# ETHICS ACT PROCEDURES FOR BOARDS & COMMISSIONS

All board and commission members and staff should be familiar with the Executive Branch Ethics Act procedures outlined below.

## Who Is My Designated Ethics Supervisor (DES)?

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Every board or commission subject to the Ethics Act<sup>1</sup> has several ethics supervisors designated by statute.

- The chair serves as DES for board or commission members.
- The chair serves as DES for the executive director.
- The executive director serves as DES for the staff.
- The governor is the DES for a chair.<sup>2</sup>

## What Do I Have To Disclose?

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The Ethics Act requires members of boards and commissions to disclose:

- Any matter that is a potential conflict of interest with actions that the member may take when serving on the board or commission.
- Any circumstance that may result in a violation of the Ethics Act.
- Any personal or financial interest (or that of an immediate family member) in a state grant, contract, lease or loan that is awarded or administered by the member's board or commission.
- The receipt of certain gifts.

The executive director of the board or commission and its staff, as state employees, must also disclose:

- Compensated outside employment or services.
- Volunteer service, if any compensation, including travel and meals, is paid or there is a potential conflict with state duties.

- For more information regarding the types of matters that may result in violations of the Ethics Act, board or commission members should refer to the guide, *"Ethics Information for Members of Boards and Commissions."* The executive director and staff should refer to the guide, *Ethics Information for Public Employees.* Both guides and disclosure forms may be found on the [Department of Law's ethics website](#).

## How Do I Avoid Violations of the Ethics Act?

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- Make timely disclosures!
- Follow required procedures!
- Provide all information necessary to a correct evaluation of the matter!<sup>3</sup>
- When in doubt, disclose and seek advice!
- Follow the advice of your DES!

## What Are The Disclosure Procedures for Board and Commission Members?

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The procedural requirements for disclosures by members are set out in AS 39.52.220 and 9 AAC 52.120. One goal of these provisions is to help members avoid violations of the Ethics Act. The procedures provide the opportunity for members to seek review of matters in advance of taking action to ensure that actions taken will be consistent with the Act.

### Procedure for declaring actual or potential conflicts.

Members must declare potential conflicts and other matters that may violate the Ethics Act **on the public record and in writing to the chair**.

*Disclosure on the public record.* Members must identify actual and potential conflicts orally at the board or commission's public meeting **in advance** of participating in deliberations or taking any official action on the matter.

- A member must always declare a conflict and may choose to refrain from voting, deliberations or other participation regarding a matter.<sup>4</sup>
- If a member is uncertain whether participation would result in a violation of the Act, the member should disclose the circumstances and seek a determination from the chair.

*Disclosure in writing at a public meeting.* In addition to an oral disclosure at a board or commission meeting, members' disclosures must be made in writing.

- If the meeting is recorded, a tape or transcript of the meeting is preserved **and** there is a method for identifying the declaration in the record, an oral disclosure may serve as the written disclosure.
- Alternatively, the member must note the disclosure on the Notice of Potential Violation disclosure form and the chair must record the determination.

*Confidential disclosure in advance of public meeting.* Potential conflicts may be partially addressed in advance of a board or commission's public meeting based on the published meeting agenda or other board or commission activity.

- A member identifying a conflict or potential conflict submits a Notice of Potential Violation to the chair, as DES, in advance of the public meeting.
- This written disclosure is considered confidential.
- The chair may seek advice from the Attorney General.
- The chair makes a written determination, also confidential, whether the disclosed matter represents a conflict that will result in a violation of the Ethics Act if the member participates in official action addressing the matter.<sup>5</sup>
- If so, the chair directs the member to refrain from participating in the matter that is the subject of the disclosure.
- An oral report of the notice of potential violation and the determination that the member must refrain from participating is put on the record at a public meeting.<sup>6</sup>

*Determinations at the public meeting.* When a potential conflict is declared by a member for the public record, the following procedure must be followed:

- The chair states his or her determination regarding whether the member may participate.
- Any member may then object to the chair's determination.
- If an objection is made, the members present, excluding the member who made the disclosure, vote on the matter.
- *Exception:* A chair's determination that is made consistent with advice provided by the Attorney General may not be overruled.
- If the chair, or the members by majority vote, determines that a violation will exist if the disclosing member continues to participate, the member must refrain from voting, deliberating or participating in the matter.<sup>7</sup>

*If the chair identifies a potential conflict,* the same procedures are followed. If possible, the chair should forward a confidential written notice of potential violation to the Office of the Governor for a determination in advance of the board or commission meeting. If the declaration is first

made at the public meeting during which the matter will be addressed, the members present, except for the chair, vote on the matter. If a majority determines that a violation of the Ethics Act will occur if the chair continues to participate, the chair shall refrain from voting, deliberating or participating in the matter. A written disclosure or copy of the public record regarding the oral disclosure should be forwarded to the Office of the Governor for review by the chair's DES.

