### **MEMORANDUM**

Statutory Authority: AS 04.06.100(a): "The board shall adopt regulations governing the manufacture, barter, sale, consumption, and possession of alcoholic beverages in the state that are consistent with this title and necessary to carry out the purpose of this title in a

manner that will protect the public health, safety, and welfare."

**Status:** 

Public comment period closed on October 4, 2019

Manufacturing licensees (breweries, distilleries, and wineries) have restrictions on the activities that can occur on their licensed premises, if they offer onsite consumption of their products. AS 04.11.130(e) for brewery licenses states:

- (e) Unless prohibited by AS 04.16.030, a holder of a brewery license may sell not more than 36 ounces a day of the brewery's product to a person for consumption on the premises if
  - (1) the brewery does not allow live entertainment, televisions, pool tables, dart games, dancing, electronic or other games, game tables, or other recreational or gaming opportunities on the premises where the consumption occurs;
  - (2) the brewery does not provide seats at the counter or bar where the product is served; and
  - (3) the room where the consumption occurs is not open before 9:00 a.m. and serving of the product ends not later than 8:00 p.m.

Similar language is located at AS 04.11.170(e) for distilleries and at 3 AAC 304.380 for wineries.

In 2017, AMCO received complaints by phone and email (example email attached) regarding activities in the consumption area of manufacturing licenses. The email example mentions a brewery and requests "the Board's position...on enforcement of this statute." (The phone complaints were recorded as ARMS incidents. Because AMCO no longer has access to ARMS and was not given our ARMS log, we are unable to provide information regarding the number and substance of the complaints.)

AMCO seeks to investigate and resolve complaints, as directed by the board in its adopted enforcement priorities, and as noted in the 2014 and 2017 Legislative Audits. A 2014 audit finding

states, "The board should implement a process to monitor and track all complaints to ensure they are resolved in a timely manner." A 2017 audit finding states, "The board and AMCO director should implement a process to monitor and track complaints to ensure they are assessed for follow up action and investigated in a timely manner."

As I was unaware of the board ever making an interpretation on the record of the meaning of "live entertainment, televisions, pool tables, dart games, dancing, electronic or other games, game tables, or other recreational or gaming opportunities" (particularly "live entertainment" and "other recreational...opportunities"), I brought this issue to the board at the January 23, 2018, requesting board guidance on how these sections of statute and regulation should be interpreted and enforced and thus how the complaints should be addressed.

At that meeting, the board opened a regulations project to clarify "entertainment" and "other recreational opportunities." A draft was brought to the board at the June 12, 2018, meeting. At that meeting, the board requested that the language be strengthened to reflect the legislative intent—that the licensees are manufacturers and not retailers.

A revised proposal was brought to the board at the July 2019 meeting, which attempted to implement the board's direction. Various board members commented on their dissatisfaction with the proposed language, but voted (4-1) to put the proposal out for public comment to allow for a more informed discussion.

The proposal was posted for public comment for 39 days, closing on October 4, 2019. While we have not counted the number of public comments received, the combined document of all comments (which is attached) is 1,270 pages.

#### James,

This has been a recurring theme (ongoing strife between BDL licensees and manufacturer's 'tasting rooms'), and I wanted to find out what the Board's position was on enforcement of this statute:

I've heard numerous accounts of patrons being served 'substantially in excess' of 36 oz, as well as plenty of 'entertainment' and 'recreational activities' (see website for examples of past and ongoing activities): <a href="http://www.hoodoobrew.com/category/events/">http://www.hoodoobrew.com/category/events/</a>, as well as this gem of a photo (in HooDoo 'beer garden' – is this even within their licensed premises boundary?):



### AS 04.11.130. Brewery License.

- (a) A brewery license authorizes the holder to operate a brewery where beer is manufactured and bottled or barreled for sale.
- (b) The holder of a brewery license may sell beer in quantities of

- (1) not more than five gallons a day to an individual who is present on the licensed premises for consumption off the premises:
- (2) more than five gallons a day to a person who is licensed under this title, or in another state or country.
- (c) The holder of a brewery license may permit a person to sample small portions of the brewery's product free of charge unless prohibited by AS 04.16.030.
- **(d)** The biennial brewery license fee is \$1,000.
- **(e)** Unless prohibited by AS 04.16.030, a holder of a brewery license may sell not more than 36 ounces a day of the brewery's product to a person for consumption on the premises if
- (1) the brewery does not allow live entertainment, televisions, pool tables, dart games, dancing, electronic or other games, game tables, or other recreational or gaming opportunities on the premises where the consumption occurs;
- (2) the brewery does not provide seats at the counter or bar where the product is served, and
- (3) the room where the consumption occurs is not open before 9:00 a.m. and serving of the product ends not later than 8:00 p.m.

My understanding of this is that Brewery licensees will forgo their privilege to SELL up to 36 oz IF they are not in compliance with (e)(1)...

Could you provide some clarification and/or feedback on enforcement of this statute?

My name is Dale Whitney. I am part owner of the Hellenthal Building in downtown Juneau, which houses Devil's Club Brewing Company.

My partners and I spent millions to renovate this historic building, which had been a derelict in the center of Juneau's tourist district. Our building faces both Front Street, where there are three traditional bars and a package store, and North Franklin Street, where there is the Brewery and and a distillery. Our investment has helped to revitalize an entire area of town, and we have received the thanks of the mayor for our efforts. We could not have accomplished this without securing the Brewery as a tenant. Their success helps underpin the success of the entire area and Juneau's thriving tourism economy. I can see nothing offensive about the little events they occasionally hold.

The Board may only enact regulations that are necessary to "protect the public health, safety, and welfare." AS 04.06.100(a). Allowing a local artist to show some paintings, or having a poet read some poems, or raising some money to improve hiking trails or help someone with a medical problem poses no threat to the public health, safety, or welfare. Quite the contrary. This regulation is not only unnecessary, it is contrary to statute. In a free country, if a statute is unclear, the default must always be the least restrictive alternative. This regulation is an unnecessary burden on small business and an affront to the principles of freedom and limited government.

The many problems in our area that stem from alcohol all come from the traditional bars. On Front Street, where the bars are, from our building we observe extreme over serving of patrons. On a daily basis we see public intoxication, harassment of tourists and other individuals by inebriates, routine violence, brawling, and occasional stabbings and shootings. More than once I have had to hose blood and vomit off the Front Street sidewalk in the morning. On the side of the building with the Brewery and distillery, we see people interested in art visiting the new gallery next door to the Brewery, tourists excitedly shopping for T-shirts and outdoor gear, and families waiting in line for ice cream or eating at the new restaurants and food trucks that have sprung up since the Brewery and distillery opened in a newly thriving district.

I urge the Board to protect our health, safety, and welfare by supporting breweries and distilleries, and to turn its attention to cracking down on the bars and package stores that have made fortunes by tearing apart Alaskan lives. I strongly oppose this proposed regulation.

### To whom it may Concern,

The proposal to change definitions in 3 AAC 304.390 seems like a deliberate attempt to circumvent the working group for Alaska alcohol regulations concerning title 4. There are contentious issues in title 4 and a restructuring of the rules will require compromises between different parties and stakeholder groups. A unilateral change by the agency would undermine the process to the detriment of some parties and the benefit of others.

This proposal reinterprets laws that have been in place for 11 years and under which people have created plans, built businesses, and purchase properties. This change would alter the niche businesses occupy in their communities, placing further restrictions on the already very limited way a tasting room can provide value to their community. This would punish small communities as much as it would punish the businesses themselves.

One has to wonder what the motivation is to further restrict one class of businesses and why our businesses weren't contacted or consulted about the change before it was proposed. Where did this come from and why?

I believe some bar owners feel tasting rooms are unfair competition. There are a number of points that refute that assertion. We already operate under strict, and many people feel, ridiculous limitations. That gives bars a tremendous advantage.

The current soft economy has affected many of us across license types. It may be easy to scapegoat tasting rooms for lost business somewhere else, but we've been losing business for a few years too, which points to another culprit.

Tasting rooms for the most part are not really industry pioneers. We are not driving the evolving trends in consumer preferences; we are following them. I have to think every day about what people are looking for, and what I can do to improve, evolve, and expand my market. It may be tempting to assign blame for faltering support, but it may be more productive to ask how one can strengthen one's own position rather than weaken someone else's.

The "three tier system" is often cited as a reason to disallow the tasting room model. The three tier system was adopted to avoid monopolistic tendencies from some large players which we can all agree is a bad thing. Most tasting rooms are small businesses. We could easily limit the number of tasting rooms a brewery could have to address any monopolistic concerns. Again, the evolution of alcohol business types across the country is dramatic. I don't think it will be smart or effective to ignore that here in Alaska. Many states seem to thrive when they embrace the evolution.

The investment in a BDL is often cited as something a bar has made that gives a right to a certain amount of protection. In a limited entry state, there is validity to this observation. But it's worth noting the investment in a brewery is often many times that much money. Not only is the equipment very expensive, but the ongoing costs are even more significant. The labor,

training, ingredients, utilities, space requirements, and more factors add up to many thousands of dollars every month. Brewing is a capital intensive business. One of the benefits of that is that we circulate more of our money throughout the community.

In my experience, most breweries are businesses that are trying to create value for their communities while creating careers for themselves and their employees. Let's think about what we can do support that kind of approach to business.





### AMCO,

I want to share my opinion about the proposed regulation banning First Friday and other social events in distilleries, breweries and wineries in Alaska.

I am a late blooming Alaskan artist. First Fridays/ art shows afford me (and several others) the opportunity to display my work and get my name out in public. Small events like these open doors to future shows in bigger venues. You have to start somewhere. These places provide a clean, classy and relaxed atmosphere to display artwork for the public to enjoy.

By removing the ability to host these events, it not only hampers business opportunities for distilleries and the like, it also takes away another platform for artists.

I myself have two First Friday events scheduled for 2020. I had to schedule them a year in advance and I have been steadily working on artwork specific for these events. If you take these events away, you will add yet another obstacle to my outreach goals.

I am sure I speak for several artists who have also been affected by changes in administration and funding for public art. PLEASE don't take away our ability to share our artwork, often inspired by the beauty of Alaska, with our fellow Alaskans and visitors from near and far. The very act of depriving these businesses the ability to host these events can be seen as an infringement on the first amendment right to assemble, and could cost the state a lot of money in litigation. People don't want to see state funds wasted in such matters.

Another topic I have recently been made aware of is the proposed prohibition of distilleries to serve mixed cocktails in there establishments. Most distilled spirits (vodka and gin in most Alaskan distilleries) are specifically made to be mixed in cocktails. People go to tasting rooms to decide whether they like their favorite drink made with that specific spirit. It is my opinion that as long as what they are serving contains the spirit they are distilling, that should be enough.

I was able to google-up some facts. Look at California. A California bar's liquor license can cost about the same as an Alaska license (upwards of \$400,000), but brewery taprooms in California get to stay open to midnight. Brewery taprooms in California can have live music, games, events, trivia nights, poker nights, etc. For example, California's BarrelHouse Brewing Company says "Bringing together delicious craft beer with live music and events has and always will be our focus."

The California Type 48 Liquor License: "These licenses can be very costly and hard to come by. Depending on the location of your establishment and current market trends, you may find yourself paying over \$300,000 for this precious license." "The Type 48 license is used by establishments that exclusively sell beer, wine, and liquor to patrons 21 years of age or older." I see no benefit to this restriction. This may cause bar and liquor store sales to drop somewhat, however that isn't cause for regulation. If people begin to gather at breweries and such, that forces bars to improve, either in quality of facility, safer atmospheres, or to provide some other aspect to bring customers in. This is the true advantage of capitalism- the best businesses succeed based on the quality, innovative approach, or competitive pricing. I am writing this letter with deep concern about the proposed regulations concerning distilleries, wineries and breweries in the State of Alaska. Mostly, I am concerned about the proposal that these places of business will have limited if no activities or social gatherings allowed if the proposal passes.

First off, I am a visual artist and have held several First Friday art shows in a few distilleries in the Fairbanks area. I have an opening scheduled October 4 of this year in a distillery. If distilleries, breweries and wineries, are not able to host activities such as art openings and art shows, local artists are limited to other venues. There is a lot of competition for decent venues.. If the Fairbank area loses just 3 locations that is a total of 36 artist who wont be showing art in a year in Fairbanks alone. When you do the math with all the similar business in the State the numbers increase dramatically. Distilleries are allowed to sell minimal alcoholic drinks to each of age guest at these shows. That draws the art appreciation community into these establishments so they can have a drink or two and look at the current works hanging in the tasting rooms. The businesses in which I have had shows handle most of the selling at no expense to me. Neither do they charge commission. After the show opening they continue to complete sales transactions for me that I would not be available to complete on site as they are. When a buyer wants to purchase a painting or work of art they usually want it right away. The business make sure this happens and ensures more sales for all of the artists. It's a win-win situation. The artists sells art and the distillery may sell a bottle of vodka. Both which are good for the local economy.

