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Agenda Item - Review Meeting Minutes:

The board reviewed draft meeting minutes for the November 30 – December 2, 2020 meeting held by the board which was held via Zoom in light of the COVID-19 pandemic. Ms. Hoffard informed the board that there was 1 correction to be noted in the draft before them; the draft references the "Castle" case which should be the "Cassell" case.

In a motion duly made by Adam Trombley, seconded by Ely Cyrus with unanimous consent, it was resolved to approve the November 30 -December 2, 2020 meeting minutes as amended.

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Agenda Item - Annual Report:

The board discussed the annual report as required yearly. The report reflects the work completed by the board over the past year as well as setting goals and objectives for the coming fiscal year. Any potential expenditures should also be noted in the annual report such as travel. Chair Bunch proposed adding an expenditure of up to \$6000 per fiscal year for travel for the investigator, Lee Strout, to complete in the field travel with applicable state agencies such as the Alaska Wildlife Troopers. Investigator Strout is to report on the field travel during the board's annual meeting held in November/December. The board also anticipates holding face-to-face meeting in fiscal year 2022; the winter meeting in Anchorage and spring meeting to be held in Fairbanks.

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Chair Bunch will draft the narrative statement. Mr. Bloomquist and Chair Bunch will draft goals and objectives based on the guides; Mr. Flores and Mr. Boniek will draft goals and objectives based on transporters. The drafts will be combined by Ms. Hoffard and submitted to the board via OnBoard for voting prior to the division deadline.

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In a motion duly made by Aaron Bloomquist, seconded by Pete Buist with unanimous consent, it was resolved to adopt the budget proposals as outlined for the Fiscal Year 2022 annual report. Agenda Item - Division Update/Fiscal Report:

Administrative officer Melissa Dumas joined the meeting to provide the division update and review the fee analysis in advance of upcoming renewal. Mrs. Dumas reviewed the Fiscal Year 2021 2nd quarter fiscal report. The program has received \$175,685 in revenue for FY2021. Investigations expenditures so far for this year were \$73, 244 and non-investigative expenditures were \$65,434 for a total of \$211,193 in expenditures. Therefore, the program ended the quarter with a surplus of \$334, 726. Fiscal year 2021 is a non-renewal year and the surplus will be used to cover the expenditures of the program through the renewals in Fiscal

Mrs. Dumas reviewed the fee analysis with the board and Mr. Rohr's previous comment regarding the annual filing fee was brought to her attention. The board discussed the various fees associated with the program. Staff had suggested that the fee for the game management unit exams be reduced to be more reflective of the time and effort administering the exam takes. The board expressed concerns of the division reducing fees too soon when they may not have a clear picture of what expenses may be. At this time the two licensing staff members they have are not fully charging time to the Big Game Commercial Services program and there are a variety of factors that will impact the current budget of the program.

 In a motion duly made by Aaron Bloomquist, seconded by Pete Buist with unanimous consent, it was resolved to recommend to the division and Director Chambers that the only fee adjustment for the Big Game Commercial Services Board be a reduction in the fee for the Game Management Unit examination/reexamination fee. The suggested reduction is 50 %, making the proposed fee \$200 per examination.

The board thanked Mrs. Dumas for joining them to discuss the fiscal report and fee analysis.

Agenda Item - Public Comment:

Kurt Whitehead, Master Guide GUIM211. Opposed to L. Kronberger's proposal to amend 12 AAC 75.240, doesn't feel the requirements should be reduced. Supports more education and more discipline.

Aaron Frenzel, Captain Alaska Wildlife Troopers. Spoke to Ms. Heun's proposal to amend 12 AAC 75.450(b)(13). Persons are exempt from licensing if providing accommodations at a permanent structure on property they own; however, accommodations has never been defined and the board may want to consider what accommodations is. Issues may occur when items provided at the permanent structure are then taken into the field crossing the lines from what is allowed for transporters into what is allowed for guides. There may also be variances for marine transporters.

182	Mark Richards, Executive Director - Resident Hunters of Alaska. Wanted to make a brief
183	comment in regard to the issue of game processing equipment. Following Nov/Dec meeting
184	contacted several transporters and let the know of the discussion regarding legality of vacuum
185	sealers; recommended they remove them from their websites and stop offering that service.

197	asked if the division would accept 3 rd party request for contacts as some in attendance at the

Agenda Item - Public Comment: 308 Aaron Frenzel, Captain Alaska Wildlife Troopers – declined to comment at this time. 309 310 311 Lance Kronberger, Master Guide GUIM221. Spoke in support of his proposal to amend 12 AAC 312 75.240, supervision in efforts to clean up the program regulations. Volunteered to serve on a sub-committee if the board decides to form one to look at this issue. 313 314 315 Albert Williams – was not on the line 316 Kurt Whitehead – was not on the line 317 318 Mark Richards, Executive Director - Resident Hunters of Alaska. Had previously requested 319 transporters to be removed from the requirements of the proposed professional development 320 requirement and would like the transporter sub-committee to take that topic up to further 321 discuss the issue. Supports Ms. Heun's proposal to amend 12 AAC 75.450(b)(13). 322 323 324 Rich Young, Private property owner in support of Mr. Danfords proposal for a regulation for buffer areas. Stated he has regular conflicts in the fields with local guides and would like to see 325 326 the board take action to address this issue. 327 Henry Tiffany, Master Guide GUIM144. Not in support of Mr. Petersons proposal to amend 12 328 329 AAC 75.460. Appreciates Mr. Danfords position but reminded the board they had been advised by Department of Law that they do not have the authority to establish buffer areas. Supports 330 Ms. Heun's proposal to amend 12 AAC 75.450(b)(13). Feels that Mr. Kronberger's proposal to 331 amend 12 AAC 75.240 has merit but recommends the board move it to a sub-committee for 332 333 additional review. Fully supports the proposed professional development regulations. 334 335 Dan Montgomery, Master Guide GUIM173. Could support Mr. Peterson's proposal to amend 336 12 AAC 75.460; that would be a lot of field experience but would recommend changing it to add 337 at least one guided hunt to the draft language. Does not support Mr. Danford's proposal; feels that 5 square miles is too large of a buffer area. Disagrees with Mr. Kronberger's proposal as 338 currently written. 339 340 Zach Decker, Registered Guide GUIR1263. Supports Mr. Peterson's proposal but it needs to be modified to include a guided hunt. Feels that Ms. Heun's proposal covers a grey area in 342 regulations. Asked the board to look at how buffer areas would affect guides in Southeast 343 Alaska before considering Mr. Danford's proposal; 5 square mile buffer areas could potentially 344 345

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eliminate numerous guiding opportunities in the region. Supports the exam portion of the proposed professional development regulations but has some issues with the portions for Master Guides.

Agenda Item - Regulations Proposal(s), New proposals:

The board discussed each of the five proposals before them and considered the comments submitted by the public so far throughout the meeting. Before discussion began, Chair Bunch reminded the board members that no action would be taken on any of the proposals 3/24/2021; there is an agenda items scheduled for 3/25/2021 for that. The intent is to allow for the board to hear any and all oral comments prior to making any decisions to take action on the proposals.

A. <u>N. Peterson; Amend 12 AAC 75.460 to add the requirement of having personally harvested a minimum of three (3) for that species.</u>

Mr. Bloomquist and Mr. Buist brought up points regarding the validity of having the species-specific requirement at all and then focused the discussion on caribou being included in the five species that have additional requirements for registered guides.