## Procedures for Other Member Disclosures

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A member's interest in a state grant, contract, lease or loan and receipt of gifts are disclosed by filling out the appropriate disclosure form and submitting the form to the chair for approval. The disclosure forms are found on the [Department of Law's ethics website](#).

## What Are The Disclosure Procedures for Executive Directors and Staff?

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Ethics disclosures of the executive director or staff are made in writing to the appropriate DES (chair for the executive director and the executive director for staff).

- Disclosure forms are found on the ethics website, noted above.

*Notices of Potential Violations.* Following receipt of a written notice of potential violation, the DES investigates, if necessary, and makes a written determination whether a violation of the Ethics Act could exist or will occur. A DES may seek advice from the Attorney General. If feasible, the DES shall reassign duties to cure a potential violation or direct divestiture or removal by the employee of the personal or financial interests giving rise to the potential violation.

- These disclosures are not required to be made part of the public record.
- A copy of a determination is provided to the employee.
- Both the notice and determination are confidential.

*Other Disclosures.* The DES also reviews other ethics disclosures and either approves them or determines what action must be taken to avoid a violation of the Act. In addition to the disclosures of certain gifts and interests in the listed state matters, state employees must disclose all outside employment or services for compensation.

- The DES must provide a copy of an approved disclosure or other determination the employee.

## How Are Third Party Reports of Potential Violations or Complaints Handled?

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Any person may report a potential violation of the Ethics Act by a board or commission member or its staff to the appropriate DES or file a complaint alleging actual violations with the Attorney General.

- Notices of potential violations and complaints must be submitted **in writing** and **under oath**.
- Notices of potential violations are investigated by the appropriate DES who makes a written determination whether a violation may exist.<sup>8</sup>
- Complaints are addressed by the Attorney General under separate procedures outlined in the Ethics Act.
- **These matters are confidential**, unless the subject waives confidentiality or the matter results in a public accusation.

## What Are The Procedures for Quarterly Reports?

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Designated ethics supervisors must submit copies of notices of potential violations received and the corresponding determinations to the Attorney General for review by the state ethics attorney as part of the quarterly report required by the Ethics Act.

- Reports are due in April, July, October and January for the preceding quarter.
- A sample report may be found on the Department of Law's ethics website.
- An executive director may file a quarterly report on behalf of the chair and combine it with his or her own report.
- If a board or commission does not meet during a quarter and there is no other reportable activity, the DES advises the Department of Law Ethics Attorney by e-mail at [ethicsreporting@alaska.gov](mailto:ethicsreporting@alaska.gov) and no other report is required.

If the state ethics attorney disagrees with a reported determination, the attorney will advise the DES of that finding. If the ethics attorney finds that there was a violation, the member who committed the violation is not liable if he or she fully disclosed all relevant facts reasonably necessary to the ethics supervisor's or commission's determination and acted consistent with the determination.

## How Does A DES or Board or Commission Get Ethics Advice?

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A DES or board or commission may make a **written request** to the Attorney General for an opinion regarding the application of the Ethics Act. In practice, the Attorney General, through the state ethics attorney, also provides **advice by phone or e-mail** to designated ethics supervisors, especially when time constraints prevent the preparation of timely written opinions.



- A request for advice and the advisory opinion are confidential.
- The ethics attorney endeavors to provide prompt assistance, although that may not always be possible.
- The DES must make his or her determination addressing the potential violation based on the opinion provided.

It is the obligation of each board or commission member, as well as the staff, to ensure that the public's business is conducted in a manner that is consistent with the standards set out in the Ethics Act. We hope this summary assists you in ensuring that your obligations are met.

<sup>1</sup> The Act covers a board, commission, authority, or board of directors of a public or quasi-public corporation, established by statute in the executive branch of state government.

<sup>2</sup> The governor has delegated the DES responsibility to Guy Bell, Administrative Director of the Office of the Governor.

<sup>3</sup> You may supplement the disclosure form with other written explanation as necessary. Your signature on a disclosure certifies that, to the best of your knowledge, the statements made are true, correct and complete. False statements are punishable.

<sup>4</sup> In most, but not all, situations, refraining from participation ensures that a violation of the Ethics Act does not occur. Abstention does not cure a conflict with respect to a significant direct personal or financial interest in a state grant, contract, lease or loan because the Ethics Act prohibition applies whether or not the public officer actually takes official action.

<sup>5</sup> The chair must give a copy of the written determination to the disclosing member. There is a determination form available on the Department of Law's ethics web page. The ethics supervisor may also write a separate memorandum.

<sup>6</sup> In this manner, a member's detailed personal and financial information may be protected from public disclosure.