Secondly, I am a patron of both bars and distilleries, breweries and wineries. If this proposal is encouraged by cabaret, bars and clubs believing the business allowed to sell minimal drinks is making a negative impact on their business I am pretty sure they are mistaken. I am not in the bar industry so I don't have any numbers but when my friends and I attend an art opening at a distillery, we usually finish the night at a local bar. The 3 oz of alcoholic drinks we may or may not purchase at the distillery has no effect on where we spend our time and money consuming alcohol and food later in the evening.

It would erase a space used by local organizations such as Juneau Trail Mix, a group that has dedicated innumerable hours to developing such an appreciated network of trails around our beautiful hometown. These spaces that we could potentially lose did not take the place of ones preexisting in bars and restaurants. No, they are new and they are valuable. But their value is not in what they put in the pockets of the business owners who host them. It is in what they provide for the community and its improvement as a whole.

Beyond this I am confused why you would prohibit distilleries, wineries, cideries and breweries from advertising social gatherings, while continuing to allow bars and restaurants to do so. What is really going here?

I strongly urge you not to rush these changes. This draft that you have proposed is unconstitutional and need much reworking. Thank you for your time.

# To Whom it may Concern,

I write to you on behalf of the Brewer's Guild of Alaska, a trade organization that represents craft breweries, cider makers, and wineries across the state of Alaska. Recently, AMCO was commissioned to create clearer regulatory language with regards to AS 04.11.130 (e)(1). While the Brewer's Guild appreciates the effort of AMCO to create a clear regulatory framework for businesses to operate within, the proposal itself is wrought with flaws and contains similarly ambiguous language that the regulatory project intended to clarify.

The proposed language contains vague and undefined terms such as "festivals" and "presentations". These terms are not defined in regulation or statute, therefore the AMCO effort to clarify "other recreational or gaming activities..." with even more broad and undefined terminology is a failure with regards to this regulatory project.

Furthermore, the regulations proposed are well outside the powers and duties of AMCO and the ABC Board set forth in AS 04.06.090. AMCO's proposed language is unenforceable as it outside the regulatory enforcement duties granted by the State of Alaska and clearly violates the commercial constitutional rights of Breweries, Distilleries, and Wineries. It is highly unlikely that the proposed language would survive a court challenge and if adopted will only serve to waste the time and resources of business owners and the State of Alaska.

In conclusion, The Brewer's Guild of Alaska requests that the ABC board decline to adopt this proposed regulation and allow the Title 4 re-write process that is currently underway to be completed before requesting any further regulatory projects with regards to manufacturers. For over a decade the applicable statute has existed without further regulatory clarification required, resulting in zero adverse health or safety concerns for Alaskans and it's visitors.

To the Alcohol Beverage Control Board Members,

I am writing to express my inability to understand why the AMCO would seek to curtail community gatherings, art shows, organized events of any type, or limit other recreational activities at small local craft breweries and distilleries.

Since I do not understand the real motive, I cannot comment specifically to such an endeavor, but perhaps, if you will allow, I might offer some points that could illustrate the value of continuing to permit these vital social activities.

The pride of craftsmanship (making of fine craft beers and spirits) is something that has demonstrable effects beyond the quality of the product and the personal pride of the maker. These effects manifest in myriad ways, from engendering a sense of quality, brought on by both the obvious (painstaking care and cost of production) and presentation, along with its associated price; this sets the product itself as well as the place it is sold/tasted/enjoyed apart from a "seedy" bar or a common late night liquor store. Because of this, patrons are less likely to approach the (brewery or distillery) with mind to the low goal of "getting drunk with the guys". No, this is a very different sort of clientele!

It may be hard to believe, but not all customers of breweries and distilleries actually imbibe! Others do so very moderately. A brewery's tasting room is not a place to swill. Go to a bar for that. (I am one who never sets foot in bars)

A meeting place for people, culture, community, art, and a politically neutral safe haven for people to meet and celebrate life's punctuations could not, in my mind, be a bad thing. Quite the contrary. In fact, a welcoming, supportive atmosphere for community members and visitors both to share stories, art, and even classes or talks, is so far removed from the idea of the "bar" that I am quite surprised that the AMCO deems it necessary to curb these "goings-on".

No, you see, the issue you perceive is not the fact that throughout agrarian history, humans have been getting together and enjoying life, brews, culture, and art. Yes, they've even had fun at the same time! Shocking, I know, but the reality is that the vast majority of these people lead normal, productive lives. Because of the interwoven community and interpersonal support, people with financial, emotional, or physical complaints are more more likely to get the help they need before the issue manifests into a real problem.

The "real" problems are in the dark. Lonely people, pre-suicides, drunk drivers, rowdies in fistfights, thieves, underage drinking (and associated issues), and for instance, littering. When you see alcohol-related trash on the side of the road, how often is it the container of some cheap beer or booze? Did the container come from a craft brewery? Usually not.

I suspect the real issue here could something more sinister ...perhaps profit-based (tax-paying bars complaining of lost revenue?), or less-sinister but more pervasive: A misguided sense that laying down the law will help people not ruin lives. Missionary syndrome? Temperance

# evangelism?

The obvious extension of your prohibition (yes, I used that word on purpose) of various natural, fun, cultural and educational activities at a community haven is that the very people you seek to control with laws and taxes will not go away .. they will simply vanish out of sight. (Again, refer to Prohibition, and consider how well that worked). It is, sadly, not too uncommon for governments/lawmakers to be out-of-touch with the reality of the way people function in society. I'm sure the intent of the AMCO is well-meant, but in reality, the new definitions proposed will have more deleterious effect on hard-working artisanal breweries' and distilleries' businesses and the people of the communities that support them, and in turn are enriched by their presence, than any benefit you may hope for.

# Dear Alcoholic Beverage Control Board;

I am commenting as a member of the general public. My interest in this matter is preventing unjustified state interference with our "natural right to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness". I hold no interest in any license pertaining to manufacturing, distributing, or dispensing alcoholic beverages.

This proposal attempts to define "other recreational or gaming opportunities" that would not be 'allowed' in a brewery, distillery, or winery operated under license from the State of Alaska by specifying several other activities that would be prohibited in addition to the list of activities that are already prohibited in these establishments by existing statutes or regulations.

The activities that are already prohibited are:

- live entertainment,
- televisions.
- pool tables,
- · dart games,
- dancing,
- electronic or other games,
- game tables.

<u>The 'other recreational or gaming opportunities'</u> that would be specifically listed by this proposal are:

- (1) festivals;
- (2) games and competitions;
- (3) classes;
- (4) parties, except for private parties limited to specific invited guests;
- (5) presentations or performances;
- (6) other types of organized social gatherings that are advertised to the general public.

It is important to note several things about the activities that are currently prohibited as well as those proposed to be prohibited:

- None of these activities pose a threat to public health
- None of these activities are by themselves 'illegal'
- None of these activities would be prohibited if performed in a venue licensed under AS 04.11.090 as a 'Beverage Dispensary'

From the perspective of 'public health', there is no distinction between serving beverages that are brewed, distilled, or fermented on site or delivered to the site for sale, nor does it make any difference whether the listed activities are performed at one site or the other; therefore there is no 'compelling reason', based on protecting public health, for the state to prohibit the activities

at a brewery, distillery, or winery - especially considering they are not prohibited at a 'beverage dispensary'.

Therefore, the proposed changes to the definition of recreational or gaming opportunities should not be adopted.

Although I don't support our breweries solely because of activities such as yoga and painting parties, I realize that these practices have been accepted over the years and are important parts of the tasting rooms' goals to be active participants in their communities.

I understand that certain compromises have been made when allowing tasting rooms, but it is counterproductive to limit a growing industry, that also supports tourism, during this economic downturn. I, as a craft beer enthusiast, choose to support breweries and their tasting rooms because that is what I enjoy. For me, it is not a zero-sum game; I also visit bars, taverns and restaurants and don't feel I am making a choice between one or the other.

As I'm sure you are aware, the craft brewing industry in Alaska is directly responsible for 1,400 jobs, \$340 million in income, \$27 million in taxes and fees, and \$84 million in-state expenditures. During the current economic downturn, this industry continues to be a bright spot in the economy and according to a new economic trends report from the Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce Development, it remains "unscathed by state recession." To stifle a successful and growing industry during an economic downturn is counterproductive and ultimately harmful to more than just the craft brewing industry that I support.

Please consider adopting a less restrictive definition of entertainment and recreation so that the industry I support may continue to grow and provide a community focused venue for me to enjoy my craft beers when I am not visiting our other great hospitality venues.

WHEREAS, AS 04.06.100 tasks the Alaska Alcoholic Beverage Control Board with adopting regulations that are "necessary to carry out the purpose of this title [*Title 4 – Alcoholic Beverages*] in a manner that will protect the public health, safety, and welfare;" and

As the owners of Turnagain Brewing in Anchorage, we wish to convey our strong opposition to the proposed new definitions of recreation and gaming as they relate to breweries licensed under AS 04.11.130. The proposed regulations are in direct conflict with the statutory requirements and mission of the Alcohol Beverage Control Board, exceed the restrictions on brewery activities imposed by AS 04.11.130, unnecessarily impede normal and expected brewery tasting room practices, impinge upon individual's rights to free association, expression and political speech, and go against a changing tide of consumer behavior and demand.

The proposed regulations directly contradict the ABC Board's statutory responsibility and Mission Statement. Statute directs the Board to "carry out the purpose of this title in a manner that will protect the public health, safety, and welfare." The Mission Statement says that the Board will "Enforce alcohol and marijuana commerce laws and provide clear, consistent standards for licensure to protect the public from harm." Every action the Board takes must be consistent with its statutory responsibility to protect the public health.

AS 04.11.130 expressly allows taprooms to sell consumers up to 36 oz of beer per day for onsite consumption, so long as breweries comply with restrictions on hours of operation and certain specified activities commonly associated with bars and taverns. Activities which encourage consumers to linger while consuming the allowed 36 ounces should be encouraged by the Board as this is a strategy to reduce overconsumption and intoxication as described in approved and required server training courses. Prohibiting any activity that slows consumption rates, as these proposed regulations would do, directly contradicts the Board's mission to enforce the law in a manner that protects the public health.

Interpreting AS 04.111.130 as intending to prohibit any activity that might encourage a consumer to linger is erroneous. It is clear from a simple reading of the Statute, as well as a review of the legislative record surrounding passage of AS 04.111.130, that the intent if the restrictions were to distinguish and prohibit those activities that are commonly associated with bars and taverns. The statute provides some examples of common bar activities as a guideline and any expansion of that list of activities should be drawn from whether or not said activity is one similar to those expressly prohibited and those activities commonly associated with bars or taverns. Activities provided by breweries that educate consumers on their product, encourage consumers to linger while consuming their allowed beverage allotment, or encourage members of the public to gather in breweries are not prohibited in AS 04.11.130. Families playing a card game together is not an activity one associates with bars or taverns. Nonprofits inviting the public to hear about their mission and ask for

support is not an activity one typically associates with a bar or tavern. Hosting monthly rotating art exhibitions is not a typical bar or tavern activity. A bar or tavern could offer those activities, but these are not activities the average Alaskan would associate as a bar or tavern activity per se. Further, restricting any activity that invites the general public to gather in a tasting room appears to be a violation of an individual's right to free speech and privacy. Just as an example, candidates for public office and public office holders have used our space to invite constituents to come and discuss issues of concern in our community. It would be a violation of the constitution to prohibit this activity. Having our taproom staff police individuals' phones and other electronic devices to make sure that games are not being played would be a clear violation a right to privacy.

Tasting rooms are expressly allowed to sell up to 36 oz of their product per consumer per day. As a small start up brewery, we rely on this retail activity to help educate consumers and build demand for our product. The high cost of equipment and raw ingredients in Alaska puts us at a competitive disadvantage with lower 48 breweries. Activities which attract consumers help to defray the high cost of entry into this market. Activities that attract consumers and promote responsible consumption are normal and accepted business practices.

Growth of the craft beverage industry has been a bright spot during an otherwise dismal recession in Alaska. Craft beer tourism is real and important for our struggling economy. Arbitrary prohibitions which only serve to protect one segment of the beverage industry from another do nothing to protect the public health. The Board, and State as a whole, should try to keep pace with new consumer markets rather than stifle growth and change.

Finally, providing clarity (per the Board's Mission Statement) should be an underlying rational for these proposed regulatory changes. The changes do not provide clarity, and in fact raise more questions than provide answers. At what point does talking with a consumer about our products become a banned presentation? At what point does a spontaneous gathering become a banned party? To what degree are we as proprietors expected to monitor and regulate constitutionally protected activities of our patrons? How will AMCO staff enforce these ambiguities? Rather than defining "gaming or other recreational activities", this proposal expands prohibitions in a dangerously nebulous manner.

