Agenda Item – Review and Approve Agenda

The board reviewed the drafted agenda of the meeting.

In a motion duly made by Bernard Gatewood and seconded by Sherri Scott, with unanimous consent, it was resolved to approve the agenda as presented.

Agenda Item – Ethics Report

Hearing no ethics to report, the board moved on with business.

Agenda Item – Licensing Examiner Report

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46 Per the chair’s request, the board’s mission and vision statement is to be read into the minutes at the
47 start of each meeting. The following was read by Chair Erin Johnson:
48 *“The Board continues with the goals and purposes of protection of the public; ensuring the public of*
49 *continued competency of licensed psychology professionals; ensuring psychological care is offered by*
50 *professionally qualified persons; and ensuring qualified psychology practitioners are available. The Board*
51 *has approved applicants for licensure as Psychologists and Psychological Associates, as well as*
52 *monitored continuing education requirements.”*

53 Logan Bugayong then provided an update on the current number of licensees:

- 54 • There are 255 active Psychologist licenses
 - 55 ○ There are 11 active Psychologist Temporary Licenses
- 56 • There are 28 active Psychological Associate licenses
 - 57 ○ There are 0 active Psychological Associate Temporary licenses
- 58 • There are eight active Psychologist Courtesy Licenses and all are in good standing

60 To make best use of time, the board reviewed meeting minutes from previous meetings.

62 **In a motion duly made by Sherri Scott and seconded by Bernard Gatewood, with unanimous**
63 **consent, it was resolved to approve the meeting minutes from the November 5th and 6th, 2021**
64 **meeting as presented.**

Agenda Item – PSYPACT Presentation

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67 Janet Orwig is the Associate Executive Officer of Member Services for the Association of State and
68 Provincial Psychology Boards (ASPPB) and the Executive Director of PSYPACT. PSYPACT is the
69 interjurisdictional psychology license compact to allow for ease of license mobility. ASPPB first
70 addressed the issue of license mobility through reciprocity and ensuring that the different jurisdictions
71 had equivalent licensing requirements. This was eventually sunsetted as statutes and regulations and
72 post-doctoral requirements changed. PSYPACT is intended to help regulated the day-to-day practice of
73 telepsychology across state boundaries and temporary, face-to-face practice. This has aided in
74 maintaining continuity of care and in regulation of the practice of psychology across state lines. There
75 are currently 27 states that have enacted PSYPACT legislation and 23 that are effective.

80 The board had several questions regarding where the fees went and how interjurisdictional discipline is
81 handled across state lines. Director Sara Chambers had questions as well regarding who would be
82 processing these applications and the similarities between PSYPACT and the Nurse Licensure Compact.

90 **Agenda Item – SB 21 Temporary Military License**

91
92 Director Sara Chambers provided the board with an update as to the Division’s progress with the
93 implementation of SB 21. SB 21 will be implemented on January 1st, 2022 and will essentially allow for
94 military members and spouses to practice under a 180 day temporary license. The various licensing
95 boards in Alaska are reviewing existing temporary licensing regulations and working to implement new
96 regulations before SB 21 goes into effect.

107 and Psychological Associate Examiners.

111 Deputy Director Sharon Walsh presented the FY21 fourth quarter fiscal report for the board.
112 The board finished the fiscal year with a surplus and no fee changes are recommended at this

128 The board reviewed and voted on regulation projects that had been started in 2020. These projects
129 were put on hold as the boards and Regulation Specialist with the Division were focusing on the

130 Emergency Courtesy License and other Covid-19 related regulations. The regulations voted on pertain to
131 the checklist used for the Psychologist Courtesy License, the code of ethics referenced in regulations,
132 and the requirement of a letter of reference from a member of an applicant's doctoral committee.

134 **In a motion duly made by Sherri Scott and seconded by Bradley McConnell, with unanimous**
135 **consent, it was resolved to approve the changes to regulation 12 AAC 60.010. as presented.**

137 **In a motion duly made by Bernard Gatewood and seconded by Sherri Scott, with unanimous**
138 **consent, it was resolved to approve the changes to regulation 12 AAC 60.065. as presented.**

141 **consent, it was resolved to approve the changes to regulation 12 AAC 60.185. as presented.**

161 **Agenda Item – CEU Topics**

162

163 The board continued their discussion from the previous meeting regarding mandating specific
164 topics for continuing education. Currently, the board only requires that at least half of the
165 continuing education hours acquired for a biennial renewal are synchronous and at least three
166 hours in professional ethics. The board will post a statement to further clarify the definition of
167 synchronous and what continuing education activities will count as synchronous. In a similar
168 fashion to the Board of Social Work Examiners and Board of Marital and Family Therapists, The
169 Board of Psychologists and Psychological Associate Examiners looked into requiring specific

170 continuing education topics for biennial renewals. The board considered requiring specific CE's
171 for only the first renewal period. Specific subjects the board is interested in requiring are Alaska
172 Native culture, substance abuse and suicide. This topic is still on the agenda for tomorrow's
173 meeting and the board will revisit this topic then.

174

175 ***Board Member Sherri Scott left at 2:12 PM. Her absence has been excused by the Chair.***

176

177 The board took some time to revisit PSYPACT and what that would mean for Alaska. The board would
178 like to have feedback from the community regarding PSYPACT and how Alaskans feel about the compact
179 legislature. They would also like to have discussions with the first seven states that joined PSYPACT and
180 with states that have vocally opposed the compact. Logan Bugayong will reach out to Arizona and
181 Washington to see if they have representatives that would be available and willing to speak at the next
182 meeting.