<sup>7</sup> When a matter of particular sensitivity is raised and the ramifications of continuing without an advisory opinion from the Attorney General may affect the validity of the board or commission's action, the members should consider tabling the matter so that an opinion may be obtained.

<sup>8</sup> The DES provides a copy of the notice to the employee who is the subject of the notice and may seek input from the employee, his or her supervisor and others. The DES may seek advice from the Attorney General. A copy of the DES' written determination is provided to the subject employee and the complaining party. The DES submits a copy of both the notice and the determination to the Attorney General for review as part of the DES' quarterly report. If feasible,

the DES shall reassign duties to cure a potential violation or direct divestiture or removal by the employee of the personal or financial interests giving rise to the potential violation.

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The Attorney General and Department of Law staff may not provide legal advice to private citizens or organizations. 4. Division Update		
Brief Discussion:	The board welcomed Director Sylvan Robb to the meeting, who was in attendance to provide the board’s Division Update.	
Prov		
Brief Discussion:	Director Robb started a discussion regarding Prov, a vendor for online testing that the division already uses for other boarded programs, and a possible vendor for the board to use to provide examinations online instead of in-person. She informed the board that there is no cost for Prov to set up exams for administration, that the division would approve candidates to take the exam and the information they would need to register with Prov. She said the exams are in the neighborhood of \$75-\$90, and that Prov would invoice the division monthly for those who took exams. Mr. McCarthy asked if the prices would be the same for GMU exams and RGO exams, to which Chairman Bloomquist said that the board is only looking to do GMU exams online at the moment because there was still work to get the RGO exams online. Director Robb also informed the board that the GMU exams would be available year-round, instead of only twice a year, which is what the board was looking to do.	
Current Fiscal Report: FY25 3 <sup>rd</sup> /4 <sup>th</sup> Quarters & FY 26 1 <sup>st</sup> Quarter		
Brief Discussion:	Director Robb provided the board with their FY25 3 <sup>rd</sup> /4 <sup>th</sup> quarter fiscal reports, which came to a deficit for the fiscal year but ultimately came to an overall cumulative surplus. She reminded the board that their renewals at the end of 2025 would likely add a substantial surplus because of renewal licensing fees. She also provided the board with their FY26 1 <sup>st</sup> quarter fiscal report, which was right on track with their expected revenues/expenditures, and again came to a small deficit but ultimately came to an overall cumulative surplus.	
AO 360: Discussion w/ Director Robb		

**Brief Discussion:**

Director Robb provided an overview of Administrative Order 360, which was issued by Governor Mike Dunleavy on August 4th, 2025, to improve the quality, transparency, and efficiency of the state's regulatory environment. She said that all state entities in state government were charged to engage with the regulatory reform. She said that one of the requirements was stakeholder engagement. She said that the division held 16 hours of public meetings to gather input as well as the opportunity for written comment. She informed the board that they only received one written comment, which was from Chairman Bloomquist and was not specific to any regulation, but more the regulations process and allowing the board to move forward with their regulation projects. She informed the board that AO 360 requires all departments to have a plan in place by February 13th to reduce current regulations by 15% by the end of 2026 and 25% by the end of 2027. She informed the board that the reduction comes down to removing discretionary regulatory requirements that the board has adopted and does not apply to regulations that are mandates by state statutes, federal statutes or regulations, or orders issued by state or federal courts. She said that Mr. Bay has a baseline number that the board needs to get down to, which is included in a spreadsheet with specific regulations and how many discretionary requirements are included in each regulation. She said that partial credit is available for reducing regulatory burdens as well, such as reducing the number of training hours required for licensure. She informed the board that the deadline to have a plan in place is February 13, 2026. She informed them that they need to have a board approved spreadsheet that includes all of their reductions, and any regulation projects that they may have been working on, to the division by that date. The division will then send it to the Department of Law for review. If approved, all plans on the spreadsheet will move forward through the normal regulations process. Mr. Kunder said that it sounds like the board is creating more work for administration, with the board paying for their services, while not getting anything accomplished, such as their regulations project that was paused at the Department of Law. Chairman Bloomquist asked Director Robb who created the spreadsheet with the discretionary requirements, to which she said a small group within the division had. He asked her if that same small group could work on their regulation projects, so they do not take years to get through the regulations process. She said that the normal process for a regulations project is six months to a year and that the process is by design, so that new board members cannot come in and keep changing the regulations. She said that a much shorter process would not allow licensees to keep up with the rules they have to follow. She said that the Big Game Commercial Services Board sometimes takes longer because of the industry and that board members are in the field for a good amount of time throughout the year, which may slow down the process because the board cannot meet at certain times to move on to the next step in the regulations process. Chairman Bloomquist disagreed that a regulations project takes six months to a year, stated that it was a false statement, and criticized the process because the board has regulations that have been in the works for three to five years. He said that he would love to go through and remove discretionary requirements in regulation and asked if the changes regarding AO 360 would take just as long, to which Director Robb said that the goal is to follow the board's plan that gets approved at the Department of Law, and that it would follow the same regulations process. Mr. Kunder asked what happens if they do not have a plan by the February 13<sup>th</sup> deadline, to which Director Robb said that if the board is diligently working on the plan and realize they cannot make the deadline, they