For these reasons, we ask that the Board reject the proposed definitions of "other recreational or gaming opportunities".

This proposed change appears to be an attempt by competing alcohol licenses holders to restrict the operation of distilleries, not for the public good or welfare, but purely to restrict a business from allowing social interactions and one-off community activities to occur in the business place.

There is no revenue advantage to the distillery, it's products are already statutorily limited and quantity is curtailed. The social interaction or community gathering is incidental and a good public relations opportunity for the distillery. This regulatory change is vague and unduly restrictive, it could be interpreted to restrict the public's right to free speech and association. I can't have a book group meeting at a distillery, or invite people to my birthday party there? Is a gallery of artwork a festival? More definitions please, but only those imposed using the statutory process.

The current statute addresses the limitations on distilleries and appears to require a distillery dispensary to offer a limited amount of its product to customers. The obvious intent of AS 04.11.170(e) is to limit activities to those that promote the distillery product exclusively, it cannot function as a bar that serves alcohol from any source but it's own products.

AS 04.11.170 (e) restricts a distillery that sells a limited amount of its product for immediate consumption from providing other ongoing entertainment to its customers.

It appear plain that AS 04.11.170(e) is intended to restrict a distillery from offering other revenue raising business on the premises on an ongoing, regular basis.

The effect of the regulation is to expand that prohibition to occasional, non revenue, public opportunities to gather at a common location for any specific purpose!

It is also a blatant run around to the statute to add a definition section to a statute by means of a regulation, rather than using the legislative process to include definitions to terms in a statute within the statutes. Definitions are substantive and should not be allowed to be appended by a board.

Compare the intent expressed in the type of activity involved in AS 04.11.170(e):

- (e) Unless prohibited by AS 04.16.030, a holder of a distillery license may sell not more than three ounces a day of the distillery's product to a person for consumption on the premises if
- (1) the distillery does not allow live entertainment, televisions, pool tables, dart games, dancing, electronic or other games, game tables, or other recreational or gaming opportunities on the premises where the consumption occurs;

To the activity proposed to be included by the regulation:

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Does this mean I can't invite a few people to meet me at a distillery to celebrate a birthday? How is that not prohibited by 3 AAC 304.390 (a)(4)? It's a party, it's not private, it's during regular hours - heck I might even want to play a game of some kind (I Spy or Rock Paper Scissors) with my friends, is that a game or competition? Is that something the distillery should not allow? I can't perform an impression, tell a joke or present a great idea to improve my community?

This definition is a substantive change to the other kinds of activities referred to in AS 04.11.170(e). Offering games involving a pool table, keeping a TV on, featuring live entertainment all are regular, ongoing forms of entertainment that invite business patrons to linger and consume and purchase unlimited products offered at a bar. The current limits on the sale of the distillery product means that people don't linger for any other reason than to try the

distillery product as a (gasp) social activity. There is a 2 drink maximum. A 3 oz total. No food or snacks, an early closing time. A distillery NOT a bar, it can be a great local business that sells its own unique products, enhances a retail district, encourages people to go to other nearby businesses after or before.

I support AMCO's proposed expanded definition of no gaming and recreation for manufacturers with tasting rooms as I believe it will minimize the temptation to find loopholes. To accomplish this, we need better defined and clearly written laws so manufacturers with tasting rooms can legally operate and avoid violations on their license.

The long-standing intent for a tasting room has been a place designed to educate consumers about new products with the intent of developing and expanding a manufacturer customer base with product available through licensed outlets. The strict definition of this intent is what has been in such question lately and it is harming the industry. Don't forget that not long ago CHARR endorsed the proposal change which gave manufacturers the right to charge customers for their samples instead of having to give them away as a way to find compromise and help support growth in the alcohol industry. Now samples have expanded to full servings with added ingredients and the definition of "entertainment" is being challenged. This has caused great confusion and dissent amongst the different license groups which are now overlapping on how they operate. One exception to the proposed definition I think should be considered however is allowing tours of manufacturing facilities which could include educational talks about their products that are produced on site.

Efforts should be put into rewriting the Title 4 laws, including allowing manufacturers with tasting rooms the opportunity to purchase a BDL. Then if any of them want to have entertainment, recreation of any form, or gaming in their tasting room, they have the option to buy a license appropriate for that activity. Improvements to the existing language would establish a clear separation between the different license types while maintaining a level playing field for all businesses invested in the State's alcohol industry. Creating a well-defined path for new businesses to establish and expand a niche for their products is good for business. Having weak language subject to interpretation is not, whether you are new to the industry or have been investing and contributing to it for years.

I am writing in opposition to the proposed changes in which you are seeking public comments. Having been a license holder of the proposed changes for the last 23 years, my opinion is biased. However, as a member of the public, my opinion is still valid. The verbiage adopted in 2006 that has given us the privilege to sell to consumers a very limited amount of our products, within very limited hours and allow very limited activities while they otherwise enjoy the ambiance of our business has allowed us to grow. We have watched the industry within the state grow from under 10 to over 50 breweries, wineries and distilleries. We are economic drivers, job creators and forward thinkers in our state. Market trends from around the country show the same trends, but with most of these states operating under far fewer restrictions. Imagine what we could do if we had a few less restrictions, rather than more? The reasons for the proposed definitions are not driven by public safety, federal or state statute or economic benefit to the state. It is my opinion that pressure for these definitions comes from other licensees that feel the strain of a changing consumer preference and being unwilling to keep up with the trends. It is not up to the state to protect license's perceived value. If we are an "open for business" state, looking for all sources of revenue, it would seem to me our well respected, community minded businesses should be able to conduct their activities within the currently written statute. If definitions are needed, that should be taken up at the legislative level with due process given to any changes. The proposed definitions are beyond far reaching. The art of describing our products to consumers is a presentation up to the point of performance. (Think of the brewer describing the beer and its process from grain to glass, followed up by pouring a perfect example of the efforts and handing it to the "audience".) The addition of "games and competitions" is a repeat of the current verbiage regarding games. The subject is covered. " Other types of organized social gatherings that are advertised to the general public." As an example, our local running club uses our parking lot as a meeting place to begin and end their weekly "fun run" that may or may not include a beer, should they be so inclined. They "advertise" their route via their own means of club communication and use the name of our brewery as a reference point. What is the harm in this? Classes brings up another point. The art and science of brewing is a time honored trade, passed down throughout millennia. Not being able to discuss in some kind of organized fashion, the processes and nuances, styles and history, ideas and education of brewing is too far reaching for AMCO.

I hope the Board will let this pass over, without any changes made. Any and all changes in the current statute should be taken up in the legislative session where there has been years of discussion among the stakeholders. Clarifications are needed, changes are needed, but they all need to be made through the democratic process.

To whom it may concern,

My name is Spencer Douthit and I am a resident of Haines, Alaska. My mailing address is P.O. Box 1102, Haines, 99827. I am writing to voice my opposition to the proposed changes to the definition of recreational or gaming opportunities as presented by the Alcoholic Beverage Control board.

When I first entered Haines Brewing Company after moving to Haines from Fairbanks in 2013 I was introduced to the specific constraints of a brewery tasting room under a manufacturing license. At first I thought the limits on volume and hours were too tight and unnecessary. Over the last 6 years I now see things differently. I see opportunity created by tasting rooms with limited on site consumption during limited hours. I believe that the proposed changes to the definition of recreational or gaming opportunities will negatively affect a core mission of the Alcoholic Beverage Control board to promote responsible consumption of alcohol. I believe it will also hurt part of the alcohol industry that is providing valuable opportunities for our communities in Alaska.

I am a patron of bars, restaurants, distilleries and breweries. I am thankful to be in a smaller community which has all of those types of businesses because they all serve a different role to the residents and visitors. The manufacturer's tasting room is a location that promotes responsible consumption of alcohol because the tasting room laws created those conditions by limiting hours and volume for on site consumption. If these proposed changes are implemented you reduce opportunities for communities to have locations that foster responsible consumption of alcohol.

A day inside the brewery in Haines is a display of a healthy community space. Patrons come for many reasons such as sampling a great locally manufactured product, meeting to talk about business decisions, seeing artwork from locals, hearing about the latest changes to the community radio station, celebrating a birthday, gathering for a borough staff retirement, or having a meet and greet for southeast conference. Those community uses of the brewery would not exist without hard working local business owners that produce a great product and a clean, healthy environment to sample it in. The same community use would also not exist with the proposed changes to the definition of recreation. No establishment in Haines under any other alcohol licensing provides the same type of healthy, open space with an alcohol limited environment. There are many residents here that would never enter a bar, yet find the distillery or brewery a safe and respectable space to meet.

Some may argue the original intent of the tasting room law was to create locations strictly for beer connoisseurs to sample the different varieties before making a purchase for off site consumption, but the law has created something brilliant and healthy for communities in Alaska. It has created a place where residents and visitors can witness and participate in healthy, moderate alcohol consumption during community events. This is something that needs to be fostered and not stifled.

The Haines Brewing Company began in 1999 in a very small, bare bones building on the fairgrounds. Haines is small and our distribution challenges are great and so the modest beginning was appropriate for the entrepreneurial couple that started the business. Sixteen years of hard work later, the brewery purchased land on Main Street in Haines and built a new beautiful building with lots of tasting room space. Part of the success of the business was their attention to the social bottom line by being supportive of community functions, and after their expansion the ability to provide a space for some appropriate functions. The proposed change in definition of recreation would eliminate the community functions by creating a situation where a tasting room could be violating the law without even knowing it just because how that function was organized or advertised. That will damage the relationship between communities and the business.

Judging by the ABC board "Definition of Recreational and Gaming Opportunities Q and A" the intent of the change is to clarify separate licenses so things like performances, entertainment, games, and recreation are more clearly excluded from tasting rooms. Unfortunately, the draft definition takes too broad of a view of recreation and will also exclude our borough staff from organizing a retirement gathering. The draft definition will exclude the display of local artwork. The draft definition will eliminate the ability of tasting rooms to be venues of community importance the way they serve today. It also creates an situation for the businesses to be wary of any gathering since they are responsible for self-enforcement and may not know the details of how a group organized their visit.

If the board passes the new definition of recreation these community happenings will not just be picked up by another permitted alcohol license. In our town these gatherings will not change venue to a bar, they will not get a special event permit, they will not meet at a restaurant, they will happen at a private residence or at an alcohol free venue. That is because the tasting room in Alaska has become an entirely different entity that serves a unique need in our communities. The ABC board can listen to the interests of establishments which see tasting rooms as threatening to their businesses, but I believe the board will be wisest to recognize that tasting rooms serve different roles than other alcohol establishments entirely and changing the law will not shift business to other licensees.

Changing the law will hurt alaskan breweries and distilleries who are making a healthy manufacturing industry statewide in communities large to small. They have capitalized within their already clear and established constraints on an unfilled demand for a healthy, distraction free environment where community can meet and moderate amounts of alcohol are consumed. Starting small, and getting their foot in the door with a tasting room under the existing law is improving the alcohol industry for the entire state by increasing the quality and availability of products for distributors and retailers. Further restrictions to tasting rooms will also negatively impact our communities which have begun to rely on tasting rooms for certain social and community functions.

# Board Members -

I am contacting you tonight to voice my strong opposition to any further restrictions on activities, or "fun", that might occur at breweries throughout the state. In fact, I would encourage the board to roll back the restrictions that were introduced last year in favor of returning many beloved traditions to these local businesses.

When I was an undergrad at the University of Alaska Fairbanks, well before small breweries were a thing in Fairbanks, I enjoyed the atmosphere that the on-campus, student-run Pub provided - a safe environment for students to lightly imbibe only beer and wine, meet with a tutor, play a card game with friends or socially interact with friends without the expectation of drinking heavily. Pub bartenders looked out for their patrons and there was rarely ever trouble at the Pub. My group of friends chose the Pub because of this safety factor. Unlike the local bars in town, my friends were not encouraged to over-consume nor did my female friends fear being roofied in this controlled, relaxing and safe environment.

As I grew older and the brewery scene started establishing itself throughout the state, I found out that the breweries, with its limits on consumption and relaxed atmosphere, provided the same safe environment. I take advantage of this environment weekly, whether for a brew after work, to display my artwork, or to build a community photography group.

My wife and I often drop by the breweries on our date nights to read books quietly together - a bar doesn't provide this experience, nor does any encourage this behavior. The breweries encourage it.

As a photographer, I have, along with many of my local artist friends, taken advantage of breweries and shared my artwork at them as a First Friday event. Your proposed restrictions would eliminate this unique opportunity for not just local artists but also for community members - allowing them to interact with artists and art in a much more casual environment. Given that our current state administration does not appreciate funding for the arts enough to encourage non-profits to open up new galleries, these environments act as one of the only spaces in some communities for art to be seen. Your restrictions would eliminate that amazing opportunity - and, let me be clear - this is not an opportunity that local bars offer.