B. <u>F. Danford; AS 08.54.720 addition of a 5-square mile buffer area/boundary around permanent year around lodgers in Guide Use Area 13-02.</u>

Chair Bunch reminded the board that per advice from the Department of Law the board does not have the authority to establish regulations regarding property. The board's authority lies with enforcing the ethical practices of the guides and transporters licensed by the program.

C. M. Heun; Amend 12 AAC 75.450(b)(10) and (13). (b)(10) is correction of a typo "filed" should be "field"; (b)(13) removes "game processing"

Ms. Hoffard informed the board that the proposed amendment for (b)(10) is not needed; the typo is only found in the on-line version of the regulations; division staff will make the necessary correction. The board as a whole supports the intent of the amendment for (b)(13) as it helps prevent potential waste of the animals harvested.

D. <u>L. Kronberger; Amend 12 AAC 75.240 to allow a Master Guide to supervise a non-contracting registered guide certified in the game management unit to conduct/guide a hunt from anywhere in the state of Alaska as long as the contracting Master Guide is as</u>

follows: in the field conducting hunts in another of his GUA's and is having daily communication with the non-contracting registered guide who is conducting/quiding the hunt. The non-contracting registered guide must be accompanying and personally guiding the client.

The board recognizes inconsistency between statutes and regulations regarding supervision and after brief discussion decided this proposal would best be handled in a sub-committee for further scrutiny. The sub-committee will draft additional language and consult with the Department of Law through Ms. Hoffard with results to be provided at the Nov-Dec 2021 board meeting.

E. <u>Professional Development Sub-Committee</u>; provide a new section of regulation providing for professional development of licensee holders of the program. This amendment was drafted in sub-committee meeting held January-February 2021.

The board held a brief discussion regarding the proposal; they support the draft proposed by the sub-committee and are interested in what the public has to say about the proposed language moving forward.

Agenda Item - Public Comment:

Michelle Heun, License Transporter GUIT1063. Recommended the board seek to amend AS 08.54.591, membership of the board. Historically it has been difficult to fill both private landholder seats, she recommends the board seek to have that seat changed to either a licensed Assistant Guide or licensed Class-A Assistant Guide. Assistant and Class-A Assistant Guides hold the majority of the licenses for the program and should be represented on the board in her opinion.

Ben Gilles, Registered Guide GUIR1293. Supports Mr. Kronberger's proposal to amend supervision regulation; also supports the professional development proposal. Was surprised when reviewing the list of violations and hopes education leads to reduction in fee in the future.

Zach Decker, Registered Guide GUIR1263. Supports Mr. Peterson's proposal; suggests the board consider eliminating the random animal selection portion of the practical examination and upgrade the testing program. Had questions regarding Ms. Heun's proposal – how would this differ from fishing regulations regarding mutilating the animal beyond recognition.

Kurt Whitehead, Master Guide GUIM211. Not in support of any proposal to loosen the guide requirements for the industry.

Chris Zwolinski, Master Guide GUIM145. Does not agree with removing the species-specific requirements from regulation.

Dick Rohr, Master Guide GUIM69. Species-specific regulation was adopted in 2006 and was intended to raise the professionalism of the industry; feels it should be left in place. Cautioned the board to carefully consider any changes that would require statute changes as that often leads to unintended consequences.

 Lance Kronberger, Master Guide GUIM221. His proposal to amend supervision regulation is not intended for a statute change but feels the species-specific regulation is invalid and could go with supervision. Feels there is some merit for master guides to have special opportunities.

George Siavelis, Master Guide GUIM150. Supports the proposal for professional development and feels it should apply to transporters. Ongoing education could reduce the number of investigations and ensure everyone knows what is and is not allowed. Sympathizes with Mr. Danford but feels it isn't realistic to have the 5-mile buffer area based on mining operations and other permanent structures. Thinks it is a good idea for transporters to be allowed processing equipment on their boats, private lodges and homes so the clients don't have to bring things with them to Alaska.

Al Barrette, Class-A Assistant Guide GUIC765. Is a Board of Game member but is not representing the Board of Game at this meeting. Fully supports Ms. Heun's proposal, salvage of meat is the highest priority. If the proposal doesn't move forward he feels the board should define what "game processing equipment" is – plastic bags, gloves, aprons, etc. Unless Mr. Peterson's proposal receives unanimous support is not in favor; not sure all personally harvested animals grant experience needed for guiding hunts. Not sure if the online exams found on the Fish and Game website will actually provide education being sought with professional development proposal but would support if the meeting attendance requirement could be met via Zoom or teleconference.

Ms. Hoffard stated for the record that at a minimum a teleconference line is available at all board meetings so that members of the public in rural communities can call in to listen to the meetings; it is the intention of the division to continue that moving forward.

Aaron Frenzel, Captain Alaska Wildlife Troopers answered some clarifying question board members had regarding game processing and Ms. Heun's proposal to amend 12 AAC 75.450(b)(13).

Mark Richards, Executive Director - Resident Hunters of Alaska. Supports Mr. Danford's proposal as he considers it to be an ethical issue not a property issue. Fully supports Mr. Heun's proposal and the intent behind it. Supports professional development but does not think it should apply to air taxi transporters based on the continuing education already required to maintain their pilots license.

Anna Deal; private citizen. Family owns and lives in remote cabin in the western Alaskan range. Called in to voice support for Mr. Danford's proposal for 5-mile buffer area. Conflicts between

481 her family and local guides have increased in the past few years and are becoming increasingly 482 tense. Numerous negative encounters with guides competing for the same animals inside their 483 own camp. Encounters have ranged from heated verbal altercations to guides driving ATV's 484 through the camp right next to tents; flying low and circling when on stock with youths; setting up many non-permanent structures and then leaving tarps, out-house buckets and garbage 485 when leaving. Overall, poor stewardship of the land in general. 486 487 488 The board strongly encouraged Ms. Deal to contact Investigator Strout and file complaints, 489 Captain Frenzel also encouraged Ms. Deal to contact her local Wildlife Trooper. Ms. Deal asked 490 for Inv. Strout's contact information and Ms. Hoffard stated she had emailed that to her.

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Agenda Item – APHA Economic Impact Study 2020

Bob Koenitzer of McKinley Research Group, LLC presented a summary of the economic impact study completed by APHA based on data collected in 2019. The guide industry directly employed 1,380 people and circulated \$57.4 million in the Alaska economy as labor income and spending for good and services. Data showed 59% of guide spending occurs in rural areas of Alaska in the form of wages, air transportation, fuel, food, and supplies. An estimated 223,500 pounds of game meat was shared with Alaskans by guides and guided hunters in 2019; 167,600 pounds shared with rural residents and 55,900 pounds shared with urban residents. The estimated value of replacing the shared meat with beef is \$2.3 million, that breaks down to \$1.8 million for rural communities and \$447,000 in urban areas. Recipients include Native communities, elders, needy families with children, traditional food programs, and those who enjoy game meat but can no longer hunt. Game meat is nutritionally and culturally rich and is an important part of many Alaskans' diet. \$9.7 million in total of Alaska Department of Fish and Game Wildlife Fund revenue was generated by guided and unguided visiting hunter purchases of licenses and big game tags. In 2019, through fees collected by the Fish and Game Fund, resident and non-resident hunters provided \$12.8 million (27%) of the ADF&G Division of Wildlife's \$47.1 million budget. Fish and Game funds are used to leverage Pittman-Robertson

funds which totaled \$20.7 million in 2019. Combined, Fish and Game Fund and Pittman-Robertson funds generated 71% of Division of Wildlife expenditures in 2019. Nonresidents spent \$700 on hunting licenses/tags on average, compared with \$35 among Alaska residents. Guided nonresident hunters generated even more on average, at \$1,237 per hunter.

