Board of Directors during the April 2021 Board meeting, at which time the Board will determine the final resolutions to be released for the June 2021 Annual Business Meeting.

NCARB

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The eight draft resolutions include:

- Three resolutions that were previously planned for the FY20 Annual Business Meeting: NCARB Certification Guidelines Amendment – Qualifications for Education Alternative; Sunset of Resolution 2000-1 (Opposition to Interior Design Licensing); and the Amendment and Restatement of the NCARB Legislative Guidelines and Model Law/Model Regulations
- A *Certification Guidelines Amendment* to address unintended impediments for foreign architects pursuing the foreign alternative path to certification
- An *omnibus resolution* to sunset several historical resolutions that are out of alignment with current Council policies and practices
- Two governance adjustment resolutions submitted by the Diversity Collaborative Task Force
- A *Member Board dues reduction resolution* to reduce dues from \$6,500 to \$1,000; and further, to change the *Bylaws* requirement for three-year notice about Member Board <u>dues changes</u> to apply only to <u>dues increases</u> so that the dues reduction can be implemented on July 1, 2021

FY21 Annual Business Meeting

CEO Armstrong and NCARB's Vice President of Marketing & Communications Andy McIntyre presented early concepts for holding a hybrid Annual Business Meeting in June 2021. Pending the passage of Resolution 2021-01 (above), the goal of the hybrid meeting would be to ensure that attendees can engage in debate, put forward motions, and take action on resolutions and elections in real time whether attending in person or online.

Acknowledging that the experience will be different from years past, Armstrong noted that the hotel contract provides that business sessions can take place with strict social distancing rules within an over-sized ballroom for in-person attendees and that audio-visual enhancements can provide an improved experience for online attendees. However, he stressed that travel to and attendance at these events would be promoted as optional for in-person participation based upon the safety parameters expressed by health experts and by participants themselves, including staff. He cautioned that research is in early stages and that it is expected that some extracurricular events will likely not take place due to the need to protect the health and safety of in-person attendees. Staff will continue to work with President Calvani and the Board of Directors before final decisions are made.

Committee Recommendations

The Board of Directors considered three committee recommendations:

• Examination Committee: The Board of Directors approved the committee's recommendation to set the passing score for the Practice Management division of the ARE based on statistical analysis conducted by the Council's examination vendor and review by the committee. Scores for all divisions of the ARE have been on hold since the launch of updates on December 14, 2020, which included the option to test via online proctoring. Scores for the Practice Management division were released to candidates following the Board meeting.



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In a follow-up call on February 2, the Board approved the committee recommendations for the remaining five divisions. Scores for these divisions will be released on Friday, February 5, 2021, and provisional score reporting will return to the test centers on Saturday, February 6, 2021. More information about this process can be found in a detailed explanation on NCARB's blog.

- **Professional Conduct Committee:** The Board approved the committee's recommendation to reinstate a previously revoked NCARB Certificate.
- **Credentials Committee**: The Board provided guidance on a Credentials Committee recommendation that will allow for more transparency in elections for the NCARB Board of Directors.

Finances

Treasurer Baker and NCARB's investment advisors reported on the healthy state of the Council's Short-term and Strategic Reserve funds. CEO Armstrong also reported that the Operating Fund is within Board-defined target allocations and reviewed financial activities for the first six months of the fiscal year. All indications are that as a result of adopting a "minimized expenses budget" effective July 2020, and even with reincorporating some additional expenditures in September 2020, financial outcomes for FY21 will exceed budget allocations by at least \$2 million—largely due to ongoing travel restrictions and better-than-expected customer service demands. Armstrong reminded the Board that the FY21 budget was adopted in June 2020, in the first quarter of the pandemic when all test centers were closed. The approved budget included 18 percent reductions in original revenue and expense projections as a hedge against unknown ramifications of the pandemic. Following these reviews, the Board of Directors made several financial decisions:

- Approved investment advisor-recommended changes to target asset allocations of the Council's Strategic Reserve portfolio
- Released Strategic Reserve funds to reinstate delayed initiatives including the Analysis of Practice, a partnership with the American Institute of Architects (AIA) to update the Boyer study, and funds for consultants for data analytics and a staff compensation benchmark study
- Released operating funds for previously frozen staff benefits
- Revised the cost-sharing agreement with Lineup® LLC, NCARB's for-profit subsidiary
- Released the next round of funding from Strategic Reserves for Lineup®

Reports

To provide more time for generative and strategic activities, President Calvani reduced time spent on reports to the Board, noting that all reports were included in pre-reading materials. Separately, Calvani provided additional insights on recent external engagements, noting that he had attended the fall **Licensing Advisors Retreat Week** and that he had spent a day with CEO Armstrong and committee staff liaisons during the week preceding the Board meeting for updates on the current state of committee charges.



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He also reported that he had held an inaugural meeting with the American Indian Council of Architects and Engineers; attended virtual annual meetings of NOMA, CIDQ, and the American Institute of Architecture Students (AIAS). Additionally, he participated in annual engagements with the NAAB and Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture (ACSA) boards of directors, joined by President-elect Alfred Vidaurri, Jr., FAIA, NCARB, AICP; Second Vice President Bayliss Ward, NCARB, AIA; and CEO Armstrong.

Armstrong reported on pending services for customers and Member Boards, including an expedited transmittal process for initial licensure candidates; upcoming Member Board engagements; and enhancements to the Council's media outreach strategy and priorities, as well as the planned approach to the 2021 legislative season.