As an educator, I also run a local photography group for amateur and professional photographers in the Fairbanks area - I'm quite fond of the pun attached to the group's name: "Photography Untapped". From that, I imagine you can guess that we choose to meet at local breweries, and do so bi-monthly, providing a relaxed environment for artists to network, share their work, offer portfolio reviews and create bonds. My local brewery even reserves a table for our group so we always have a space set aside - we feel welcome in ways that can't ever be replicated anywhere else - and certainly not at the local bars.

As a father, I enjoy bringing my son along to the local breweries and play card games with him while we eat from a food truck parked outside and he enjoys a root beer. He also gets to

see me in a healthy environment that promotes responsible drinking habits, which will no doubt have a positive impact on him and his choices once he reaches drinking age. I cannot, and will not, bring my son to a bar.

I am not the type of person that would frequent bars. Their mixture of overindulgence, machismo, and unsafe atmospheres do not interest me. I enjoy the fact that breweries are limited to 36 ounces per patron - and would never ask for that to be changed. It has created an amazing culture focused on the craft of beer making rather than drinking for intoxication's sake. Eliminating "fun" from these environments is honestly foolish. It not only will curtail the development of a bustling new industry for the state but will also send people out to bars without alcohol limits, causing more problems. Drinking culture is changing in the state - and for the better by becoming safer in the very establishments you're targeting. Your restrictions would set the state back, not move it forward.

Do not add more restrictions to these amazing safe spaces for locals. Allow us to have our "fun" in the variety of safe ways we have it.

As a co-owner/ operations manager/ head brewer of a micro brewery in Alaska, I feel compelled to contact you in regards to the recent regulations project findings regarding entertainment in brewery taprooms.

I learned to homebrew in college in Utah and obtained a job in Alaska after graduating in 2005. As a mechanical project engineer I worked throughout the state in the oil and gas industry, quickly paying off my student loans and saving my hard earned money to someday pursue my passion of opening my own business. In 2017 my dream became a reality and Girdwood Brewing Company was born. Beginning with the initial permitting process to the eventual demise of SB76 we've been through a tumultuous 2.5 years from a regulatory perspective as a young brewery. For an industry that is up & coming and continues to thrive year after year, I'm amazed at the roadblocks the government continues to try and put into place in order to hinder our success. The more beer we produce & sell, the more taxes we pay; I'm amazed that the state is trying to limit our ability to do so in such unsure times for the tripod of industries that support the economy: oil & gas, tourism, and fishing. Girdwood Brewing Company's motto: Local Brews, Epic Views is a testament to the reason people come here. They are in search of beautiful landscapes & relaxing environments, both of which we offer at the brewery.

From a legal perspective, the proposed regulations are inherently flawed (see attached legal rhetoric from persons more qualified than myself). The new language attempts to clarify an already vague & confusing section of statute but only makes it more open for interpretation. AMCO's primary directive is to ensure the health, safety and welfare of the public. How does placing more restrictions on breweries; arguably the most regulated sector of liquor licenses (limited hrs, serving limits, etc.), act to serve this purpose? We are a family friendly establishment that is respected in our community for serving alcohol responsibly. At the end of the day, I'm just another law abiding small business owner working more than I imagined to keep my employees happy & support my family. I live in Girdwood with my wife and 2 young boys, employ 13 local residents and provide a platform for several local food trucks to run their businesses and support their families.

In the words of our governor & his staff, "We are open for business, don't get in the way of the private sector growing the economy in Alaska".

Please consider this testimony before adopting the proposed change to the statutes.

RE: Talking points for opposition to AMCO regs



The following are possible talking points for BGA members to use in comments on the proposed AMCO regs. We suggest that comments focus on several points (including any others you want to raise) rather than including all of them. The deadline for comments is October 4.

# **BGA** talking points for opposition to AMCO Regs:

- 1. The statute allowing brewery retail sales has been in place since 2006, and only under the current AMCO director have we seen an effort to create additional restrictions beyond those set by the original statute.
  - Breweries, distilleries, and wineries (including cideries and meaderies) have opened and based their business plans on AMCO's long-standing interpretation of the statute, which allowed activities so long as they were not expressly prohibited by the statute. As Alaska continues to struggle to grow its economy, breweries are one of the few bright spots, despite the current restrictions in place on servings, operating hours, and entertainment. Why would the state seek to further hamper jobs and economic growth with these regulations?
- 2. When the bill creating AS 04.11.130(e) was under consideration, the concern was that tasting rooms not be the equivalent of taverns or bars. Hence the list of activities commonly associated with bars that were explicitly stated as off limits for entertainment by tasting rooms: pool tables, TVs, live music, etc. Bars have not typically been associated with educational classes or events, yoga and other fitness classes, poetry readings, etc., so breweries should be able to offer these activities.
- 3. If the statute was meant to prevent any non-sampling activity, it could have been written and passed as such. Instead, it includes a specific list of prohibited activities. If it's not in the list, manufacturers, for the last 12 years, have been allowed to conduct that activity. Why would the state, after 12 successful years, seek to stifle consumer demand and harm a growing industry?

- 4. The regulations, as proposed, raise serious constitutional concerns and are vague, overbroad, and unenforceable.
  - What is the basis for the state to deny a brewer his or her right to engage in free speech, which includes speech about the product he or she makes or explaining how beer is made?
  - What is the basis for the state to deny a brewery the right to hold an event that includes political speech?
  - If customers wear clothing associated with a particular religious holiday, are breweries obligated to deny them access because the clothing is a religious celebration (a "festival" is defined a day or period of celebration), forcing breweries to violate customers' first amendment rights?
  - At what point does a political conversation become a "presentation?" Are breweries meant to monitor private conversations to ensure that presentations are not being made? Since private parties are allowed, must breweries ensure that private parties are not celebrating a holiday or giving presentations?
  - How would breweries monitor customers' cell phone or lap top usage to ensure that they are not playing games or watching television?
  - If customers are on a first date and one person talks about their background, is that an illegal presentation (or performance)?
  - What is the state's plan for indemnifying breweries, since compliance with the regulations turns breweries into state actors who will likely have to violate customers' rights of privacy and first amendment protections?
  - If a server explains what a particular beer is or explains the breweries history, is that an illegal presentation? Is a menu describing the brewery's story or the brewing process or the beers on tap an illegal written presentation?
  - If a food truck advertises that they are parked at a brewery and a group of friends show up to buy food and get a beer, is that an illegal advertised social activity? If *any* group of people arrive at a brewery together do breweries need to question them to determine whether their presence was prompted by advertising?

- 5. The regulations are anti-small business and will inhibit tourism and general commerce. "Beer tourism" is a growing segment in the travel industry; tourists visit breweries for a sense of local flavor (literally), meet locals, and support local, independent businesses. Just as locals enjoy talks, presentations, classes, tours, and other activities at breweries, tourists expect such activities because they are common, welcomed aspects of the brewery experience in other states. Growth in the industry supports these conclusions in 2014 there were 22 breweries operating in Alaska, in 2019 there are 45. Why would AMCO seek to stifle a growing industry that is creating jobs, substantial local economic impacts across the state, and seeing consistently increasing consumer demand.
- 6. The regulations conflict with AMCO's statutory authority to protect public safety, health, and welfare. The statute allows breweries to serve up to 36 ounces of beer per person per day; giving consumers reasons to drink slowly by enjoying or participating in presentations, classes, and other activities (other than games, live entertainment, or other activities excluded by AS 04.11.130(e)) promotes public safety and welfare.

# Observations on AK Alcoholic Beverage Control Board proposed regulation 3 AAC 304.390

## For use in public comments and industry filings

In general, an agency may not act in a manner that is arbitrary and capricious. Rules, regulations and interpretation must be consistent.

The current inconsistencies in the drafting of the various types of on-premise alcohol license types by the Legislature makes it legally impossible for the board to adopt the proposed 3 AAC 304.390 as currently drafted.

This has to do with how the specific language of each license type was constructed by the Legislature.

The board must be consistent in its application of processes around statutes. If it wants to take the position that language must be explicit in order for an activity to be allowed, then it must apply that rule across all license types.

If the board wants to take the alternate position, that silence in the statute means anything is allowed unless it is specifically disallowed by the Legislature, then it must apply that standard of interpretation across all license types.

See the summaries below of the critical license types:

#### AS Sec 04.11.100 (Restaurant or eating place license)

- -Only allows beer and wine. No mention of spirits, mixed drinks or cocktails.
- -The Legislature was clear it only allows "entertainment" between 3 and 11 pm. Legislature specifically noted the license type does NOT allow tv based events to be shows. This means no sports on tv.
- -The Legislature limited the types of "entertainment" to specific types of activities, such as dancing, karaoke, live performances, etc. No mention of darts, pool, electronic games, is simply listening to live music.

# AS Sec. 04.11.090 (Beverage dispensary license)

- -Standard" bar" type operation.
- -Beer, wine and cocktails.
- -No mention at all given by the Legislature for "entertainment" on the premises. Notice the Legislature gave specifically authority for certain types of "entertainment" for the beer and wine licenses under AS 04.11.100 above, but it is silent for the Beverage Dispensary Licenses under AS 04.11.090.
- -One should argue that this specific lack of authority by the Legislature means that beverage dispensary license holders may have NO entertainment at all. No music, no activities, no dancing, no live performances, no tv and no sporting events.
- -Under standard principals of code interpretation and administrative procedures acts, a state agency may not act in an arbitrary and capricious manner.

-It is interesting that the beverage dispensary license contains no language allowing for the mixing of water, ice, juice or mixers with spirits to make cocktails, yet this is the common practice.

#### AS Sec. 04.11.130 (Brewery License)

- -Does not allow live entertainment, tvs, pool, darts, dancing, etc.
- -Because the restaurant license above only allows certain types of "entertainment", but not all types of entertainment, it seems the restaurant license under AS Sec 04.11.100 also would not allow certain activities that are not otherwise specifically enumerated.
- -For the new proposed rule dealing with "other recreational or gaming opportunities", "classes" in the traditional sense are not recreational.
- -Does the lack of "classes" also mean that a brewery would not be allowed to offer technical beer making classes for aspiring brewers? Are Alaskans interested in brewing forced to leave to go to the Lower 48 to learn the technical aspects of making beer?
- -What if "classes" are free (meaning the brewery does not charge for them)? Are they still classes? What defines a class? What if there is no work product make, no homework, nothing to take home, but rather simply a lecture on the history of beer?
- -Does the prohibition on "presentations" mean that employees are not allowed to educate guests on the type of beer offerings they have, how they are made and how they are best paired? Is a discussion between the employee behind the bar and a patron about these topics a "presentation"? Presentations don't necessarily require a full audience.
- -Under the proposed rule can a brewery offer a tour of its facility and equipment? Can employees answer questions during such tour?
- -What is a "festival". What is the activity or collection of activities that converts a group of people in the same place into a "festival"? Can a brewery have a 5<sup>th</sup> anniversary party open to the public? What if the brewery celebrates its anniversary, open to the public, but without signage? Does it somehow convert into a "festival"? Does a festival require more than one brewery or vendor to be called a "festival"?
- -Is a release of a new beer or specialty handle a "social gathering"? Is a brewery not allowed to advertise it is having a special release to the public? Does the brewery's anniversary fit the definition of a "social gathering advertised to the public"?

# AS Sec. 04.11.140 (Winery license)

No mention at all about "entertainment", games, tv or sports. Nothing that says it is allowed or disallowed. Does this mean there can be classes on how to pair wine and food, or how to make wine? Does it mean such classes are not allowed?

## AS 04.11.170 (Distillery license)

-Does not allow live entertainment, tvs, pool, darts, dancing, etc.

- -Because the Restaurant license above only allows certain types of "entertainment", but not all types of entertainment, it seems the restaurant license under AS Sec 04.11.100 also would not allow certain activities that are not otherwise specifically enumerated.
- -For the new proposed rule dealing with "other recreational or gaming opportunities", "classes" in the traditional sense are not recreational.
- -For the new proposed rule dealing with "other recreational or gaming opportunities", "classes" in the traditional sense are not recreational.
- -Does the lack of "classes" also mean that a distillery would not be allowed to offer technical distilling classes for aspiring distillers? Are Alaskans interested in distilling forced to leave to go to the Lower 48 to learn the technical aspects of making spirits? What if they want to open their own distillery? Can they not work with an Alaska distillery to learn?
- -What if "classes" are free (meaning the distillery does not charge for them)? Are they still classes? What defines a class? What if there is no work product make, no homework, nothing to take home, but rather simply a lecture on the history of spirits?
- -Does the prohibition on "presentations" mean that employees are not allowed to educate guests on the type of spirits offerings they have, how they are made and how they are best paired? Is a discussion between the employee behind the bar and a patron about these topics a "presentation"? Presentations don't necessarily require a full audience.
- -Under the proposed rule can a distillery offer a tour of its facility and equipment? Can employees answer questions during such tour?
- -What is a "festival". What is the activity or collection of activities that converts a group of people in the same place into a "festival"? Can a distillery have a 5<sup>th</sup> anniversary party open to the public? What if the distillery celebrates its anniversary, open to the public, but without signage? Does it somehow convert into a "festival"? Does a festival require more than one distillery or vendor to be called a "festival"?
- -Is a release of a new spirit or specialty product a "social gathering"? Is a distillery not allowed to advertise it is having a special release to the public? Does the distillery's anniversary fit the definition of a "social gathering advertised to the public"?