189 **Agenda Item – UAA Presentation**

190

191 Gloria Eldridge, Hannah Ekstrom, and Patricia Sandberg from University of Alaska Anchorage presented
192 regarding regulation proposals they have for the existing psychological associate license. The University
193 of Alaska Anchorage is working towards APA accreditation for their Master's Psychology program. They
194 are concerned that the majority of graduates from the Master's Psychology program elect to seek out
195 licensure as a professional counselor instead of as a psychological associate. These representatives from
196 the Master's Psychology program have two main proposals: creating regulation that would allow
197 psychological associate applicants to receive supervision in the same way that professional counselors
198 are able to obtain theirs, and changing the title to something that more accurately indicates the level of
199 practice and education of these license holders to the public. The board is in favor of their proposed
200 changes. Bradley McConnell had asked for clarification regarding how the difference in scope of practice
201 would be presented to the public. Patricia Sandberg had assured that accreditation would make the
202 distinction between the Master's and Doctoral practitioners extremely clear.

Agenda Item – AK-PA Presentation

Marvo Reguindin and John Walsh presented the Alaska Psychological Association’s (AK-PA) current draft of the Model Licensure Act (MLA).

Sherri Scott joined at 9:10 AM

Marvo Reguindin stated that the current statutes and regulations allow for psychologists and psychological associates in Alaska to obtain a temporary license or full licensure and that the intention of the MLA is to find a middle ground. This act would amend how supervision hours are acquired, introduce a part time license type and an inactive license type. AK-PA has the support of two legislators to introduce this bill. The board had several questions regarding specific language used in the draft, and the requirements set in place for the part time license type. The board and AK-PA are looking to meet before the next quarterly meeting and the board is hoping to speak to individuals who were involved in the drafting process and go through the proposal line by line.

Agenda Item – New Business

271
272 The board revisited the idea of changing the title of the temporary license used to gain supervision and
273 take exams to something that indicates that they are not independently licensed psychologists. They
274 made a motion to change the names to Supervised Temporary Psychologist and Supervised Temporary
275 Psychological Associate. The names of these license types are not directly referenced in statute or
276 regulation so this is a change to be made by Division staff internally.

277 Sara Chambers joined to further discuss SB 21. She provided a draft of the regulations adopted
278 by the Board of Nursing at their meeting the day before; these regulations directly reference the
279 centralized regulations put in place by the Division regarding temporary military licensure for military
280 personnel and military spouses. Sara Chambers has provided a version of these regulations keyed
281 specifically for the Board of Psychologists and Psychological Associate Examiners that the board will be
282 voting on virtually.

283 The board continued on with their agenda and discussed distance supervision. At their previous
284 meeting, they had discussed the challenges of distance supervision, especially with the supervisee in
285 rural areas of Alaska. Chair Erin Johnson will attend an AK-PA meeting and asking for input regarding
286 difficulties with distance supervision. Further discussion will be held once the board has more input
287 from the public regarding difficulties with distance supervision.

Agenda Item – Old Business

290
291 The board attended the recent ASPPB Annual Meeting. They found that the meeting focused
292 heavily on continuing education and continuing competency.

293 Division staff will research contracting a third party to develop additional questions for the State
294 Law and Ethics Examination. The current State Law & Ethics Examination questions have been in

295 circulation since the inception of the exam and the board believes that it would be beneficial to update
296 the material.

297 The board revisited the topic of requiring specific continuing education topics. They would like
298 to require six credits of Alaska Native culture and two credits of telehealth in the first renewal period,
299 and two credits of substance abuse, two credits of suicide awareness, and maintain the three credits of
300 ethics for every renewal period.

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302 **In a motion duly made by Bernard Gatewood and seconded by Sherri Scott, with unanimous**
303 **consent, it was resolved to direct board staff to amend the regulations pertaining to the**
304 **continued competency of psychologists and psychological associates.**

319 **Continuing Education Audit for Douglas Pomeroy, license number PSYP332. With unanimous**
320 **consent, it was resolved to fail the Random Continuing Education Audit for Douglas Pomeroy,**
321 **license number PSYP332.**

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323 **In a roll call vote called for by Logan Bugayong, the board voted to approve the Application for**
324 **Licensure by Credentials for Meredith Bernstein, license number 182928. With unanimous**
325 **consent, it was resolved to not accept the application for licensure as a psychologist by**
326 **credentials for Meredith Bernstein, license number 182928 based on 12 AAC 60.055.(4) *The***
327 ***board will, in its discretion, deny an application for licensure by credentials, or deny approval***
328 ***to take a licensing examination, if the application has been found to be practicing***
329 ***psychological services without a license.* In her application, Meredith Bernstein indicated that**
330 **she is currently seeing clients via telehealth while residing in Alaska.**

331

332 **In a roll call vote called for by Logan Bugayong, the board voted to approve the Application for**
333 **Licensure by Credentials for Patrick DeMarco, license number 180276. With unanimous**
334 **consent, it was resolved to not accept the application for licensure as a psychologist by**
335 **credentials for Patrick DeMarco, license number 180276 based on 12 AAC 60.082.(2), *The***
336 ***following criteria are established under AS 08.86.130 and AS 08.86.162 for programs of***
337 ***graduate study for either a doctorate or a master's degree in psychology: the institution***
338 ***offering the program must be accredited by one of the regional accrediting bodies recognized***

339 **by the Council of Postsecondary Accreditation. Patrick DeMarco’s doctoral degree did not**
340 **come from an accredited institution.**

341
342 **In a roll call vote called for by Logan Bugayong, the board voted to approve the Request to**
343 **take the EPPP as an Unlicensed Individual for Mark Mayo, license number 133440. With**
344 **unanimous consent, it was resolved to deny the Request to take the EPPP as an Unlicensed**
345 **Individual for Mark Mayo, license number 133440. Mark Mayo will need to apply for a new**
346 **temporary license if he wishes to take the EPPP.**