Agenda Item - State and Federal Agency Updates

Alaska Department of Fish & Game (F&G): Commissioner Douglas Vincent-Lang, Director of Wildlife Conservation Eddie Grasser, and Assistant Director Tony Kavalok a provided an update from F&G. The department is closely monitoring events as they unfold to anticipate actions by the new federal administration in regard to gun control. They are evaluating their budget and working to spend the Pittman-Robertson funds received as those funds can only be used for certain expenditures. F&G has been working on projects to increase revenue over the past year due to COVID-19 and feels they are on the right track. They are optimistic that with the availability of vaccines that by 2022 some, if not the majority, of hunting, guiding and fishing will resume in Alaska.

 Alaska Wildlife Troopers – Captain Aaron Frenzel joined the meeting to provide a brief update from the troopers. The troopers have 89 funded positions statewide that are currently all filled. There are 4 troopers that will be retiring this spring which will result in vacancies but there will be a spring academy to try and fill those spots. There are some new troopers out in the field, he encouraged guides to meet with the new troopers. The troopers did a division wide communication push – many troopers reached out to guides and transporters this past fall to work on building working relationships and open channels of communication with the industry. Captain Frenzel felt that effort was successful and is something he will continue to push from the troopers. Enforcement – so far nothing too major is trending, mostly guide use area issues that will hopefully start declining. He mentioned his attendance at the meeting on 3/24/21 to discuss the sub-committee for supervision and the regulations proposals considered by the board. If it is not possible for Captain Frenzel to serve of the supervision sub-committee he would like to have a trooper on the committee.

Dept. Of Natural Resources (DNR) – John Forbes provided a brief overview of DNR services; the various permits and fees associated with DNR services. DNR has 3 regional offices; Anchorage for South-Central, Fairbanks for the Northern region and Juneau for Southeast. DNR has made some technological updates in the past few months; an improved version of the Alaska mapper program which is an interactive mapping program that allows the user to research and verify state land ownership and land usage connected to DNR case file records. They also developed a new website that is more organized and easier to navigate; it has access to all forums, fact sheets and applications.

 Bureau of Land Management (BLM) – Zach Million provided an update from BLM. He reviewed the 3 districts of the BLM and the recreation programs it provides. He briefly discussed the varied permits for commercial activity on BLM land. BLM has completed approximately 65% of the special recreation permit 5 year audit. He answered questions from the board.

Mental Health Trust – Chandler Long provided a short recap of the Mental Health Land Trust. She spoke in regard to the new guide use area permit program that was implemented in April

2020, right at the onset of COVID. Several of the parcels are open for bidding for permits and the trust is looking at options for short-term permits opposed to the current 5-year terms of the permits. The trust statutorily must maximize revenue generation from trust land, which in turn funds beneficiary programs across the state of Alaska. The trust provides funding for programs like criminal justice reentry access, local treatment centers, and social services.

Board of Game – Jerry Burnett provided an update from the Board of Game (BOG). Larry Van Daele was elected Chair of Board of Game in January 2021 and asked Mr. Burnett to serve as liaison to the BGCSB. BOG met March 18 and took some actions. They decided to reissue the call for proposals since they had voted to move their regulatory cycle ahead one year. Proposals previously sent in will still be considered and new proposals will be added.

- C. <u>Survivorship/successorship:</u> the committee met several times over the past few months and prepared draft language that the Department of Law advised them the board does not have the authority to adopt. The committee has sent documentation of the intent to Department of Law and will work with Megyn Weigand over the coming months to prepare new language that falls under the proper authority; they anticipate providing the draft to the board at the July or December 2021 meetings for consideration.
- <u>D.</u> <u>Professional Development:</u> the committee submitted a proposal of draft language for board consideration. At this time there are no further meetings of this committee are scheduled.

Agenda Item - Review Agenda:

The board reviewed the agenda that was approved by Board Chair Jason Bunch.

In a motion duly made by Ely Cyrus, seconded by Pete Buist with unanimous consent, it was resolved to adopt the daily agenda as written.

Agenda Item - Review Meeting Minutes:

The board reviewed draft meeting minutes for the March 23-25, 2021 meeting held by the board. Ms. Hoffard informed the board that there were corrections to grammar and spelling as well as the addition of Michelle Heun to attendees.

In a motion duly made by Ely Cyrus, seconded by Jerry Burnett with unanimous consent, it was resolved to approve the March 23-25, 2021 meeting minutes as amended.

Agenda Item - Public Comment for Regulations project currently out for public comment:

Mark Richard, Executive Director of Resident Hunters of Alaska. Supports the amendment to 12 AAC 75.450. Would like the transporter subcommittee to meet and discuss how the proposed professional development regulations should or should not apply to transporters.

 Al Barrett, Class-A Assistant Guide GUIC765. Did not see the urgency in amending 12 AAC 75.105 to match the statute. Would like the board to set goals for what they hope to accomplish with the professional development regulations. Recommends the board not remove "equipment" from 12 AAC 75.450 as it may cause confusion. Suggested the board clarify that the refresher exam for the professional development regulations must be passed, not simply taken as those are two very different things.

Michelle Heun, License Transporter GUIT1063. Supports the amended language for 12 AAC 75.450 as suggested by Mr. Barrett to only remove "game processing" but leaving in "equipment". She feels that would meet the intent of the proposal that was presented to the board regarding this regulation amendment. This regulation amendment doesn't change the intent, it only helps prevent potential waste of animals harvested

No one else on the call asked to provide comment, Chair Bunch moved forward with the agenda but did not close public comment so anyone that chose to would have the opportunity to speak.

Agenda Item – Board Business:

- Chair Bunch brought to the board the ongoing issue of buffer areas and conflict in the field. DNR had requested the board discuss this issue as they had received a request for a permit that would have two guide businesses right next to each other and DRN did not have cause to deny the new permit application. The board will to have to look at these situations on a case by case basis until they come up with a solid mechanism to defuse conflict and congestion in the field.
- basis until they come up with a solid mechanism to defuse conflict and congestion in the fie The board discussed the issue at length but did not take action. The board may form a sub-
- 92 committee to continue working on this topic.

Ms. Hoffard and OLE Tom Bay brought forward a question regarding verification of licensure from Canada. British Columbia recently changed how assistant guides are credentialed. The government no longer issues a license to assistant guides, they are issued a certificate from the professional organization that is endorsed by the government. The government does still provide enforcement for violation for those certificate holders. An individual that is interested in pursuing licensure in Alaska brought this to the attention of staff, he felt it is an undue burden on him to provide the information as required for all applicants. After discussion with the board and Mr. Isaac Dueling, a member of the public on the call who is a Canadian citizen, it was determined that while it is a lengthy process it is not something unique to this applicant. All applicants must provide verification of licensure in other states and/or Canada and that verification must include any violations; this may require verification from multiple sources to meet the requirements as the goal is to ensure public safety.