## **Alaska Administrative Procedure Act Considerations**

The proposed board action, even if adopted, may only be applied prospectively against new licensees, not existing brewery, distillery or winery licensees. **AS Sec. 44.62.240. Limitation on retroactive action** states as follows:

If a regulation adopted by an agency under this chapter is primarily legislative, the regulation has prospective effect only. A regulation adopted under this chapter that is primarily an "interpretative regulation" has retroactive effect only if the agency adopting it has adopted no earlier inconsistent regulation and has followed no earlier course of conduct inconsistent with the regulation. Silence or failure to follow any course of conduct is considered earlier inconsistent conduct.

In this case the board has previously issued licenses and allowed existing brewery, winery and distillery operators to conduct business in a certain manner, with certain rights and privileges of the license, and they have built business models, plans and commercial activities around those past regulatory and legislature interpretations. This proposed action by the board is "interpretive" because it is coming up with definitions of what constitutes "other recreation and gaming activities". By the very nature of how the statutes were drafted it leaves to the agency the interpretation of the text. For years the board has followed a "prior course of conduct" by its silence on the matter. A change in the interpretation of the language and its application against existing brewery, distillery and winery licensees would be inconsistent with the board's prior conduct. The failure of the board to create a definition of "other recreation and gaming activities" or to enforce such limitations is "inconsistent conduct" under the statute.

## Summary

A state agency may not act arbitrarily. A definition of an arbitrary action is to apply one standard for one group and another standard for another group when specific language was enacted by the Legislature. The Legislature did not give the board such broad rule making authority that it can ignore the administrative requirements of the Alaska Administrative Procedure Act (Alaska Statutes Title 44 Chapter 62). AS 44.62.030 forbids a state agency from making a regulation that is inconsistent with a statute.

In this case the silence of the Legislature in specifically authorizing entertainment on the premise of a beverage dispensary license holder (a full service beer, wine and spirits establishment) while the Legislature specifically authorized certain live activities at a beer and wine restaurant license could be grounds for a challenge of the current regulations and the new proposed regulations under draft 3 AAC 304.390 of the board. Once could make a credible argument that the complete silence of the Legislature, with no mention of "entertainment" in the authorizing statutes of the beverage dispensary license, means that no recreational activity, games, performances or tv events would be allowed in those establishments.

The definition of "other recreation or gaming activities" as interpreted in the proposed rule is so broad that it creates opportunity for capricious decisions by the board.

## Dear Chairman Klein,

I've read a handful of articles from different papers about the proposals. I've copied 4 different comments/statistics that stood out to me. Of course I've also waited till the last minute to email you. Then again I do work under pressure.

1. Darwin Biwer, the owner of Darwin's Theory, a cocktail bar and pub in downtown Anchorage, believes in limits and restrictions for how breweries and distilleries serve alcohol so they don't compete with bars.

I have a slightly hard time believing the bars and breweries compete. They do both serve alcohol. One however can only serve beer and a limited amount of it. They also have to close at 8 PM. The other can serve beer and hard alcohol up to an amount that is up to the server. They can be open really late as well. They can also have pool, darts, and pulltabs. Also don't forget about music and live bands.

2. Sen. Peter Micciche has sympathy for bar owners who have paid hundreds of thousands of dollars for their licenses but says there is a clear trend in the industry for craft beers. He says the state's alcohol laws shouldn't curtail the market.

He's right. There are bars that have paid hundreds of thousands of dollars for these permits. However these permits are very very limited and hard to come by. So of course you're going to pay a premium price for them.

There is a very clear trend that the industry is looking towards craft beers. It's not because we just want good tasting beer we also want the atmosphere of talking with friends, meeting new friends, and having a good time without having someone coming up to us that's totally trashed because they've had a really shitty week. I was at a bar with my friends playing pool minding our own business and an intoxicated person came up to the pool table and threw a pool ball across the table and then walked out of the bar. That to some degree is to be expected in a bar. However my friends and I just shrugged it off. And I get it when you have a really bad week you want to blow off steam. But we don't do that at a brewery we go to a bar to do that. Also the bars have TVs. If I want to watch TV and drink by myself I go to a bar and if I want to talk to people and drink I go to the brewery.

3. Ellis, with Midnight Sun, thinks the intent of earlier regulations "to make sure tasting rooms didn't become sports bars" was fair. But this round of proposed rules goes too far, he said.

I agree with him 100%. But now this is gone too far. Have you ever seen anyone do a painting class in a bar? Have an art showing at a bar? Have a birthday party let alone a kids birthday party at a bar? Have you ever seen anyone do a going away party at a bar? For the very most part no. However after an adult birthday party or a going away party people usually sometimes go from the brewery to the bar. I've seen it quite a few times at our brewery. And it's

perfect!!!! Everyone wins!!! However now to put at stake fundraisers that are sometimes setup very last minute to raise money for someone that is injured or sick and they don't have any medical insurance to pay their bills? This is a great way for the community to come together as a team to help someone out. Please don't jeopardize that.

4. A lot of money is at stake for traditional bars, too. State law limits the number of alcohol licenses in a community based on population, but when that law was enacted, existing licenses were grandfathered in. Furthermore, those licenses don't return to the state when they're sold. They can be kept in circulation on the open market.

That means Fairbanks should have no more than 34 bars. It has 67. Juneau should have no more than 11 bars; it has 20. Anchorage should have no more than 99 bars. Instead, it has 117.

I don't think anyone will come out and say it but it seems to be that this is being pushed by the bars. Who else would it be? They actually have more bars than what the state law limits and they're still complaining.

I will try to make my closing statement short but it probably won't be. Bars I believe don't have as many employees as brewery's but I may be wrong. But someone else makes the alcohol and it gets shipped to the bars. You need a few people to sell it and stock it. If you make your own beer you need people to mix the grains, make sure it stays at certain temperatures, people who put it in barrels and people who pour it. Therefore if you restrict what the breweries can do the sales will go down as not as many people will be needed to make beer. We can never truly know but I have a feeling if restrictions are put in place jobs will be cut.

This is almost as if a few kids setup a lemonade stand. They sold regular lemonade (which is like beer to us) and soda/pop (which is like liquor to us). The kids have been selling for many many years. Usually the other kids only come around to buy it on the weekends because they have school during the week (just like us working). Mom only allows lots of sugar on none school nights. ;)

Years after come some other kids but they only sell lemonade. However the lemonade has different flavors. They also have a different warming atmosphere that invites everybody in. Even people who don't like soda. Just a place to relax and kick back. A lot of the kids flock to the new stand during the week because they need just a small decompression after school. And business slowly picks up.

When the kids that sell lemonade and soda/pop see this as threat they stomp their feet to their parents (the alcohol board) to do something instead of coming up with new ways to attract

kids to their own lemonade stand. Meanwhile they probably didn't even notice that the kids that are going to this new lemonade stand never even went to their stand in the first place.

I've lived in Alaska for four years. Things like this worry me that we're slowly turning into California. Please don't do this because I don't want to move away. I love it here!

We visited a friend living in Anchorage and explored nearby, visited Talkeetna and the area to see Denali, and rented a campervan to explore the Kenai Peninsula. We were lucky to visit some of the fantastic breweries around the state, but were disappointed to learn how restrictive your laws are on these businesses, forcing them to stop pouring at 8pm and limiting the types of events they can have on premises.

In Ohio, we have opened up our breweries for events and food trucks, for fundraisers and festivals—and brewery tourism has been a great economic driver for the places where they are located. While visiting Alaska, we were disappointed to find out how early breweries close—which we first discovered after doing a hike and planning to check out the brewery afterward, and were told they'd already done last call. Other times we would've like to stay past 8pm to try the local beers where we were visiting. The Greater Fairbanks Chamber of Commerce encourages the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board to reject the definitions lined out in 3 AAC 304.390. We would support a long-term solution in which the legislature overhauls the state's alcohol laws to protects businesses, their investments, and the progress that has already been made in this industry.

The recent definition provided in 3 AAC 304.390 does not align with our mission of creating a healthy economic environment for businesses. For years, the legislative and administrative leaders of Alaska have repeated the mantra "Alaska is Open for Business." We recognize that when the private sector succeeds individuals and communities succeed. When business owners succeed their employees succeed. Hello ABC Board,

My name is Josh Hegna. I am the co-founder of Girdwood Brewing Company. We opened our doors less than three years ago, and the language AMCO has proposed to define "other recreational or gaming opportunities" puts our business at risk. Hosting fundraisers, highlighting local artisans, and giving educational beer tours are core components of our business model and have been accepted over the last decade. It is completely UnAlaskan to allow a business to do something for years, only to pull the chair out from under them.

We are truly proud of the 15 jobs we have created. Girdwood Brewing Company is a vehicle of tourism, economic development, and a community gathering place. We drive traffic to our town, resulting in increased business for local resteraunts, bars, shops, and lodging. Consumers want fresh and local, and we give it to them. If you truly want to promote a healthy economy, strong communities, and protect consumers in Alaska, then why stifle the growth of a budding industry?

Girdwood Brewing Company has been happy to support numerous non-profits through fundraisers and donations. Some of this has directly contributed to public safety- <u>Glacier Valley Transit</u>, <u>Friends of the Chugach National Forest Avalanche Information Center</u>, and <u>Alaska Avalanche School</u>. Others have brought food to the table- <u>Girdwood community garden</u> and <u>Food Bank of Alaska</u>. Additionally, we have helped <u>Challenge Alaska</u> all the kids' ski programs at <u>Alyeska Resort</u>, <u>Arctic Valley Ski Area</u>, <u>Alaska State Parks</u>, <u>Alaska Trails</u>, <u>Girdwood Mountain Bike Alliance</u>, <u>Girdwood Turnagain Arm Lions Club</u>, our local school, and numerous other organizations. It would be especially sad if we had to cancel a celebration for our local firefighters this October.

Alaska breweries are already operating under some of the strictest laws in the country, and even though current statute states otherwise, our opponents say we should strictly manufacturer. Their opinion is, if we want privileges, we should pay to play and become a bar. The reality is we (a relatively small brewery) have paid over 300K for our brewing equipment alone and another 200K to create a nice bright atmosphere for our town to enjoy; this is more than most bar owners have paid for their BDL. Resteraunts (REPL), pay significantly less to get started and are allowed tvs, live entertainment until 11:00, games, etc. We do not want to be a bar. All we want to do is serve our beer and our community.

With that said, we love our local bars and resteraunts. Since the value of a BDL, in a limited entry (quota) state like Alaska is a big concern with our adversaries, it is worth mentioning we have other bar quota states to use as comparisons: California, Montana, Idaho, New Mexico, Arizona, Massachusetts, and Pennsylvania to name a few. These states have afforded numerous privileges to their breweries, and bar licenses are still valued equal to or more than

Alaska. None of these quota states limit entertainment. Furthermore, other than Montana (48 ounces/8pm), the rest don't hamper hours of operation or try to over regulate pours. If Alaska is indeed "Open for business", it is time to modernize our brewery laws, not go backwards!