	<p>can ask for an extension. He asked if AO 360 keeps the board from working on regulation projects, to which she said that any work on regulation projects would require a waiver. Chairman Bloomquist said that while he would like to work on AO 360, he did not think it was going to go anywhere anytime soon. He said that the board could work on the project, but that he would not be on the board much longer and that he had no intention of working on it. Mr. Bay reminded the board that the reason their large project that was paused at the Department of Law took so long to get there was because the board kept taking public comment during board meetings and changing or adding to the regulations. Every time a change is made the regulations have to go back to the regulations specialist for drafting and then back to the board for approval, which delays the process. Chairman Bloomquist said that was not entirely true because there were regulations in that project that had not been touched in years. He said that the board has always been told that they should combine their regulation projects to reduce the costs of their regulation projects and asked Director Robb if smaller regulation projects would move the process along quicker, to which she said that while larger regulation projects are good for licensees and the public, because all of the changes are in one place, smaller projects would likely move the process along quicker. Mr. Lorrington asked if their regulations project that was paused with the Department of Law was dead in the water, to which Director Robb said that they would need to add it to their spreadsheet to get it approved. If approved, it would continue through the regular regulations process. Mr. Bay asked Director Robb how other boards were working on AO 360, to which she said that multiple boards had created workgroups with the intent of meeting up as a whole board until they had a plan, while some boards were working on their own and meeting as a whole board until they had a plan. She said that the board can work on their plan at their own discretion and would need to make that decision at this meeting. Mr. Mumford said that he had been on the board in the past and that it has always taken a long time for regulations projects, but that they work at the pleasure of the governor and that they need to be patient because that is the nature of the board. With nothing left, the board thanked Director Robb for her time.</p>
<b>5. BOG Update</b>	
<b>Brief Discussion:</b>	<p>Mr. Lorrington, the Board of Game (BOG) representative on the board, provided the board with an update. He said that the next BOG meeting would be in Wrangell, with a work session on January 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2026, and a board meeting January 23<sup>rd</sup>-27<sup>th</sup>, 2026. He said the next meeting would be in Kodiak, March 20<sup>th</sup>-25<sup>th</sup>, 2026. He said that comments on proposals for the Wrangell meeting are due by January 9<sup>th</sup> and the comments on proposals for the Kodiak meeting are due by March 6<sup>th</sup>. He said that they received a complaint regarding websites not being updated with the new BOG requirements regarding mountain goat hunters and non-resident moose hunters. Mr. Bay said that the board had already discussed this and it was on their website in September 2025. Mr. Lorrington said that the BGCSB agenda change request regarding 19C being the pilot program for the Guide Concession Program and that he was conflicted out of participating in the discussion/vote and it was denied. Mr. Boniek said that he was at the BOG meeting and it was his opinion that it felt like nobody wanted to deal with the GCP and that it did not receive the merit it should have. He asked when the next time the discussion could come up, to which Mr. Lorrington said it would likely be January 2027. Chairman Bloomquist suggested that the BOG member on the board should be recused from discussions on the pilot program so that</p>