Ms. Hoffard informed the board that she ordered the yearly order of hunt records. FROM: Sara Chambers, Division Director RE: Military licensing provisions in state law

On January 1, 2022, several augmentations to existing licensing laws pertaining to military personnel and spouses will go into effect. The purpose of this memo is to ensure board members are aware of and understand these requirements so they can adopt regulations and implement processes, if necessary, to comply with these requirements.

Since the earliest military spouse licensing provisions of AS 08.02.063 went into effect in 2011, and military personnel licensing provisions of AS 08.01.064 and AS 08.01.100 went into effect in 2013, only a few boards have executed the legislature's intent. The Board of Examiners in Optometry, the State Physical Therapy and Occupational Therapy Board, and the Board of Dental Examiners have each addressed matters arising from individual applications from military personnel. At the request of a board member who is a military veteran, the Board of Nursing has formed a committee to "crosswalk" military experience and education to align with existing license types and to explore options to bridge education gaps that may exist.

In recent years, the plight of military servicemembers and their spouses has gained national attention among state regulators and military communities within their jurisdictions. The U.S. Department of Defense has shined an unflattering light on how Alaska has handled military licensing transfers—just as Eielson AFB expanded to welcome thousands of new servicemembers and their families. In addition, a 2018 memo from the Secretaries of the Army, Navy, and Air Force sent a clear message about their expectations and the economic pressure they intended to apply on states:

"While focus on the mission is always our priority, the factors military families cite most frequently as drawbacks to military service include military dependent's difficulty assimilating into local school systems following a duty station transfer, the quality of schools available for their children, and the ability of spouses to obtain jobs and sustain careers. With that in mind, we will encourage leadership to consider the quality of schools near bases and whether reciprocity of professional licenses is available for military families when evaluating future basing or mission alternatives."

Various reports on this issue have been published in the last few years: although sources range from the Department of Defense to the National Governors Association to both the Obama and Trump Administrations, the need for military-friendly licensing policies is universally agreed-upon.

The information below and attached should assist boards in review and determination of next steps to reach compliance with the legislature's statutory expectations. I encourage boards to take the following steps to move forward on this project:

- 1. Board chairs review and/or assign a member to begin analysis and draft motions to come into compliance. Preparing ahead of time will help the meeting be more productive.
- 2. Schedule time during the next meeting to review this information and plan the next steps required.
- 3. Propose and adopt regulations regarding:
 - a. Application processes,
 - b. Practice limitations based on Alaska-specific requirements (such as Arctic engineering),
 - c. What the board deems "substantially equivalent," if necessary,
 - d. Other relevant matters.

Consistent with AS 08.01.063(g), the division has maintained a military-specific web page, email address, and coordinator since 2014. Later this year, Records and Licensing Supervisor Terry Ryals will take over coordination of all military licensing matters. In addition to his role managing several CBPL programs, he is an Army veteran and advocate for military families. CBPL Information Systems Coordinator Chelsea Childress, is leading the technical implementation of new licensing forms, structures, and workflow related to these changes.

Our team looks forward to assisting your board in the successful roll-out of this legislation.

Military licensing statutes (pending changes as noted become effective January 1, 2022):

AS 08.01.063. Military courtesy licenses. (a) Except as provided in (d) of this section, and notwithstanding another provision of law, the department or appropriate board shall [MAY] issue a temporary courtesy license to an active duty member of the armed forces of the United States or the spouse of an active duty member of the armed forces of the United States if the active duty member or spouse meets the requirements of this section and applies to the department or appropriate board. An application must include evidence satisfactory to the department or appropriate board that the applicant

- (1) is <u>an active duty member of the armed forces of the United States or is</u> married to and living with a member of the armed forces of the United States who is on active duty and assigned to a duty station in this state under official active duty military orders;
- (2) holds a current license or certificate in another state, district, or territory of the United States, <u>or that is recognized by the United States</u>, including a branch of the armed forces of the United States, with requirements that the department or appropriate board determines are <u>substantially</u> equivalent to those established under this title for that occupation;
- (3) if required by the department or appropriate board for obtaining a license in the applicant's profession, has been fingerprinted and has provided the fees required by the Department of Public Safety under AS 12.62.160 for criminal justice information and a national criminal history record check; the fingerprints and fees shall be forwarded to the Department of Public Safety to obtain a report of criminal justice information under AS 12.62 and a national criminal history record check under AS 12.62.400;

- (4) has not committed an act in any jurisdiction that would have constituted grounds for the refusal, suspension, or revocation of a license or certificate to practice that occupation under this title at the time the act was committed;
- (5) has not been disciplined by a licensing or credentialing entity in another jurisdiction and is not the subject of an unresolved complaint, review procedure, or disciplinary proceeding conducted by a licensing or credentialing entity in another jurisdiction; and
- (6) pays any fees required under this title.
- (b) The department or appropriate board shall issue a temporary license under this section to a person who meets the requirements [EXPEDITE THE PROCEDURE FOR ISSUANCE OF A LICENSE] under (a) of this section within 30 days after the department or appropriate board receives the person's completed application for the temporary license.
- (c) A temporary courtesy license issued under this section is valid for 180 days and may be extended at the discretion of the department or appropriate board for one additional 180-day period, on application of the holder of the temporary courtesy license.
- (d) This section does not apply to the practice of law or the regulation of attorneys under AS 08.08.
- (e) The department shall prepare an annual report that describes, for the previous fiscal year, information on temporary courtesy licenses issued under this section, including
 - (1) expedited application procedures;
 - (2) progress made toward implementing regulations for the licenses, changes to regulations made to accommodate the needs of military spouses, and any plans for future regulations;
 - (3) the number and type of the licenses that have been issued; and
 - (4) the department's efforts to inform each board authorized to issue a temporary courtesy license under this section and the military community in the state about the licenses.
- (f) The department shall submit the report prepared under (e) of this section to the Joint Armed Services Committee on or before the first day of March each year. In addition, the department shall consolidate the two most recent reports and submit a biennial report to the legislature on or before the first day of March during the first regular session of each legislature. The department shall deliver a copy of the biennial report to the senate secretary and the chief clerk of the house of representatives and notify the legislature that the report is available.

 (g) The department shall annually produce and distribute to each board authorized to issue a temporary courtesy
- license under this section informational materials for the purpose of improving the board's knowledge of the licenses, the application process, and best practices in providing applicant support. The department shall encourage the boards to designate a single employee to serve as the point of contact for public information and inquiries related to temporary courtesy licenses for military spouses.

AS 08.01.064. Military education, training, and service credit; temporary license. (a) Notwithstanding another provision of law, the department or applicable board shall accept military education, training, and service for some or all of the qualifications otherwise required of an applicant for a license or certificate issued under this chapter if

- (1) the department or applicable board determines that the military education, training, and service is substantially equivalent to some or all of the qualifications otherwise required of an applicant for a license or certificate issued under this chapter; and
- (2) the applicant provides satisfactory evidence of successful completion of the education, training, or service as a member of the armed forces of the United States, the United States Reserves, the National Guard of any state, the Military Reserves of any state, or the Naval Militia of any state.
- (b) If the department issues temporary licenses or certificates as authorized by the department or applicable board under AS 08.01.050(a)(9), the department or applicable board shall issue a temporary license or certificate to a person who
 - (1) applies to the department or applicable board in a manner prescribed by the department or board;
 - (2) meets the requirements in AS 08.01.063(a)(3) (6); and
 - (3) while in the armed forces of the United States or any state, as described in (a) of this section,
 - (A) held a current license or certificate in another state, district, or territory of the United States, practiced in the area of the license or certificate, and maintained the license or certificate in active status before and at the time of application for a license or certificate under this subsection; or

- (B) was awarded a degree, diploma, or certificate by a branch of the armed forces of the United States or any state, as described in (a) of this section, that met standards for an equivalent license or a certificate of technical training.
- (c) The department or applicable board shall expedite the procedure for issuance of a license or certificate under (b) of this section for an applicant who is on active duty.
- (d) A license or certificate issued under (b) of this section is valid for 180 days and may be extended at the discretion of the department or applicable board for one additional 180-day period if the holder of the license or certificate applies for an extension on a form approved by the department or applicable board.
- (e) The department or applicable board may adopt regulations necessary to implement this section.