Yes! We offer the paper and pencil exams at UA Fairbanks every April and October; Faith Fleagle is our Chief Proctor. This April and October will be the last time paper exams are offered there; all exam disciplines except Structural Engineering (SE) exams will be converted to CBT after 2021. We will offer the SE exams in Anchorage until they convert, probably in 2024 or 2025.

NTSB Recommendations and You The National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) is an independent federal agency charged with investigating and determining the probable cause of transportation accidents. We do not make regulations, but we do issue recommendations to organizations such as yours when we discover shortcomings in the transportation system that increase the risk of accidents. As a result of our investigative activities, we have issued one or more safety

recommendations that we believe you can act on to improve transportation safety.

Why did the NTSB issue my organization a safety recommendation?

We issue safety recommendations to organizations that can bring about change to reduce the risk of accidents, either through their direct role in the transportation industry, their legislative or regulatory authority, or the significant influence they have among others in the industry. We believe your organization is able to make or influence such changes.

What does the NTSB expect of safety recommendation recipients?

First and foremost, we encourage you to promptly take the recommended action to improve safety. Because we're eager to see recommendations implemented before more accidents occur, we follow recipients' efforts to implement each recommendation. We ask that you update us any time you achieve a significant milestone in your progress toward implementing the attached recommendation(s), or at least annually. We will provide feedback on your efforts by classifying each recommendation as open or closed, acceptable or unacceptable.1 Information about your actions associated with your recommendation(s) is available at our website so that the public can see our combined efforts to improve transportation safety.

What should our response to the NTSB include?

Please respond to us within 90 days (30 for urgent recommendations) explaining the specific actions you have taken or intend to take in response to the safety recommendation(s), and propose a timeline for completion. We understand organizations today are faced with competing priorities and limited resources, which can make implementing our recommendations a challenge. If, for any reason, you are not able to take the recommended action, or if you believe an alternate action would be more appropriate for your organization, please explain why. When you respond, please provide an e-mail address for future communications. We will review your response and provide feedback.

What if my organization doesn't believe the recommended action is the best way to improve safety?

We base our recommendations on the evidence, facts, and circumstances of the accidents we investigate. Sometimes industry leaders identify ways to attain the same safety objective more efficiently, and we encourage recipients to share their ideas with us. In these cases, we will evaluate the alternate means of achieving the safety objective and provide feedback. We believe safety is a collaborative effort, and we're happy to work with your organization to set goals and make improvements.

Why does the NTSB expect us to take action, even though our organization wasn't responsible for the accident that resulted in the safety recommendation?

Our goal is to prevent accidents. Often, the factors we identify as causing or contributing to an accident are not unique they represent common practices or situations that may be accidents waiting to happen. In such instances, we may make recommendations intended to raise the minimum standard for safety throughout the industry.

The National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) is an independent federal agency charged by Congress with investigating every civil aviation accident in the United States and significant accidents in other modes of transportation—railroad, highway, marine, and pipeline. We determine the probable cause of the accidents and issue safety recommendations aimed at preventing future accidents. In addition, we carry out special studies concerning transportation safety and coordinate the resources of the federal government and other organizations to assist victims and their family members affected by major transportation disasters.

We are providing the following information to urge the State of Alaska to act on the safety recommendation in this letter because we believe your organization can help reduce the risk of future accidents. For more information about the NTSB and our recommendation process, please see the attached one-page summary.

This letter provides information about our September 24, 2019, report *Overpressurization* of Natural Gas Distribution System, Explosions, and Fires in Merrimack Valley, Massachusetts, September 13, 2018, NTSB/PAR-19/02. The details of this accident investigation and the resulting safety recommendations may be found in the attached report, which can also be accessed at <u>http://www.ntsb.gov</u>.

As a result of this investigation, we identified the following safety issues:

- Adequacy of natural gas regulations
- Project documentation
- Constructability review
- Project management
- Risk assessment

- Safety management systems
- Licensed professional engineer approval of natural gas projects
- Emergency response

Accordingly, the NTSB makes the following safety recommendation to the 31 states that allow exemptions to professional engineer approval and stamping for natural gas infrastructure projects, including the State of Alaska. Additional information regarding this recommendation can be found in the noted section of the report.

• Remove the exemption so that all future natural gas infrastructure projects require licensed professional engineer approval and stamping. (P-19-16) (See section 3.4.)

The NTSB is vitally interested in this recommendation because it is designed to prevent accidents and save lives. We would appreciate a response within 90 days of the date of this letter, detailing the actions you have taken or intend to take to implement this recommendation. Dear Governor Dunleavy:

We recently examined exemptions to engineering licensure laws to learn whether and how Safety Recommendation P-19-16 is being implemented, both to ensure that the traveling public is provided the highest level of safety and to identify creative solutions that might be shared with others. We issued this recommendation to the state of Alaska on October 24, 2019, as a result of our accident report concerning a series of structure fires and explosions caused by the overpressurization of a natural gas distribution system in the Merrimack Valley, Massachusetts.

<u>P-19-16</u>

Remove the exemption so that all future natural gas infrastructure projects require licensed professional engineer approval and stamping.

We normally expect actions to address our recommendations to be completed within 3 to 5 years. It has now been over a year since this recommendation was issued, and we have not received any additional information regarding your state's actions to implement it. We would appreciate receiving a response from you within 90 days regarding actions that Alaska has completed or planned to address this recommendation. Pending our receipt of an update, Safety Recommendation P-19-16 remains classified "Open—Await Response."