<b>6. Public Comment</b>	
<b>Brief Discussion: On Record: 10:40 a.m.</b>	The board began public comment.
<b>Dan Montgomery</b>	<p>Dan Montgomery, an MGO, said that the board was not enforcing the UVC code requirement that a licensee be registered in a GUA the year they apply a hunter in the ADF&amp;G permit drawing and the year the permit is valid for. He said that people are illegally getting permits because of this. He asked if the board was going to do anything about it, to which Chairman Bloomquist said that he thought the issue had already been dealt with, and asked what Mr. Montgomery would do. Mr. Montgomery said that the board should pull any issued permits to invalid UVC codes being used. Chairman Bloomquist said that the board does not have authority to pull permits and that only ADF&amp;G does. Mr. Montgomery said that staff receives a spreadsheet from ADF&amp;G to confirm UVC codes for winning permits and that they can inform ADF&amp;G of bad UVC codes, at which time the permits can be pulled. Mr. Kunder asked if the board could assess a fine or sanction licensees that use bad UVC codes, to which Chairman Bloomquist said he thinks they should. Mr. Bay said that this discussion had already happened at a previous board meeting. He said that the regulation is going to have to be amended because the regulation, <b>12 AAC 75.260(d)</b>, states, "Unique verification codes will be current until the associated guide use area registration expires or is withdrawn or amended," which is why he had been telling RGOs that they can use their previous codes as long as their registration had not expired. He reminded the board that one of their intended regulation projects included fixing this problem. Chairman Bloomquist said that the original intent of the regulation was to only use a UVC code if an RGO was registered in the year of the permit application deadline and the year the permit is good for, and that they should move forward that way. Mr. Bay said that any applications showing up this year that were on the tail end of a registration were being told to reregister, so the issue shouldn't affect too many people moving forward. With nothing left to discuss, the board thanked Mr. Montgomery for his time.</p>
<b>Mark Richards</b>	<p>Mark Richards, Executive Director of the Resident Hunters of Alaska (RHAK), said that he thought there was a lot of confusion at the BOG ACR meeting. He said that RHAK had opposed ACR 2 because it did not comply with the statute that a GCP proposal must be heard in the region where it would be implemented. He said that AAG Kimberly said there was uncoded language in what was SB189 that became SB97, and that the board did not have to consider a GCP in the region where it would be implemented. He said there was a lot of confusion on whether the program was funded based on the fiscal note that was in SB97. He said that SB97 allows a guide to have three guide concession areas and three federal areas and that the board should look into it. He said that he talked with DNR and that only one person was going to be working with the first GCP project, that there was a hiring freeze, and that it would be three to five years before anything was implemented. He added that because there is no pilot program in 19C, after the BOG denied implementation of ACR 2, the BOG will probably receive multiple GCP proposals for problem areas of the interior for the May 1<sup>st</sup> deadline for the 2027 interior region</p>

	<p>proposals. He said that the first approved GCP has to be implemented for at least three years before any other GCPs could be created and was not sure how the BGCSB wanted the BOG to deal with it. He said that he continues to be amazed that the BGCSB cannot prevent someone with felonies to receive a license. Chairman Bloomquist said that he agreed with him but that their attorneys have told the board that they have to issue the licenses. Mr. Kunder assured Mr. Richards that the board has discussed this issue for multiple hours and only issued the licenses after direction from the Department of Law. Mr. Richards informed the board that he had been receiving a lot of phone calls about airboats dropping hunters off on rivers and congesting the area to the point that there were camps right next to each other. With nothing left to discuss, the board thanked Mr. Richards for his time.</p>
<b>Steve Perrins II</b>	<p>Mr. Perrins II, an MGO, said that he was under the impression that RGOs are supposed to use their UVC codes to put their clients in the drawing and not hand them out to clients so that they can put themselves in the drawing. He asked if it was possible for the applications to be reviewed prior to being drawn, so they can assure that everyone in the drawing is legal and that there are no legal issues later on down the road between clients being drawn and RGOs not having an authorized UVC code. He also said that felons are not legally allowed to be in the field so they should not be able to hold a license and that the board should challenge it in court. Mr. Bay informed him that ADF&amp;G does not have a system set up that prevents unauthorized UVC codes at the time of application and that he reviews a spreadsheet of winning permit holders to confirm or deny the UVC codes. He said that he spoke with them about possibly getting a system setup that would prevent unauthorized UVC codes at the time of application but was not sure if it was implemented for the 2025 draw application deadline. He also said that the board had previously discussed UVC codes being provided to clients and that the board's advice was for RGOs to put their own clients in the drawings and at the end of the day they were responsible for usage of those codes. The board agreed with Mr. Perrins II that a person with a felony is not legally allowed to be in the field with a client but that the Department of Law has sided with applicants in the past, as long as they do not fall under the eligibility circumstances in <b>AS 08.54.605</b>. With nothing left to discuss, the board thanked Mr. Perrins II for his time.</p>
<b>Coke Wallace</b>	<p>Coke Wallace, an MGO, said that the UVC code system should be simplified and that if the board is not going to enforce it that they should just get rid of it. He said that if the GCP is not created and used soon it is not going to matter because of the decline of resources in the field. He said the resource are suffering and nobody is doing anything about it. He said that ADF&amp;G should have the courage and fortitude to tell the BGCSB and BOG that the resources are suffering and that things need to slow down. He asked Mr. Mumford and Mr. Lorrington, both previous wildlife troopers, what their interpretations were regarding the limits and capabilities of a helicopter in support of a commercial hunting operation. Mr. Mumford's interpretation was that a helicopter should not be used in any manner in support of a commercial hunting operation. Mr. Lorrington said that a big theme of the recent APHA meeting was to get to know your local wildlife trooper and suggested that he reach out to one of them because he had retired as a wildlife trooper for a long time. AWT Trooper Dan Valentine was in attendance at the meeting. The board welcomed him into the conversation. He said that AWT tried to get the BOG to define 'gear' to deal with these types of issues, but they decided against it. He said that the biggest hangup the Department of Law has is being able to differentiate whether or not the gear being</p>