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF KETCHIKAN, ALASKA OPPOSING THE ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE AND CONTROL BOARD'S PROPOSED CHANGE TO THE ALASKA ADMINISTRATIVE CODE 3 AAC 304.390, DEFINING 'RECREATIONAL AND GAMING OPPORTUNITIES'; AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE

WHEREAS, Alaska Statute AS 04.11.130 and AS 04.11.170 allows breweries and distilleries to sell alcoholic beverages for consumption on premises contingent upon the prohibition of on-site live entertainment, televisions, pool tables, dart games, dancing, electronic or other games, game tables, or other recreational or gaming opportunities; and

WHEREAS, the State of Alaska Alcohol & Marijuana Control Office through the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board has issued a notice of proposed changes to 3 AAC 304.390 of the Alaska Administrative Code, regarding the definitions of recreational or gaming opportunities as it pertains to breweries and distilleries to include festivals, games and competitions, classes, non-private parties, presentations or performances, or other types of organized social gatherings that are advertised to the public; and

WHEREAS, the City of Ketchikan currently contains one licensed brewery, Bawden Street Brewing, located within its municipal boundaries; and

WHEREAS, local breweries and distilleries diversify our local economy and provide for unique entertainment, gastronomic, and cultural enrichment experiences; and

WHEREAS, the licensure and successful operation of Bawden Street Brewing may usher in new economic growth opportunities for small businesses wishing to serve, sell, or manufacture alcoholic beverages within the City; and

WHEREAS, the growth and interest in community-oriented tasting rooms has contributed to the City's economy and downtown development, engaging locals and visitors alike; and

WHEREAS, the proposed amendment will severely stifle these economic growth opportunities and will hinder events and gatherings that may support and contribute to the community in significant ways; and

WHEREAS, AS 04.06.100 tasks the Alaska Alcoholic Beverage Control Board with adopting regulations that are "necessary to carry out the purpose of this title [Title 4 – Alcoholic Beverages] in a manner that will protect public health, safety, and welfare;" and

**WHEREAS**, the proposed definition provides no additional public health, safety, or welfare benefit while conversely introducing possible harm to the City of Ketchikan's downtown development and community; and

WHEREAS, the current limitations on breweries and distilleries, through the restrictions imposed on tasting rooms, are substantial enough to distinguish their business model from other establishments, such as bars and restaurants.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Council of the City of Ketchikan, Alaska as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>: The Council of the City of Ketchikan, Alaska opposes the proposed changes to 3 AAC 304.390 and respectfully requests that the Alaska Alcoholic Beverage Control Board not adopt Section 3 AAC 304.390 to define 'other recreational or gaming opportunities' as proposed.

<u>Section 2</u>: The Council of the City of Ketchikan, Alaska strongly encourages the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board to engage all stakeholders before considering a regulation change of this magnitude.

Section 3: The City of Ketchikan shall transmit a copy of this resolution to the State of Alaska Alcohol & Marijuana Control Office.

<u>Section 4</u>: This resolution shall become effective immediately upon passage.

I think this proposed regulation is very misguided, and a real detriment to small businesses in our State at a time when the economic circumstances are already difficult. I don't go out often, but when I do, I much prefer to join my friends for a social drink at these small businesses/tasting rooms rather than a bar. They are quieter, less rowdy, and frankly provide a much higher quality product. The entire experience is better. And it is generally these activities that the new regulation seeks to prohibit that brings me out to the tasting rooms when I do make it out. Am I going out of my way to go drink beer on a random Tuesday for no reason? No. But if I can go out and meet my friends and support a cause I care about while drinking beer at a fundraiser event? That is much more likely to entice me to go out and spend money and contribute to our local economy, rather than just staying home and not spending money.

Prohibiting these additional activities will not do anything to reduce alcohol problems in Alaska. People with severe alcohol problems who drink too much while out and cause drunk driving accidents or commit violent crimes while under the influence aren't doing so because of tasting rooms, where consumption is already limited. And certainly hosting community events at a tasting room doesn't encourage anyone to engage in behavior any different than they would while going to a tasting room where those events aren't allowed.

We are contacting you with great apprehension pertaining to the proposed changes to the definitions of the recreational or gaming opportunities in the regulations of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board. While we understand and appreciate the efforts of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board to hold the alcohol industry accountable and responsible as a part of the Alaska economy, the current proposed changes appear to be an act of overreach with the likelihood of negative impacts on Alaska's economy.

Our greatest concern is for the small businesses and hardworking Alaskans that will feel the direct and indirect impacts of the new regulation. Unfortunately, the breweries and distilleries that will be hit the hardest by the new regulations are the small businesses and individuals that have already taken great risks to step into the industry in the first place. Many of them have used their life savings, pulled from their retirement funds, borrowed from family members, and signed for small business bank loans just to get started. They are competing with large scale national brands and have had to develop their products to be of a unique and high standard. For them, developing a market has not been as simple as sending samples as part of bulk orders. These small business distilleries and breweries have had to invest countless dollars and time into their marketing. They have counted on their products and their people to create a brand that can compete with the larger companies. It is a constant struggle for small businesses to make it in a world driven by convenience. To place the burden of new regulation on them is an unfair overreach bound to break not only the businesses, but the individuals who have invested so much into them.

The Mission statement on the web page of the AMCO:

Enforce alcohol and marijuana commerce laws and provide clear, consistent standards for licensure to protect the public from harm.

These ABC proposed regulations have nothing to do with the above mission statements of promoting public health, strength, or protection.

The fact that they are even being proposed causes one to think they are actually a thinly-veiled attempt to protect bar owners who fear competition. Competition is the heart of American Capitalism.

A few effects of these draft regulations: Would ban hosting fund raisers for charities Would ban First Friday Art events
Would ban birthday parties
Would ban tours of breweries
Would violate First Amendment rights
Would strangle budding and popular Alaska-owned businesses

In Fairbanks, we are suffering a dismal reality of the loss of venues for arts and small events and of small-business specialty stores. Before the 2008 Recession, Fairbanks enjoyed at least 5 private art galleries and several specialty shops. Due to many closures (most impacted either quickly or slowly by the recession), today we have only 2 commercial galleries, with 1 of those due to close shortly. I can think of at least five specialty shops that have shut their doors.

Today, with some small distilleries and breweries hosting some First Friday Art events and fund raisers, people have a new uplifting venue. These businesses have proven to be comfortable gathering places for charitable events and venues for artists that might once have been hosted by the deceased galleries. They are filling a niche and lifting up the town spirit and economy. We are grateful for them.

Example: What would be harmful for, say, an advertised event showcasing art work of a budding Alaskan artist with a guitarist sitting in the corner playing music? The answer is, Nothing harmful. In fact, it would be socially spirit-lifting, economically enhancing, and it would promote a strong community, especially in a town like Fairbanks that has lost so many social and economic venues.

The fact is, these draft regulations would place a tourniquet on economic growth of small businesses that are owned, enjoyed, and supported by Alaskans. These businesses would be stifled; they could shrivel and die. Why in the world would we want to do that? When you cripple Alaska's businesses, in turn you cripple Alaska's spirit.

Where will it all stop? These draft regulations cause me to wonder: would next in line be government regulations of, say, local greenhouses to keep them

strictly in the line of horticulture, prevent them from hosting First Fridays with crafts and music performances? Curtail their free speech and impede their economic vitality?

Who would want to live in a stifled community?

I am not against regulations in general. I am grateful for regulations that serve an important role in keeping society safe, healthy, and fair.

When I read these dismal draft regulations, all I can think of is Mean-Spiritedness. The whole picture is sorry to contemplate, and actually an embarrassment that these draft regs are even being proposed.

## RE: Proposed Regulations Defining "Recreational Opportunities"

Dear AMCO Director and Members of the ABC Board:

We write to provide comments in opposition to the proposed regulations defining "other recreational or gaming opportunities" under AS 04.11.130(e)(1). We are the owners of Cynosure Brewing, a small brewery in Anchorage. Cynosure opened in September 2016, with years of investment and planning preceding the opening. Clarke Pelz has over 20 years of commercial brewing experience in Alaska, and Cindy Drinkwater is a former assistant attorney general with the Alaska Department of Law.

We focus our opposition on two points: the proposed regulations should be rejected because (1) they are a significant departure from the long-standing interpretation of AS 04.11.130(e) and conflict with basic rules of statutory construction, (2) they are vague, overbroad, and unenforceable. They are also bad public policy, as many other comments have noted.

I. The proposed regulations are a departure from the long-standing interpretation of AS 04.11.130(e) and violate a fundamental rule of statutory construction.

Alaska Statue 04.11.130(e) allows breweries to sell a limited amount of beer on premises to a person as long as the brewery does not allow "live entertainment, televisions, pool tables, dart games, dancing, electronic or other games, game tables, or **other recreational or gaming opportunities**[.]"

The proposed regulations purport to clarify AS 04.11.130(e) by defining "other recreational or gaming opportunities." The regulations expand the list of activies to include: "(1) festivals; (2) games and competitions; (3) classes; (4) parties, except for private parties limited to specific invited guests; (5) presentations or performances; (6) other types of organized social gatherings that are advertised to the general public."

Alaska Statute 04.11.130(e), which allows breweries to engage in retail sales but with numerous restrictions, has been in place since 2006 and was a result of a compromise between industry subgroups. The concern at the time of passage was that breweries with tasting rooms be distinct from pubs or bars; hence the limited hours (last pour at 8pm), limited pour amounts (36 oz per person per day) physical limitations (no stools at the bar), and limited activities (no live entertainment, no TVs, no pool tables, no dancing, no darts, etc.). Since 2006 breweries have opened and operated with the understanding of these limitations and that activities were allowed unless explicitly prohibited by the statute.

Nothing in the statute or legislative history supports the agency's interpretation banning activities like presentations or classes or celebrations. In addition to prohibiting a variety of community-focused, beneficial activities (fundraisers for non-profits and other causes, yoga and other classes, and educational presentations, for example), these regulations would lead to absurd results: a brewer woud be banned from giving a brewery tour, or giving a talk about recently brewed beer, or even advertising a new beer release (since such advertising could be interpreted as aimed at creating an "organized social gathering." Or perhaps any advertising for a taproom would be illegal for this reason). Such a fundamentally illogical consequence could not have been intended by the legislature or contemplated by those involved in the compromise statute.

By expanding the types of activities prohibited under AS 04.11.130(e), the proposed definitions run afowl of a canon of statutory construction known as *ejusdem generis* ("of the same kind"). This rule provides that when a general work or phrase follows a list of specifics, the general word or phrase will be interpreted to include only items of the same class as those listed. Blacks Law Dictionary (10th ed. 2014). *See also State v. Planned Parenthood of the Great Northwest*, 436 P.3d 984, 995-96 (2019) ("Under the interpretive canon ejusdem generis, when a general term follows specific terms, the general term 'will be interpreted in light of the characteristics of the specific term, absent clear indications to the contrary.'").

The term "other recreational or gaming opportunities" must be interpreted in the context of the specific examples listed in the statute (i.e. pool tables, darts, televisions, live entertainment). By expanding the types of activities prohibited by the statute, the proposed definition conflicts with the intent of AS 04.11.130(e) and with well-established rules of

<sup>(2)</sup> the brewery does not provide seats at the counter or bar where the product is served; and

<sup>(3)</sup> the room where the consumption occurs is not open before 9:00 a.m. and serving of the product ends not later that 8:00 p.m.

statutory construction. Because the proposed regulations are legally flawed, we urge the ABC Board to reject them.

## 2. The proposed regulations raise constitutional concerns because they are vague, overbroad, and unenforceable.

Rather than attempt a constitutional analysis in the context of these comments, a few examples will illustrate just some of the inherent legal problems created by the proposed regulations.

- If customers wear clothing associated with a particular religious holiday, are breweries obligated to deny them access because the clothing is a religious celebration, forcing breweries to violate customers' first amendment rights? ("Festival" is not defined in the regulation but the dictionary definition refers to "a day or period of celebration")
- At what point does a conversation about politics or religion become a "presentation?" by a participant in the conversation? Are breweries meant to monitor private conversations to ensure that presentations are not being made? Since private parties are allowed, must breweries ensure that parties are not celebrating a holiday or giving presentations, including religious celebrations or political speach?
- How would breweries monitor customers' cell phone or lap top usage to ensure that they are not playing on-line games or engaging in competitions?
- What is the state's plan for indemnifying breweries, since the regulations turns licensees into state actors required to violate customers' rights of privacy and first amendment protections in order to comply with the regulations?
- What is the basis for the state to deny a brewer his or her right to engage in free speech, which includes speech about the product he or she makes or explaining how beer is made?
- What is the basis for the state to deny a brewery the right to hold an event that includes political speech?
- If a server explains what a particular beer is or explains the breweries history, is that an illegal presentation? Is a menu describing the brewery's story or the brewing process or the beers on tap an illegal written presentation?
- If a food truck advertises that they are parked at a brewery and a group of friends show up to buy food and get a beer, is that an illegal advertised social activity? If any group of people arrive at a brewery together do breweries need to question them to determine whether their presence was prompted by advertising?

In conclusion, we urge the ABC Board to take no action on these proposed regulations because of the legal flaws described above. The regulations are also bad public policy and will stifle a growing industry that is enthusiastically supported by Alaskan consumers, creates jobs, draws tourism, positively impacts local economies, and builds community.

I am writing on behalf of KHNS Community Radio to voice support for the Haines Brewing Company as an essential community meeting place. I understand the state Alcohol Board is considering restricting community events and meetings at breweries; I urge the Board to reconsider, as such a decision would be very detrimental to the arts and cultural community of Haines -- of which KHNS is a part.

KHNS has held our annual meeting at the brewery for several years now. We hold our meeting there because in our small, rural town, our local brewery is truly a community spot. Community members of various political leanings, faiths, and age ranges (21+ and up, of course, and some children with their legal guardians) come together at the Haines Brewing Company in a way they don't in most other locations in town. These community members include the diverse listening audience and membership of KHNS Community Radio. Not least because when you walk in the door of the Haines Brewing Company, you're likely to hear KHNS playing in the background.