Sec. 08.01.100. License renewal, lapse, and reinstatement.

- (f) The department may establish and implement a waiver of continuing education requirements for renewal of a license regulated by the department and a board may establish and implement a waiver of continuing education requirements for renewal of a license regulated by the board for the period in which a licensee is engaged in active duty military service in the armed forces of the United States.
- (g) A member of the armed forces of the United States on active duty in a combat zone, danger pay post, or qualified hazardous duty area, who is a licensee under this title in good standing at the time of the licensee's active duty order is exempt from any fees or other requirements to maintain that license or good standing while the licensee is in that zone, at that post, or in that area. This exemption is valid for 180 days after returning to the licensee's permanent duty station, if the licensee does not engage in licensed practice for profit in the private sector. The licensee shall pay fees and meet all other requirements for the license period beginning after the exemption ends. In this subsection,
 - (1) "combat zone" has the meaning given in 26 U.S.C. 112(c)(2) (Internal Revenue Code);
 - (2) "danger pay post" means a post so designated by the United States Secretary of State in the Department of State Standardized Regulations for purposes of danger pay under 5 U.S.C. 5928;
 - (3) "qualified hazardous duty area" means an area that, during the applicant's deployment, is treated as if it were a combat zone for purposes of a federal tax exemption under 26 U.S.C. 112 (Internal Revenue Code).

<u>Centralized regulations pertaining to military licensure for division-managed/non-board programs:</u>

12 AAC 02.956. TEMPORARY LICENSE FOR SPOUSES OF MILITARY PERSONNEL. (a) The department will issue a temporary license to the spouse of an active duty member of the armed forces of the United States who meets the requirements of AS 08.01.063 and this section, authorizing the holder to practice a profession that is regulated by the department under AS 08.01.010 and this title.

- (b) An applicant for a temporary license under this section must submit
 - (1) a completed application, on a form provided by the department;
 - (2) the applicable fees established in 12 AAC 02.105 for a temporary license;
 - (3) a copy of the applicant's military dependent identification card and a copy of the spouse's current active duty military orders showing assignment to a duty station in this state;
 - (4) verification of licensure from each jurisdiction where the applicant holds or has ever held a license to practice the profession for which the temporary license is requested, one of which must be a current license in good standing and meet the requirements of AS 08.01.063(a)(2); the verifications must meet the requirements of AS 08.01.063(a)(4) and (5); and
 - (5) if the profession for which the applicant is seeking a temporary license requires a criminal history background check, a completed fingerprint card and the fee required by the Department of Public Safety to obtain state and national criminal justice information required under AS 08.01.063(a)(3).
- (c) The department will expedite the issuance of the license under this section as required by AS 08.01.063(b).
- (d) A temporary license issued under this section is valid for 180 days and may be extended for an additional 180-day period by applying on a form provided by the department and submitting the temporary license fee established in 12 AAC 02.105.

12 AAC 02.957. TEMPORARY LICENSE FOR MILITARY PERSONNEL. (a) The department will issue a temporary license to a member of the armed forces of the United States who meets the requirements of AS 08.01.064 and this section, authorizing the holder to practice a profession that is regulated by the department under AS 08.01.010 and this title. (b) An applicant for a temporary license under this section must submit

- (1) a completed application, on a form provided by the department;
- (2) the applicable fees established in 12 AAC 02.105 for a temporary license;
- (3) verification of licensure from each jurisdiction where the applicant holds or has ever held a license to practice the profession for which the temporary license is requested; the verifications must meet the requirements of AS 08.01.063(a)(4) and (5);
- (4) evidence satisfactory to the department of meeting the requirements of AS 08.01.064(b)(3) as follows:
 - (A) verification of a current license or certificate issued by another jurisdiction that provides proof of licensure during the time the applicant provided the practice in the area of the license or certificate while in the military, and proof that the applicant practiced the profession, as described in AS 08.01.064(b)(3)(A); or
 - (B) documentation of receiving education, training, or service as a member of the armed forces and being awarded a degree, diploma, or certificate by a branch of the armed forces of the United States or any state, that meets the requirements of AS 08.01.064(b)(3)(B); and
- (5) if the profession for which the applicant is seeking a temporary license requires a criminal history background check, a completed fingerprint card and the fee required by the Department of Public Safety to obtain state and national criminal justice information required under AS 08.01.063(a)(3).
- (c) The department will expedite the issuance of the license under this section for an applicant who is on active duty as required by AS 08.01.064(c)
- (d) A temporary license issued under this section is valid for 180 days and may be extended for an additional 180-day period by applying on a form provided by the department and submitting the temporary license fee established in 12 AAC 02.105.

* Miller, Joseph:

Mr. Miller's Consent Agreement was adopted on March 6, 2016 and stipulated a \$10,000 fine with \$5,000 suspended, a one-year license suspension, and a three-year probation to begin once the suspension was complete. Mr. Miller came non-compliant in September of 2016 for failing to pay his civil fine by the due date. His license suspension continued, and the full \$10,000 fine was invoked due to non-compliance. Mr. Miller has paid a total of \$1,900 towards the \$10,000. In 2019, Mr. Miller petitioned the Board for partial fine reduction. The Board approved staying \$5,000 of the civil fine with the condition that if the remaining \$5,000 was to be paid in full by May 1, 2020 for his license suspension to be lifted. Mr. Miller has not made any payments since March 16, 2020. The Division has attempted to contact Mr. Miller many times regarding his non-compliance without success. The stayed \$5,000 was reinstated in April 2021 bringing his remaining fine balance to \$8,100.

*Walker, John:

Mr. Walker's OAH Decision was adopted on July 22, 2020 and stipulated a one-year probation and a \$4,000 fine with \$2,000 suspended due by January 22, 2021. Mr. Walker became non-compliant in January of 2021 when he failed to pay the civil fine in full by the due date. The Division made numerous attempts to contact Mr. Walker. All attempts have resulted in no contact with Mr. Walker. Mr. Walker's license was suspended on July 23, 2021, and the full fine was invoked due to non-compliance with his Consent Agreement.

Explanations are in *italics*. I treated all of the amendments as a group because they tie together with each other.

This proposal would amend subsection (f) of 12 AAC 75.240. SUPERVISION.

Proposal:

12 AAC 75.240. SUPERVISION.

- (f) The contracting registered-guide outfitter or a noncontracting registered guide-outfitter or class-A assistant guide supervising an assistant guide shall be available in the same guide use area, or an adjacent guide use area with a common border, or within 200 miles, to direct and monitor the big game hunting services provided to the client, except during times When
 - (1) an emergency situation exists that requires the guide's assistance; [OR]
 - (2) the contracting registered guide-outfitter or noncontracting registered guide-outfitter or class-A assistant guide supervising the hunt is outside [THE GUIDE USE AREA] the area described above in (f) while
 - (A) in transit with meat or trophies from that or a neighboring guide use area;
 - (B) in transit with food, supplies, or clients directly associated with conducting guided hunts in that or a neighboring guide use area; or
 - (C) conducting important duties that are essential for completion of current contracted hunts.