	transported by a helicopter is for hunting or lodging, even though people were being lodged to go hunting. Without a clear definition of 'gear,' he said that it is very difficult to charge people for using a helicopter. Mr. Kunder said that if the sole purpose of the cabin is to go hunting then it is clear that it is a violation. Mr. Perrins II said that the board should be able to use the professional ethics standards for guides regulations to prosecute people who use helicopters for hunting purposes. With nothing left to discuss, the board thanked Mr. Wallace for his time.
<b>Cash Joyce</b>	Cash Joyce, an RGO, said that Article 8, sections 1-3, of the Alaska Constitution, include Statement of Policy, General Authority, and Common Use is all based on maximum yield. Section 4 is Sustained Yield, which establishes the mandate for natural resource management based on the sustained yield principle. He said that with the increasing demand for game sustained yield should be just as important as maximum yield or the state is going to have a major problem with wildlife moving forward. Lastly, he said that there was a registered guide-outfitter who went onto private land, used the private strip and a private cabin to conduct commercial services, something that should never happen. With nothing left to discuss, the board thanked Mr. Joyce for his time.
<b>7. HR/TAR Presentation</b>	
<b>Brief Discussion:</b>	Mr. Bay provided a presentation of the board's new system to request and submit hunt records and transporter activity reports online. He said that instructions for the process can be found on the front page of the BGCSB website. He went through the instructions and showed the process for both requesting and submitting hunt records. Chairman Bloomquist asked that licensees start using the system because it helps staff from spending so much time on them.
<b>8. Probation Report</b>	
<b>Brief Discussion:</b>	Senior Investigator Jennifer Summers provided the board's probation report, which was for the period of October 1, 2025, through December 4, 2025. She informed the board that there were 31 licensees on probation, four of which were out of compliance, and one of which was suspended. One licensee had been released from probation since their last report. Chairman Bloomquist thought John Walker, the individual who was released from probation, was on suspension. Mr. Bay confirmed that Mr. Walker's license was is suspended status.
<b>9. Investigative Report</b>	
<b>Brief Discussion:</b>	The board's investigator, Lee Strout, provided the board with their investigative report, which was for the period of July 8, 2025, through December 5, 2025. He informed the board that there were 72 open cases and that 22 were closed since their last report. Chairman Bloomquist asked if there were any trends with violations since their last report, to which he said that GUA registration violations kept coming up. With nothing left to discuss, the board decided to enter into executive session to discuss investigative matters.

Characters must be formed by solid lines  $\frac{1}{6}$  as thick as the character is high in accordance with CFR 14. Part 45 Subpart C.

(b) Any vessel or boat used by a guide or transporter shall be marked with an activity identification decal.

(1) Decal must be clearly displayed on each side of the vessel. They do not have to be permanently affixed to the vessel; they can be placed on plexiglass, plywood, or metal for easy placement and removal.

(2) For each vessel required to display an identification sticker, a set will be provided by the division, one for each side of the vessel to be placed in an unobstructed location easily visible.

(3) Services provided under registered guide-outfitter statutes require identification decals yellow in color.

(4) Services provided under transporter statutes require identification decals red in color.

(5) Identification decals which become worn or discolored shall be replaced at a fee established by the board through the division.

(6) Decal is not intended to be tracked by vessel, therefore, a set of decals can be utilized for multiple vessels or boats.

(7) For a person who possess both a transporter and guide license, the color of decal should be used for whichever is the majority of the overall service being provided.

(8) A temporary printable decal is authorized upon notification of change to the division.

12 AAC 75.440 is amended by adding two new subsections to read:

(e) if permitted to advertise or sell big game transportation services under AS 08.54, a transporter may not advertise or sell big game transportation services to be conducted solely on tidelands; a transporter may not provide big game transportation services on tidelands or below mean high water mark in fresh water, except on those tidelands and below mean high water mark lands that are immediately adjacent to uplands on which the transporter's clients are legally permitted to hunt.

(f) in this section "tidelands" has the meaning given in AS 38.05.965.

**12 AAC 75.455 Helicopter Use** (a) A licensee or entity holding any type of license issued by the board for the provision of services in the state under the terms of AS 08 54 and this chapter is prohibited from the use of a helicopter in any manner for the purposes of providing, assisting, or enabling those services.

(a) A licensed transporter may, under AS 08.54.650(b), provide overnight accommodations to big game hunters on a boat with permanent living quarters located on salt water. In providing this service, the transporter

(1) may only provide overnight accommodations to clients and crew up to the number of people intended to be accommodated in permanent berths as available on the boat;

(2) shall ensure that a captain is onboard the boat while clients are either onboard the boat or in the field. For the purposes of this section, any boat used to transport clients to and from the shore must be operated by a captain. There must also be a licensed captain that remains on the larger boat during the transportation of clients to and from shore.