Since we moved the location of our annual meetings to the brewery, we've had a better turnout, a more engaged and interested audience and a better ability to address more of our listeners and supporters in person.

Haines Brewing Company has done so much to support the local arts scene (including KHNS and First Friday events) and to promote the wellbeing of our community members by creating a welcoming, friendly space for people to gather. They already work with strict regulations in place, and I urge you to refrain from further restricting them by limiting the types of gatherings that can happen in the brewery. Such a decision would be to the detriment of our community.



Dear Members of the ABC Board:

I am very concerned about Alcohol and Marijuana Control Office's (AMCO) proposed regulations defining "recreational or other gaming opportunities". The Office's propose regs fail to clarify the statutes as written. In fact, the new definition increases the uncertainty of what it allowable, and they appear to massively increase the scope of AMCO's authority beyond statutory language.

#### The Issue

A year or more ago AMCO announced that it would draft regulations to clarify parts of Sec. 04.11.170 (distillery license). Of course, the same proposed regulation pertains to breweries and wineries as well. We recently heard about the proposed regulations for the first time, which are simply a definition of "other recreational or gaming opportunities". The new definition reads as follows:

3 AAC 304.390 is a new section to read:

- 3 AAC 304.390. Definitions.
  - (a) For the purpose of AS 04.11.130, AS 04.11.170, and 3 AAC 304.380, "other recreational or gaming opportunities" includes
  - (1) festivals;
  - (2) games and competitions;
  - (3) classes;
  - (4) parties, except for private parties limited to specific invited guests;
  - (5) presentations or performances;
- (6) other types of organized social gatherings that are advertised to the general public. (Eff. \_\_\_/\_\_\_\_, Register \_\_\_\_\_) Authority: AS 04.06.090 AS 04.06.100 AS 04.11.130 AS 04.11.140 AS 04.11.170

I do not believe that this definition is a good faith attempt to clarify what is written in statute. Nor does

it fulfill the mission of AMCO to protect public health, safety and welfare, which are the justification for AMCO's power to create regulations.

My complaints about the definition are that It is so vague that I can't easily tell what is included (it seems to include nearly everything), it doesn't help protect public health, safety and welfare, and It doesn't reflect legislative intent of our statutes as written.

Some examples of distillery activities that I worry would be banned under this definition:

- We provide tours of our distillery. We strive to be entertaining and educational. This is an
  important part of our appeal to tourists. We are very highly rated as a tourist activity in
  Fairbanks. By this definition tours might be banned either as "classes" or "presentations".
- We host display the work of local artists and host First Friday openings. This might be banned as
  a "presentation" or "other types of organized social gathering". There is a lack of space for local
  artists to display and sell their work. We are an important way for local artists to connect with
  tourists and have helped sell a great deal of local art.
- We release specialty products such as liqueurs made from local berries on an irregular basis. Of
  course, these always come with a public announcement or advertisement. This seems likely to
  be banned as "other type of social gatherings that are advertised to the general public".
- We teach classes in making liquor infusions, bitters, liqueurs and special cocktails from time to time. This seems to be proscribed as either "class" or "presentation".
- Birthday parties? Holiday celebrations? End of school year teacher's parties? These all seem to fall under "parties" of "festivals".

It has been noted many times that some people in AMCO and other places would like tasting rooms to not be allowed to attempt to draw in customers and keep them. As a distillery that only sells two drinks per person, I don't want people taking up chairs for hours either. However I see nothing in statute that gives AMCO authority over how long customers spend at a distillery, brewery or winery.

#### Instead Let's Try

As a distillery license holder, I agree that the statutes could use some clarity of definition. I strongly feel that this regulations package should be scrapped and started over. By and large I agree wih the statutes as written and I would like to see the following clarifications made to 04.11.170:

(e) (1) Games and game tables I have always taken to mean things like arcade games, foosball, and the like. Chess, smartphone games, tablet or laptop games should be allowed if the public brings them. I can't imagine AMCO having the authority to say what members of the public can and can't use their smartphones for in our distillery or anywhere. Neither should I have to police if a group starts discussing their fantasy football league picks. What harm does a game of chess do besides take up two of my chairs and a table for a while?

- (e) (1) I have always taking gaming in "other recreational or gaming opportunities" to mean pulltabs, bingo, shout-out trivia games and the like. I'd like to see the definition confined to those items.
- Activities should be allowed unless clearly denied in statute. All the other provisions in 04.11.170 list explicit things that are denied (e.g. pool, darts, dancing etc) and the meanings are pretty clear to everyone. I ask that regulations should be as explicit instead of graspingly broad.

I think that the ABC Board members should ask if they are doing good. Is it the right thing to do? Many Alaskan's have put their faith and knowledge and entrepreneurial spirit and life savings to the test by starting small distilleries. Changing the rules now in this way is only destructive.

#### AMCO Members:

I am writing to express my disapproval of the proposed rules to add to the already strictest of most states.

As a lover of craft beer and US manufacturing, I was very disappointed when I moved to Alaska a few years ago to find that the supposed last frontier had some of the most restrictive laws surrounding breweries and distilleries. Having served in the military for over 18 years in a variety of capacities, it's allowed me to live in over a dozen states and several countries—in addition to traveling to many more, including every state but Hawaii. This gives me a unique perspective in regard to how things differ around the world.

That said, Alaska has some of the most disappointing law for breweries and distilleries from the standpoint of a consumer and also as a producer. I've been stationed in California and have spent a fair amount of time there off and on since living there, and the fact Alaska has more restrictive laws for fermented beverage producers and consumers, really says something. I often tell people visiting Alaska or friends and colleagues in the lower 48 that basically it's against the law to have fun at a brewery or distillery in Alaska. It's a sad state of affairs. And having lived in so many different places, I'm use to being able to enjoy a variety of things while being at a brewery or distillery.

It needs to be clarified that I've never really been a fan of bars my entire life. Since I returned from being stationed in Germany, I've had a much greater appreciation for beer and the craftsmanship that goes into making it. Generally speaking for the last 15 years, 98% of the time that I'm drinking beer or distilled spirits, outside of my home or a friend's, it's at the place it was made. I love being able to go where the product is made and seeing how it's made and who made it. Breweries for instance are one of the largest growth industries in the US for the last several years, reviving many communities that were dying due to people moving away. The amount of revenue for states grow more and more each year by bringing new industry to places that have little to no manufacturing left.

Another thing I love so much about breweries and distilleries are that in so many places, especially smaller towns, have evolved into community centers; places where people of all walks of life come together and enjoy conversation over something made right there in the community. These are not just factories with bars attached to them. Almost in every case, they are family-friendly environments that support the community in more ways that just about any other type of private business. Craft beer pioneer, Sierra Nevada Brewing Co. in Northern California, recently raised over \$15 million to help the victims of the nearby Camp Fire that wiped out entire communities. Craft breweries large and small do what they can time and time again

to make a positive impact in the communities they live and work in—how many bars out there try to do anything other than make money with far fewer restrictions.

The bottom line is, the more you restrict fermented beverage producers, the more you hurts the communities they are in. If your restrictive laws force places to close — which I'm sure those bar owners on our legislature would love — that just means I don't replace those experiences with rowdy bars or restaurants; I just buy packaged products at stores and will more likely mean I send my money to out-of-state producers. I believe most of these laws protect no one but bar owners from having to compete fairly in the free market.

Thank you for taking public comment on the matter and I hope you move to allow a freer market place in the Last Frontier.



#### Dear AMCO Board Members,

I am the co-owner of King Street Brewing Company in Anchorage and I am writing in opposition of the proposed regulations governing brewery (and winery and distillery) tasting rooms that Alcohol and Marijuana Control Office (AMCO) Director Erika McConnell has submitted to the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board. These proposed regulations increase the existing list of tasting room prohibitions by expanding the definition of "other recreational or gaming activities" to include, among other items, "festivals,... classes,... presentations..., and other types of organized social gatherings that are advertised to the general public". These proposed regulations exceed the intent of the Legislature when they passed the Alaska Statue. Furthermore, approving the regulations by the Board would overstep the mission of AMCO.

Breweries and their tasting rooms are a part of the fabric of our communities. Not only are they venues for craft artisans to introduce new products through promotion via tours or new release events, they also serve the community. At King Street we have hosted numerous non-profit organizations as they present their need and raised money and awareness for their cause. Just last month, we hosted REAP (Renewable Energy Alaska Project) which brought both Republicans (Senator Murkowski) and Democrats (Mayor Berkowitz) together on the same stage to present their vision and support for renewable energy in Alaska. We have hosted silent auctions that helped raise money for cancer patients, including my sister who was a loved member of our tasting room team as she was battling extremely aggressive ovarian cancer. Three months later we held her Celebration of Life at the tasting room. These events would be prohibited under the proposed regulations.

The existing regulations have been law for twelve years and have not been challenged by previous directors nor have they seen a need for drastic "clarification". The AMCO board's authority by state statue is to interpret law and clarify regulations to "protect the public health, safety, and welfare." These proposed regulations do nothing to that end. Rather they are thinly veiled economic regulations, which is the jurisdiction of the Legislature. Former assistant attorney general for the Alaska Department of Law for 28 years, Breck Tostevin's legal opinion on the proposed regulations states that it "violates the Alaska Constitution's protections for freedom of expression and association" as well as not being "consistent with the statue".

These regulations are not only detrimental to local breweries (and wineries and distilleries), their employees and the organizations that work with them (non-profits, tour companies, food trucks, etc.), but they are hurtful to the social fabric of the community. I hope the AMCO Board does not approve these regulations.

#### Hello AMCO,

I respectfully disagree with passage of 3 AAC 304.390 as a new section proposed to further define "other recreational or gaming opportunities" to include festivals, classes, public parties, presentations or performances and/or other social gatherings advertised to the general public.

I am currently an employee of Alaskan Brewing Company in Juneau, Alaska who was born and raised in Juneau. I left Alaska to pursue two chemical engineering degrees and have been a resident again for the past year.

Alaskan Brewing has recently opened a new tasting room which is increasing in popularity. It features a modern and vibrant design, with bright lighting and large tables which are perfect for social gatherings. This summer, we got great use from our outdoor patio and tents which provided shade from the sunny weather.

With increasing popularity of the new tasting room, there have been many public groups that come in an utilize the space as a social gathering place. One event raised money for the local radio station KTOO (<a href="https://www.ktoo.org/events/kxll-pop-up-record-shop-2/">https://www.ktoo.org/events/kxll-pop-up-record-shop-2/</a>). These types of events allow our brewery to support Southeast Alaska as the state cuts back on public spending.

Another brewery in Juneau, Devil's Club Brewery, has hosted many public outreach events as well which allow non-profits and small businesses to present their message in an after-work setting. These include First Friday events which provide artwork for sale and pizza nights which have supported the outdoor non-profit Trail-Mix. These events are not 'recreational' by any means and do not involve games or raffles.

They do however involve a social gathering. The proponents of 3 AAC 304.390 need to recognize that brewery and distillery tasting room patrons have rights to socialize when drinking those 36oz or 3oz, respectively. Where is the line between a presentation and a group of people talking? How is a teaching class or an educational performance different than someone sharing knowledge at a discussion table?

Bars on the other hand have a much different purpose than tasting rooms. As you know, bars can sell any type of alcohol not just that manufactured on-site. Bars can have games, live music, and whatever else the law allows. Loud, rowdy people drinking past 8pm. This is great, and I have enjoyed nights of live music at the bars in downtown Juneau at the Alaskan Hotel and The Narrows.

I see it wrong to say there was some *intention* in the law when written. Some bars are slow to adapt or ill-suited to provide the communal setting that patrons want. For example, The Narrows has small two-person tables and two long bars. This is hardly a setting for group gatherings. These bars can host community events if they choose to, and so should tasting rooms be able as described in 04.11.130(e)(1) and 04.11.170(e)(1).

If some wording is necessary to end these ridiculous Bar v. Tasting Room scuffles, please provide it. However, to remove the community from brewery and distillery tasting rooms will be detrimental to all Alaskans... drinkers and teetotalers alike.

Thank you for considering my comments and please help us keep the vibrant brewery and distillery tasting room community which has been so beneficial for the Juneau economy.

### Good morning,

I write in opposition to the proposed administrative code changes to 3 AAC 304.990.

Far from clarifying the statutory term "other recreational or gaming opportunities" the Board's proposed language is vague, overbroad, and, potentially, constitutionally infirm.

First, let's look at AS 04.11.130(e) which requires "a holder of a brewery license" to "not allow" a variety of different conduct. That's important. Because it puts a requirement upon a brewery to actively monitor and then stop certain conduct from occurring at the brewery's onsite consumption location. This language precludes breweries from offering these things and from permitting this conduct from taking place at the brewery.