<u>Explanation:</u> I think 12 AAC 75.240 (f) causes a lot of problems and fixes few if any. Guide use areas vary in size drastically throughout the state. There are many, situations where you can be as few as 20 - 30 miles away and out of compliance, and over 200 miles away and in compliance. Mode of transportation (foot, horses, boats, atvs, aircraft, etc.) and what resources are available (communication, fuel, food, medical, transportation, etc.), are a lot more important factors than simply distance. I think this is an easy fix for a big problem, with very little if any down side, and is necessary for the sake of consistency, fairness and practicality.

Other Options: I think 200 miles will cover most situations and thought about just eliminating the (f)(2) exemption, but left it in there, because while this would certainly cover my situation, it might cause problems for someone else that the current regulation doesn't.

This proposal recommends amendments to 12 AAC 75.920. HUNTING, GUIDING, AND PRACTICAL EXPERIENCE.

Proposal:

12 AAC 75.920. HUNTING, GUIDING, AND PRACTICAL EXPERIENCE.

(f) For the purposes of the requirements in AS 08.54.610(d)(1), a person who is licensed as a registered guide-outfitter may be employed by another registered guide-outfitter to provide the services of a class-a assistant guide, statewide. [IF THE NON-CONTRACTING REGISTERED GUIDE-OUTFITTER HAS HAD AT LEAST 10 DAYS, HUNTING EXPERIENCE IN THE GAME MANAGEMENT UNIT THAT THE NON-CONTRACTING GUIDE WILL BE ASSISTING THE CONTRACTING GUIDE IN.]

<u>Explanation:</u> A registered guide is our highest class of license, and should be allowed to do everything on a statewide basis, that a Class A can in the GMU's that the Class A is certified in. Whether or not the non-contracting registered guide has experience or not in the GMU, he is still being supervised by the contracting guide who does.

I don't think the "experience in the area requirements" for a Class A assistant guide, was ever meant to "dumb down" the qualifications of a non-contracting registered guide, and I don't think they were meant to propel a Class A guide above a registered guide, which is our highest class of license. I think the board was given bad legal advice when they were told that, and consequently passed this regulation.

Regardless if you've hunted as near as 10-20 miles away and as recently as just last week, if you don't have boots on the ground experience in that camp, everything is new. There could be several thousand feet difference in elevation, alpine vs thick forest, river bottom to mountain top, etc., and a guide's overall experience means a lot more than whether or not he as 10 days experience in that particular GMU – which may have occurred on a DIY hunt, many hears ago, and 100-200 miles away on the other side of the GMU.

Current statutes [08.54.620 (a) (4) (B)] allow someone who currently resides in a GMU and has 15 years hunting experience in that GMU, to become a class A guide, without ever guiding one single hunt, but we think a registered guide – our highest class of license, should have to have an additional token 10 days of experience in the area before he is allowed to perform the services of a class A???

I think this regulation as currently written, conflicts and confuses with other statutes and regs. If I get hurt and need to hire a registered guide to run my operation, I would prefer to hire a guide who has contracted sometimes hundreds of hunts over multiple decades, even though he may not have hunted 10 days in the GMU, over a new registered guide who has never contracted one of his own hunts, but happens to have a "token 10 days hunting experience" in the GMU.

I feel the above amendment would give a contracting guide who is able to supervise, but unable to be "primarily in the field and participating in the hunt" due to medical issues, a family emergency, etc., a lot more possibilities for finding someone competent to run their hunts, versus having to cancel hunts (and go broke).

This proposal recommends amendments to multiple subsections of **12 AAC 75.240**. **SUPERVISION**.

Proposal:

12 AAC 75.240. SUPERVISION.

- (a) A registered guide-outfitter who contracts to guide a hunt shall plan, direct, and monitor the big game hunting services provided to the client.
- (b) At the conclusion of the hunt, a registered guide-outfitter who contracts to guide a hunt shall evaluate the performance of the assistant guide, class-A assistant guide, or registered guide-outfitter involved in the hunt to determine whether the big game hunting services provided to the client were satisfactory.
- (c) To comply with (b) of this section, the contracting registered guide-outfitter shall verbally communicate, by telephone or radio, or in person, with the client and the assistant guide, class-A assistant guide, or registered guide- outfitter involved in the hunt, separately or together, at least once within 10 days after the conclusion of the hunt. The contracting registered guide-outfitter shall obtain the necessary information to evaluate the performance of the assistant guide, the class-A assistant guide, or registered guide-outfitter and determine whether the big game hunting services were provided safely, in accordance with state and federal law, and to the satisfaction of the client.
- (d) The contracting registered guide-outfitter shall make a good faith effort to verbally communicate with the client to obtain the necessary information to evaluate the performance of the assistant guide, class-A assistant guide, or registered guide-outfitter. If the attempt to verbally communicate with the client is unsuccessful, the contracting registered guide-outfitter shall write to the client and request the necessary information to evaluate the performance of the assistant guide, the class-A assistant guide, or registered guide-outfitter. The contracting registered guide- outfitter shall write to the client within 60 days after the conclusion of the hunt.
- (e) A registered guide-outfitter shall document on the hunt record the date the registered guide-outfitter complied with the verbal, or if applicable the written, client communication requirements in (c) and (d) of this section.

(f) For the purposes of the requirement in AS 08.54.630(b) (3), that a registered or class A guide employed by the contracting guide, must be physically present with an assistant when the contracting guide is not in the field and participating in the contracted hunt, [THE CONTRACTING REGISTERED-GUIDE OUTFITTER OR] a noncontracting registered guide-outfitter or class-A assistant guide supervising an assistant guide shall be available in the same guide use area, or an adjacent guide use area with a common border, or within 200 miles, to direct and monitor the big game hunting services provided to the client, except during times When

- (1) an emergency situation exists that requires the guide's assistance; or
- (2) the [CONTRACTING REGISTERED GUIDE-OUTFITTER OR] noncontracting registered guide-outfitter or class-A assistant guide supervising the hunt is outside [THE GUIDE USE AREA OR NEIGHBORING GUIDE USE AREA] the area described above in (f) while
 - (A) in transit with meat or trophies from that or a neighboring guide use area;
 - (B) in transit with food, supplies, or clients directly associated with conducting guided hunts in that or a neighboring guide use area; or
 - (C) conducting important duties that are essential for completion of current contracted hunts.

<u>Explanation:</u> I think 12 AAC 75.240 (f) causes a lot of problems and fixes few if any. Guide use areas vary in size drastically throughout the state. There are many, many situations where you can be as few as 20 - 30 miles away and out of compliance, and over 200 miles away and in compliance. Mode of transportation (foot, horses, boats, atvs, aircraft, etc.) and what resources are available (communication, fuel, food, medical, transportation, etc.), are a lot more important factors than simply distance.

I participated in the subcommittees about 2013 and 2014 when 12 AAC 75.240 (i) was drafted and passed to help clarify "in the field" and "supervision" requirements for a contracting guide in 08.54 .610 (e) and to solve some of the problems caused by 12 AAC 75.240 (f). Unfortunately, we should have deleted 12 AAC 75.240 (f), but didn't.