(b) for the purposes of AS 08.54.650(b) “boat with permanent living quarters” means a boat that has

(1) permanent berths intended exclusively for sleeping that are immovable, and not contained in a detachable pod, container, or other structure;

(2) a head that contains a toilet, shower and sink appropriate for daily bathing and sanitation; and

(3) a galley that includes a permanently installed cook stove, dining area, refrigerator, and sink with hot running water large enough for sanitation for the intended occupancy of the boat.

(c) for the purposes of this section “captain” means a minimum of US Coast Guard license as an Operator of Uninspected Passenger Vessel.

## 12/10-11/24 Meeting Minutes Excerpt for New Regulations Project

3. UVC Sharing	
<b>Brief Discussion:</b>	Chairman Bloomquist said that there was some confusion on whether or not an agent of an RGO could put the clients of that RGO into the annual hunting permit drawing, thru ADF&G, using their Unique Verification Code (UVC). He said that there were some different interpretations of it over the years and that the division needed some clarification. Technically, he said, that UVC codes belong to the RGO and should not be shared with clients. He said that there had been cases in the past where a client would use an RGO's UVC code on an application for an agreed upon area, but that the client would also use the code for other areas and then shop a winning draw permit to guides in those areas. Mr. Boniek asked what the original intent of the UVC was. Chairman Bloomquist said that it was to not have a client applying in an area outside of an agreed area that they had with an RGO. He said that the regulation states, "Unique verification codes can only be utilized by the contracting registered or master guide who is applying clients for a drawing hunt permit." He suggested going to public comment to get opinions on the topic.
4. Public Comment	
<b>Brief Discussion:</b>	Mr. Bay created a list of attendees that wanted to provide public comment. The board began public comment.
<b>Jason Bunch</b>	Jason Bunch, an RGO, began his testimony on the UVC code issue. He said that the original intent of the UVC code was to ensure an RGO was the person using the code and entering their clients in the drawing. That ensured that an RGO would have a contract with a client and that the RGO knew the people he was putting into the draw were the people he was communicating with. At that time, he said there were a lot of communication issues regarding booking agents applying clients into a draw on behalf of an RGO, but that the RGO had never actually talked to the client, so there were a lot of breach of contract type scenarios where the guide promised things that he did not actually promise. It was the booking agent who had promised them. He said that a long time ago, before the UVC code, nonhunters applied people in the draw in hopes of saving an animal because they never planned on sending hunters into the field. He said that the UVC code was created to show that there is an agreement between an RGO and a client, including a written contract between each of them, so that the permits go to the correct people who draw them. He said that the UVC code was also created as an easy way to audit the drawing, to ensure that all nonresidents applied in the drawing have a guide-client agreement in place and not throwing a wrench in the system. He said that, while he does not think the board has a leg to stand on regarding an agent acting on an RGO's behalf and using a UVC code to submit an application in the drawing, it was not the intent for it to happen. With nothing left, the board thanked Mr. Bunch for his testimony.
<b>Dan Montgomery</b>	Dan Montgomery, an MGO, said that he had a client who applied himself in the drawing and then sent him a guide-client contract. He said that the client put his guide license number as the UVC code, and it accepted the application. His understanding was that the

	<p>draw permit, if pulled, would be thrown out. He said that the board has issued permits for the last five years to people who were not signed up for the area for the hunt year. He said that the board should not be telling people that they can use the same UVC code if they are not signed up for the following year. He said that the board also let people sign up for areas after they had drawn permits. He said that it should not be allowed and that everybody should have to follow the same rules. Chairman Bloomquist said that his interpretation of the regulation was that people could not receive or use a UVC code unless they were who are “registered in a guide use area located in the hunt area the year the application is made and the years the permit is valid,” per <b>12 AAC 75.260(d)</b>. Mr. Bay said that the regulation is going to have to be amended because it also says that UVC codes are good until they expire, are withdrawn or amended, which is why he had been telling RGOs that they can use their previous codes as long as their registration had not expired. Chairman Bloomquist asked Mr. Bunch, the previous chairman of the board, if he had any information on the topic. Mr. Bunch said that the regulation needs amended. He said that another portion of the regulation reads as, “Unique verification codes will be current until the associated guide use area registration expires or is withdrawn or amended,” which means that someone on the backend of a registration could technically still use their UVC codes from the previous year because their registration had not yet expired. He said that it is a loophole until the regulation is amended. The board understood his explanation. Chairman Bloomquist said that he already has a way to amend the regulation and that they would address it at a later time. With nothing left to discuss, the board thanked Mr. Hedrich for his testimony.</p>
<b>Dick Rohrer</b>	<p>Dick Rohrer, an MGO, began testimony on the UVC code issue. He said that it originally came out of Kodiak, and was originally called a guide-client agreement, which the staff in Kodiak checked to make sure any nonresident applications for brown bear permits included proper registration. He cautioned any guides from giving out their UVC codes. With nothing left to discuss, the board thanked Mr. Rohrer for his testimony.</p>
<b>Derrick Campbell</b>	<p>Derrick Campbell, an RGO, said that one of the hot topics in all the meetings lately has been state land guide concessions. He said that something that is helpful and often overlooked for guides and clients is keeping the process for becoming a registered guide-outfitter as rigorous as possible. He said that there have been record numbers of RGO applicants recently and that while it is good for the board’s budget it is not good for the industry. He believes that the board’s budget would still be in a good position with a high number of assistant guides. He said that he felt a great accomplishment when he received his RGO license and that the board should hold that type of license on a high pedestal. He suggested the board move back to requiring five successful species-specific guided hunts of an animal in order to guide for them and that he’s against oral boards, especially if applicants do not have to travel to Alaska. He suggested taking away the open-book material of the RGO written exam, bringing back the 125 days in the field experience requirement, and requiring an assistant guide to have three years of experience. He said that the amount of client recommendations required for getting an RGO license should also be raised. Chairman Bloomquist clarified that the board still requires 125 days in the field experience and for an assistant guide having three years of experience.</p> <p>On the UVC code issue, he said that the board’s website says, “UVC’s are confidential and guides are encouraged to register their hunters in the drawings to protect themselves from</p>

	violating AS 08.54.720 Unlawful Acts.” He said that he has never shared his UVC codes but would like to have some assurance that he will not get in any trouble for doing so. With nothing left to discuss, the board thanked Mr. Campbell for his testimony.
<b>Matt Snyder</b>  <b>Off Record: 10:40 a.m.</b>	Matt Snyder, an MGO, began testimony on the UVC code issue. He said that he thinks nonresidents should be able to apply themselves into the drawing because it takes a lot of time to apply clients, especially when you have a large number of them. Chairman Bloomquist said that unfortunately Mr. Snyder was in an area where it pays to have more clients in the drawing, which requires a lot of foot work. With nothing left to discuss, the board thanked Mr. Snyder for his time. The board took a break.

<b>New Regulation Project: 12 AAC 75.260(d)</b>	
<b>Brief Discussion:</b>	<p>Chairman Bloomquist said that they needed to amend <b>12 AAC 75.260(d)</b> because of the UVC code issue they discussed earlier. He suggested amending the second to last sentence in the regulation to read as the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Unique verification codes will be current until the day before the first day of the Alaska Department of Fish and Game drawing application period in the year the associated guide use area registration expires or is withdrawn or amended.</li> </ul> <p>This would fix the UVC code issue they currently have with RGOs being able use a UVC code in their final year of registration without actually being registered in the unit the following year. The board agreed with the change.</p>
<b>Motion:</b>	<p>Move to initiate a regulations project regarding an amendment to <b>12 AAC 75.260(d)</b> by approving the following language for public comment, unless substantive changes are made by the regulations specialist or Department of Law:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>A contracting registered or master guide who is signing the hunt contract, and who intends to apply a client for a drawing hunt permit for a hunt conducted under regulations required under AS 16.05, shall obtain a unique verification code for each guide use area in which a unique verification code is required from the department before entering an application for the client. Brief Discussion:	<p>Chairman Bloomquist said that there might be a way around requiring the board to do in-person practical exams by changing the exam requirements written in regulation. He said that nothing in the board’s statutes or regulations states that the practical exam has to be in-person and that it can be a written exam. He asked Mr. Bunch, who was running the exams workgroup, if he had any ideas on the topic. Mr. Bunch said that the board has to first look at the board’s statutes, which requires the board to prepare and grade an exam and provide for administration of an examination but does not establish the board’s authority for prerequisites of an examination, which can be written in regulation. He said that the regulation covering what an RGO examination applicant must pass, <b>12 AAC 75.110(a)(1)</b>, requires passage of a qualification examination, which includes a practical examination, which must cover the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>A. Trophy judging of actual antlers and horns</li><li>B. Aging of animals</li><li>C. Sexing of mountain goats and bears</li><li>D. Caping a big game animal; for this portion of the examination, the applicant must provide a visual recording of the applicant caping a big gam animal.</li></ul> <p>He said that the workgroup’s suggestion is to repeal <b>12 AAC 75.110(a)(1)(A)</b>, the trophy judging of actual antlers and horns requirement, and instead replace it with a prerequisite requirement for an applicant to have an official measurer certification from SCI or Boone and Crockett under <b>12 AAC 75.100(a)(1)</b>. The board took a break and would be getting a quick update from the APHA before moving forward with this discussion.</p>