Current statutes [08.54.620 (a) (4) (B)] allow someone who currently resides in a GMU and has 15 years hunting experience in that GMU, to become a class A guide, without ever guiding one single hunt, but we don't think a contracting registered guide should be able to use assistants, unless they also have a class A or registered guide present in the same or neighboring – which can be only 20-30 miles away in some cases. This makes no sense to me. I don't think it is unreasonable to grant more authority to a contracting guide supervising an assistant, than to a class A or noncontracting registered guide that is supervising an assistant. I think a contracting guide who is primarily in the field and participating in the hunt as per 08.54.610 (e), and who is also physically present in the same or neighboring GMU + 50 miles as per 12 AAC 75.240 (f), should not be required to also have a Class A or registered guide present in the same or neighboring GUA, to supervise and assistant.

I think amending 75.240 (f) and (f) (2), deferring it to 08.54.630 (b) (3), and amending 75.240 (i) to include all classes of guides, clarifies and accomplishes this.

(g) Repealed 7/30/2006.

- (h) In this section, "emergency situation" means a situation in which a person is in a remote area and
 - (1) is involuntarily experiencing an absence of food, water, shelter, or medical care required to sustain life or health;
 - (2) is lost;
 - (3) is unable to perform the functions necessary for survival, leading to a high risk of death or serious and permanent health problems without the assistance of the guide; or
 - (4) the guide's presence is necessary for a family medical condition.
- (i) For purposes of the requirement in AS 08.54.610(e) for supervision of a contracted hunt, and in addition to the requirements of this section, the contracting registered guide-outfitter may plan, direct, and monitor a contracted hunt *for all classes of guides*
 - (1) while in the field and present in
 - (A) the same game management unit in which the contracted hunt is taking place;
 - (B) a game management unit adjacent to and sharing a common border with the unit in which the
 - contracted hunt is taking place; or
 - (C) a location that is no further than 50 miles from the nearest boundary of an area or unit described in (A)
 - or (B) of this paragraph; and
 - (2) if performing those activities, while in the field and present in a location listed in (1) of this subsection, is practicable; for purposes of this paragraph, planning, directing, and monitoring the contracted hunt is not practicable if the contracting registered guide-outfitter cannot communicate in person, communicate personally by telephone, or communicate personally by radio with the assistant guide, class-A assistant guide, or registered guide-outfitter involved in the contracted hunt.

Explanation: I think a contracting guide who is primarily in the field and participating in the hunt as per 08.54.610 (e), and who is also physically present in the same or neighboring GMU + 50 miles as per 12 AAC 75.24 (i), should not be required to also have a Class A or registered guide present in the same or neighboring GUA, to supervise and assistant. The proposed additional language in 12 AAC 75.240 (i) above, will help clarify that the contracting guide is sufficient.

Current statutes [08.54.620 (a) (4) (B)] allow someone who currently resides in a GMU and has 15 years hunting experience in that GMU, to become a class A guide, without ever guiding one single hunt, but we don't think a contracting registered guide should be able to use assistants, unless they also have a class A or registered guide supervising, who is present in the same or neighboring GUA???

(j) As per language in 08.54.610 (e), 08.54.620 (b) (3), and 08.54.630 (b) (3), A class-A guide or a non-contracting registered guide-outfitter may take charge of a camp and provide guide

services from the camp without the contracting registered guide-outfitter being in the field and participating in the contracted hunt if the contracting registered guide-outfitter is supervising the guiding activities.

Explanation: This is identical to 08.54,620 (b) (3), except that it adds "non-contracting registered guide. Class A guides and non-contracting registered guides (without any additional experience requirements) are used together in multiple statutes and regulations (the last portion of 08.54.630(b)(3) and 12 AAC 75.240 (c) and (f)), and we should be consistent. The addition of this text will also align with existing language in statutes 08.54.620 (b) (3) and 08.54.630 (b) (3), and confirm that class A guides can run a hunt when the contracting guide is not primarily in the field and participating, and that assistant guides can take charge of a camp and provide guide services, when the contracting guide is not in the field — **IF** — a class A or registered guide employed by the contracting guide, is supervising them.



NOTICE OF PROPOSED CHANGES IN THE REGULATIONS OF THE ALASKA BIG GAME COMMERCIAL SERVICES BOARD

BRIEF DESCRIPTION: The Big Game Commercial Services Board proposes to update regulations relating to licensure requirements, contract requirements, species-specific licensing, and establish professional development standards for license holders.

The Big Game Commercial Services Board (Board) proposes to adopt regulation changes in Title 12, Chapter 75 of the Alaska Administrative Code including the following:

- 1. 12 AAC 75.105. Application for master guide-outfitter license, is proposed to change the client list requirement from 25 to 45 clients for whom the applicant has personally provided guiding or outfitting services; to conform with current statutory requirements.
- 2. 12 AAC 75.150. Professional development for assistant guide, class-A assistant guide, registered guide-outfitter, master guide-outfitter, and transporter licensees, is a proposed new section to establish professional development standards for all license types that are regulated by the Board.
- 3. 12 AAC 75.260. Registered guide-outfitter contract requirements, is proposed to amend the contract requirements for registered or master guides to obtain a unique verification code for each guide use area in which a unique verification code is required from the department before entering an application for the client.
- 4. 12 AAC 75.450. Transporter contract requirements, is proposed to remove "game processing equipment" with respect to the written contract.
- 5. 12 AAC 75.460. Species-specific licensing, is proposed to remove "caribou" from the list of authorized species to be listed on licenses.

Please see the following section of proposed regulation; all license holders will be required to completed a refresher examination prepared by the board. It is anticipated to resemble the jurisprudence currently required of new assistant guides, Class-A assistant guides and transporters. The additional requirement for someone looking to transition into a Registered Guide-Outfitter is the attendance of at least 3 board meetings.

12 AAC 75.150. Professional development for assistant guide, class-A assistant guide, registered guide-outfitter, master guide-outfitter, and transporter licensees. (a) For renewal of any class of license, the applicant must complete a refresher examination prepared by the board under AS 08.54.600.

- (b) An applicant for a registered guide-outfitter license must provide evidence of attending to a minimum of three board meetings either telephonically, through video conferencing, in person, or by another means approved by the board.
- (c) An applicant for a master guide-outfitter license must provide evidence of attendance to a minimum of five board meetings and participation as a proctor in at least three regularly scheduled registered guide oral exam sessions. For this requirement, participation refers to the willingness and availability to participate as attested by the chair of the board or a board member delegated with this responsibility.
- (d) The requirements listed in this section will be documented on a form provided by the department and signed by the chair or a delegated board member at the time of completion.

Good morning,

The intent of the "refresher examination" would be a tool to guide a licensee through the statutes and regulations to point out changes and those which disciplinary action was taken over the last two years. It would be online (or on paper if requested), could be taken as many times as required to successfully complete and posted near the beginning of the second year of the licensing period to provide adequate time for compliance. Once successfully completed the online tool would prompt the user to "submit" to the BGCSB for filing.

Approximately 20 questions are recommended with the intent of no more than 30 minutes to complete. An example template can be found online at: https://www.adfg.alaska.gov/index.cfm?adfg=quiz.mountaingoatquiz&screen=2.

1. Sec. 08.54.760. HUNT RECORDS; CONFIDENTIALITY OF HUNT RECORDS AND ACTIVITY REPORTS. (a) The department shall collect and maintain hunt records provided by a registered guide-outfitter. A registered guide-outfitter shall submit to the department a hunt record for each contracted hunt within _____ days after the completion of the hunt.

Good day Chairman Bunch and esteemed members of the board.

These are my comments on the current packet of potential regulation changes.

12 AAC 75.105(a)(3) Master Guide requirements.

I oppose this regulatory change. The legislature has enacted this in statute. There is no need to recite the statute in regulation.

12 AAC 75.150. Professional development for assistant guide, class-A assistant guide, registered guide-outfitter, master guide-outfitter, and transporter licensees.

I am currently neutral on this concept on testing prior to renewing licenses.

I am always leery of good intentions, by thinking testing an individual's knowledge of guide laws and regulations will reduce violation.

This testing I am sure come with a cost to our guide license. I would like to know what that cost is.

The proposed regulation states "the applicant must complete a refresher examination". It does not state an applicant has to "pass" the examination, but only complete it. Is that the intent of the proposed new regulation?

I also have concern about enacting a regulation on required testing without seeing the details of the test/testing.

In sections (b) and (c) it states a registered guide and master guide must provide "evidence of attendance at a BGCS meeting". What does that entail? Attending the entire meeting or something less?

Lastly if I may suggest. If you as a board feel compelled to enact something like this. I would like to have a sunset on the regulation of 3 to 5 years. After that the board review the data. Did violations decrease, did clients have a better experience in the field, how do guides feel about the program, was it beneficial, and was there a return on investment?

12 AAC 75.450(b)(13) is amended to read:

(13) include the following statement: "A licensed transporter may not provide vehicles, fuel, camping, hunting, [OR GAME PROCESSING EQUIPMENT,] or any hunting services such as skinning, caping, or cleaning of game, glassing, and packing in the field, including from a permanent structure or on a boat on salt water."

I oppose this proposed regulation change, because it removes the word "EQUIPMENT". I am sure this is a typo. The propose regulation I believe should read.

A licensed transporter may not provide vehicles, fuel, camping <u>or</u> hunting, <u>equipment</u> [OR GAME PROCESSING EQUIPMENT,] or any hunting services such as skinning, caping, or cleaning of game, glassing, and packing in the field, including from a permanent structure or on a boat on salt water."

48 Agenda Item - Review Agenda:

The board reviewed the agenda that was approved by Board Chair Jason Bunch.

In a motion duly made by Ely Cyrus, seconded by Pete Buist with unanimous consent, it was resolved to adopt the daily agenda as written.

Agenda Item - Review Meeting Minutes:

The board reviewed draft meeting minutes for the March 23-25, 2021 meeting held by the board. Ms. Hoffard informed the board that there were corrections to grammar and spelling as well as the addition of Michelle Heun to attendees.

In a motion duly made by Ely Cyrus, seconded by Jerry Burnett with unanimous consent, it was resolved to approve the March 23-25, 2021 meeting minutes as amended.

Agenda Item - Public Comment for Regulations project currently out for public comment:

Mark Richard, Executive Director of Resident Hunters of Alaska. Supports the amendment to 12 AAC 75.450. Would like the transporter subcommittee to meet and discuss how the proposed professional development regulations should or should not apply to transporters.

Al Barrett, Class-A Assistant Guide GUIC765. Did not see the urgency in amending 12 AAC 75.105 to match the statute. Would like the board to set goals for what they hope to accomplish with the professional development regulations. Recommends the board not remove "equipment" from 12 AAC 75.450 as it may cause confusion. Suggested the board clarify that the refresher exam for the professional development regulations must be passed, not simply taken as those are two very different things.

Michelle Heun, License Transporter GUIT1063. Supports the amended language for 12 AAC 75.450 as suggested by Mr. Barrett to only remove "game processing" but leaving in "equipment". She feels that would meet the intent of the proposal that was presented to the board regarding this regulation amendment. This regulation amendment doesn't change the intent, it only helps prevent potential waste of animals harvested

No one else on the call asked to provide comment, Chair Bunch moved forward with the agenda but did not close public comment so anyone that chose too would have the opportunity to speak.

Agenda Item - Board Business:

- Chair Bunch brought to the board the ongoing issue of buffer areas and conflict in the field.

 DNR had requested the board discuss this issue as they had received a request for a permit that
- would have two guide businesses right next to each other and DRN did not have cause to deny
- the new permit application. The board will to have to look at these situations on a case by case basis until they come up with a solid mechanism to defuse conflict and congestion in the field.
- The board discussed the issue at length but did not take action. The board may form a sub-
- 92 committee to continue working on this topic.

Ms. Hoffard and OLE Tom Bay brought forward a question regarding verification of licensure 93 from Canada. British Columbia recently changed how assistant guides are credentialed. The 94 government no longer issue a license to assistant guides, they are issued a certificate from the 95 professional organization that is endorsed by the government. The government does still 96 provide enforcement for violation for those certificate holders. An individual that is interested 97 in pursuing licensure in Alaska brought this to the attention of staff, he felt it is an undue 98 burden on him to provide the information as required for all applicants. After discussion with 99 the board and Mr. Isaac Dueling, a member of the public on the call who is a Canadian citizen, it 100 was determined that while it is a lengthy process it is not something unique to this applicant. 101 All applicants must provide verification of licensure in other states and/or Canada and that 102 verification must include any violations; this may require verification from multiple sources to 103 meet the requirements as the goal is to ensure public safety. 104

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Ms. Hoffard informed the board that she ordered the yearly order of hunt records. In an effort to reduce the number of incomplete records submitted, highlights will be added to the hunt records indicating areas that must be filled out. A new set of instructions will be mailed with hunt records moving forward. Also, guides that hunt in more than one GUA should list all GUA's on the hunt record but circle or mark the area that the animal was harvested in if it was a successful hunt.

To whom it may concern:

My name is Victor Michael Carlson and I am a master guide-outfitter and transporter. I have been guiding hunts and transporting on Kodiak Island for over 35 years. I am commenting on the proposed 12 AAC 75.150. The requirements for a refresher examination, board meeting attendance and proctoring exams is expensive and overburdensome for guides such as me that live in remote communities.

I live in Larsen Bay, on the remote west side of Kodiak Island. For me to get to Anchorage for an exam, meeting or proctoring will take a minimum of 4 days and a minimum of \$1,460 per trip. There are also few days within the year where I am not already committed to guiding hunts, guiding fishing trips, transporting and traveling to promote my Lodge. It would be difficult to find eight 4-day blocks where I could travel for these requirements. Especially taking into account Alaskan weather and frequent remote location flight delays. It is likely many of the trips would end up being 6 or more days and cost more than \$2,000 per trip.

If these new requirements are implemented, I request:

- The refresher examination have an online option.
- For board meetings, I request the number required be reduced and clarification that the allowance for telephonic or video conference applies to master guide-outfitters as it does for registered guide-outfitters. Phones and internet can also be unreliable in remote communities, so I request a waiver apply in the event of an outage or weak connection. In that event, a review of the minutes could qualify as attendance. Also, specification of the time period in which the number of meetings covers. Is it five meetings per year? Or five meetings within the 2-year validity of the license? And specification about whether it applies to new applications or renewals or both.
- I request the proctoring requirement be eliminated as it is overburdensome to require travel. I am willing, but my remote location makes me unavailable.