What are "festivals"? Is a brewery placing Christmas decorations on the wall with a Christmas tree a 'festival'? Such decorations encourage community, family, and a sense (in most) well-being. Merriam-Webster defines festival as 'a time of celebration marked by special observances' and isn't that what Christmas (or Hanukkah) decorations entail? Such valid 1st Amendment expressions of faith would be, apparently, banned in a privately owned and operated Alaskan breweries under this proposed code change and would include customers from expressing their faith.

"Games and competitions"? Tic-tac-toe on a napkin? Banned? Checkers on a cell phone? Banned. 'Whose dog is the fluffiest friendly neighborhood competition'? Banned. This would ban *customers* from sitting at a table, enjoying their 36oz of beer, and playing a video game on their own personal phones. It would ban *customers* from using their phones to participate in a fantasy football league. Would you have breweries place signs up advising their customers "NO FANTASY FOOTBALL OR FORTNIGHT ON YOUR CELL PHONES"? From the plain language of AS 04.16.030 this requirement may already be the case (again, probably unenforceable by a regulatory agency) under (e)(1) but, yes, your proposed language requires a brewery to monitor their customers or otherwise run afoul of 3 AAC 304.990.

"Other types of organized social gatherings"? That's a breathtakingly broad category of conduct. That encompasses legal business activities such as the brewery tours. Recall, if you're interested at all in growing Alaska businesses (which you should be since you're a part of the Department of Commerce), that there are Alaska businesses who ADVERTISE safe, sober driving tours to Alaska breweries. These are most assuredly ORGANIZED and SOCIAL open to the GENERAL PUBLIC. A brewery will have no choice but to ban such tour groups from entering their brewery.

I apologize for the ALL CAPS at times but this proposed language will result in litigation, financially harm to Alaska breweries and other Alaska small businesses, and infringe on Alaskan's constitutional rights.

These types of events will no longer be allowed if this regulation gets passed and this is just a tiny example of what one local brewery does.

KBRC does so much to support our community, and create a sense of community at their business, as do many breweries/distilleries in Alaska.

I am writing in opposition to the proposed changes under 3 AAC 304.390.

Craft breweries and distilleries have not only brought interesting craft beverages to Alaskan communities, but they have also played a role in revitalizing our cities by providing locally created and maintained spaces, and make even far-flung locations attractive to both the Boomer and Post-Boomer tourist markets. Beyond that, with their earlier closing hours, strict limits on service, and brightly lit, hospitable venues have created a safer environment to enjoy alcoholic beverages or be around the nightlife that often centers around it.

Although I appreciate craft beer, I myself do not frequently drink alcohol, and yet I enjoy being able to go out and spend time with friends who do. I prefer going to craft breweries because of the different experience they provide. I enjoy the revolving food trucks that I can eat at and the multi-generational crowd (kids and seniors are welcome and made to feel comfortable!), I appreciate that those choosing not to drink are often given options beyond a can of coke and not badgered by waitstaff and management if they are with a group and choosing not to drink.

I have yet to hear any salient points about why this change is coming now. If bars are afraid they are losing out to breweries, then one could simply point out the two-drink minimum that limits many people's time spent at a given brewery; if they are worried the presence of boardgames will extend a patron's visit, then I hope they are aware that in the pocket of most adults is a smartphone capable of the sort of hours long amusement via games/facebook/chat that Jenga has a hard time competing with. They might cite the high cost of a liquor license and say that they are not able to be *as* profitable as they were before the craft beverage movement gained steam. Although liquor licenses are expensive, I would say that securing the education and know-how required to be a master distiller or brewmaster is comparable, plus the knowledge to handle the books and all the behind-the-scenes work that goes into running a small business; look at the capital required to open a location and buy all the equipment needed to produce your first drink. That ingenuity and risk should be rewarded, not punished.

Most people I've talked to have the following impression: an industry that is deeply entrenched has not had to change *anything* in terms of its sales-model since the pipeline days and has kept making hand-over-fist money. In response to the new craft enrepeneurs, they have repeatedly sought legislation to do what could simply be done with improving their business for the changing times.

Breweries provide visitors and locals alike a great venue to feel safe, feel welcome (drinking or non-drinking), and appreciate local craftsmanship. Let's encourage that.

The restriction against hosting classes makes it more difficult for Alaskan manufacturers to differentiate their products in a crowded market and entice more Alaskans to taste Made In Alaska goods.

The restriction against public parties forces manufacturers to police the intent of their prospective customers within their tasting rooms. If a half-dozen people arrive at a tasting room together, why should it matter whether they are friends casually meeting after work as opposed to friends who happen to be celebrating a birthday?

The restriction that most concerns me is the restriction against organized social gatherings that are advertised to the general public. I have seen our manufacturers go to great lengths to be responsible corporate citizens. Because of these limits I can trust that when I go to socialize at any of these establishments that I will be leaving sober and that I can safely leave because so is everyone else. I love that I can meet friends there and my entire family can come. I mean where else can I go to have an after-work beer or spirit with families from all over Fairbanks? The fact my child can come with me to a safe and controlled environment and also socialize is something we all can appreciate. The regulation doesn't necessarily effect all the above mentioned, but it does affect the ability for these establishments to grow their customer base through community functions and coincidentally the ability for them to really have an impact on their communities. These are businesses that are built by your own. Your people! Our people. And they have shown the state and our communities that they are also here to help. It's not just business we are talking here. It's community involvement. Communities flourish when small and big business help out their own. One thing that really makes Alaska amazing is it's people. But it's also our quirkiness, our fishing, our hunting, and the love for the outdoors. But most importantly- our heart and love of our communities that we live in. What this regulation essentially says is 'stay away, helping your community just isn't your part'. That's not our Alaskan way.

I urge you to step back and really dig down and think about these points I've put forth then ask yourself this: Are we making our communities better or worse with this regulation? Communities succeed when we can help out our own. This regulation would clearly put an end to that for distilleries and breweries.

Once the tourist season wraps up, a large portion of the town closes down and we're left with close to nothing - removing our ability to host parties, classes, and other events in these locations further reduces our options to come together as a community. Our First Friday events are an important part of Juneau life, especially in the winter season. It gives the community a chance to get together and enjoy each other's company, while also purchasing from local shops and the local artists they are hosting for the night. Disallowing breweries, distilleries, and wineries from participating hurts their chances immensely in making a profit and could push them towards shutting down. # To Whom It May Concern -

I am writing you today not in support of AAC 304.390 but in support of our vibrant local breweries, business owners, and craft beer patrons. I oppose this piece of legislation for three reasons:

First, this proposed regulation would negatively effect me; I am an instructor with the Outdoor Programs and Outreach (OPO) at Recreational Equipment Inc. (REI). The OPO Market Coordinator and myself have been trying to teach basic outdoor classes in a relaxed environment and the local breweries have been a success in other markets, such as Portland, OR, for some time. Each brewery we reach out to is afraid of push back from your board if they agree to host. Not only does this limit our ability to reach the greater community, it limits growth of new patrons to the local breweries. It also limits the amount of hours I work, resulting in smaller paychecks and less disposable income to patronize ANY alcohol establishment.

Second, I have yet to see a bar that participates in "First Friday" art events; I have never seen a bar have classes taught at it; and most of bars that are pushing for this regulation are too loud and dark to teach a class, have an art event, or fundraiser in. Bars have the entertainment monopoly as it is, they have TV's, live music, karaoke, etc.

Lastly, the type of people going to local breweries do not, for the most part, patronize bars. Craft beer enthusiasts enjoy beer they cannot drink at local bars. AMCO is housed in the department of Commerce, Community and Economic Development. It is antithetical to the Department of Commerce's mission to "Promote a healthy economy, strong communities, and protect consumers in Alaska." and the Economic Development Divisions mission "to promote economic development." The Division of Community and Regional affairs mission to "Promote strong communities and healthy economies." would also be violated with these regulations. To further limit the ability of breweries in Alaska to conduct business in the state by restricting the activities allowed at these small businesses would indicate a disregard for the guiding principles of the departments tasked with overseeing the economic health of our state.

The premise of these regulation changes is thin at best and blatantly discriminatory on its face. I encourage AMCO to live up to its mission and the missions on the departments housing it.

Local Breweries have proven to be key drivers of vibrant communities and economic development throughout the United States. The ability of the these businesses to provide a safe, clean and vibrant location for local non-profit organizations, artists and other small businesses to share their work with the community is not met by other businesses. The impact on the non-profit community alone should be enough to stop this blatant overreach of government regulation. Further, the ability of artists and other small businesses to partner with breweries adds to the economic growth in Alaska at a time where supporting small business and economic development is critical to the health of our communities and economy. It appears on the surface to be an attempt by a small group to squash a vibrant and growing industry because they feel threatened by its success. The restriction of "other types of organized social gatherings that are advertised to the general public. "is particularly concerning and is excessively broad, and overly vague.

Government has no place in trying to protect old or outdated businesses from newer businesses which, very clearly based on natural consumer demand/preferences offer a better model. It's no wonder so many long time Alaskans & local business owners are leaving the state in favor of more opportunities and better livelihood elsewhere.

Additionally, in other areas(i.e Denver) where there are less pointless regulations surrounding breweries/distilleries; the ONLY law they must follow is that they may not serve any other type of alcohol. That means those establishments can run just like a bar(open when they want, serve food, events, paint nights, etc.). Allowing a similar structure in Alaska would save our state money from fighting this sector. It would MAKE our state money since breweries pay \$1.07/gallon in excise tax and distilleries pay \$12.80/gallon in excise tax. Imagine how the state deficit could be helped by simply allowing local businesses to serve their communities more.

Get with the times and support local businesses that care more about our communities than those who create these overbearing rules and regulations. It's clear that the board is comprised of primarily bar owners etc. who feel threatened by the up and coming breweries/distilleries that the public prefers. Perhaps they should update their business models rather than trying to create legal red tape to obstruct their competition and community. You are only hindering Alaska's opportunities for growth.

Subject: Proposed Regulation 3 AAC 304.390; Definition of recreation and gaming opportunities

I received a copy of proposed regulation 3 AAC 304.390 defining recreation and gaming opportunities impacting breweries and distilleries after the ABC Board noticed it for public comment. The Department has serious concerns that this regulation is unduly restrictive, exceeds the Legislature's statutory intent, and detrimentally impacts Alaskan business.

The Department of Commerce, Community, and Economic Development has administrative responsibility for the oversight of the Alcohol, Marijuana, Control Office (AMCO). Our office previously requested that all new draft regulations be reviewed by the Commissioner's office prior to finalizing for public comment. Additionally, as the project manager for the Governor's regulation review project, all regulations generated by AMCO should be directed to me for review prior to publication or public circulation, and presented to the Regulatory Review Team for analysis and discussion; especially those that are controversial and require a policy decision.

This Administration's position on regulations is to reduce the regulatory burden on Alaskans and Alaskan businesses while protecting the public. Proposed regulation 3 AAC 304.390 is the antithesis of reasonable regulatory reform.

Please work with the Alcohol Control Board to rescind the proposed regulation referenced above.

I am writing regarding the proposed regulation changes to statute 3 AAC 304 of the Alaska Administrative Code. I am an Alaska Native woman, a small business owner, and a born and raised Alaskan, and I am deeply opposed to the proposed changes in regulation.

My husband and I recently opened a small business, AK Brews Cruise. We love beer, and have been thrilled at the recent success of two new breweries in Juneau, so much that we were able to make a long-held dream come true with our new business. AK Brews Cruise operates tours that bring visitors to our local breweries, offering them a chance to see our small Alaskan community in a different way, as well as supporting local businesses and enjoying delicious beverages along the way. Our customers are safely transported from one establishment to the next by one of our drivers, ensuring that those tourists who may want to get off the beaten path and enjoy an adult beverage are able to do so without needing to risk their lives or the lives of others by getting behind the wheel of a rental car after drinking. This was our first summer in business and we have completed 20+ tours so far, bringing in business to our local economy as well as enjoying the company of people from all around the world.

Our business model was based around the current brewery model of business. We run tours that visit three local breweries – it's a brews cruise! But, the proposed change in regulations would end breweries' ability to host tours completely. These ridiculous proposed regulations would shutter our brand-new business and all of the investment we put into it would disappear along with it, as well as any future profits. In 2019, our first year of operation, we invested roughly \$40,000 into our business, planning for many more years of tours to come. If you pass the regulation changes, all of that investment will be worthless.

I have heard a lot of talk recently about Alaska being "open for business". If you choose to pass the proposed regulation changes the way they are currently phrased, Alaska will not be open for *my* business. In fact, we will be forced to close. Alaska's administration, at all levels, should be supporting Alaskan businesses and creating conditions under which businesses can thrive. This is especially true during the current uncertain economic climate. Unfortunately, the message these proposed regulations sends is the exact opposite. Rather than welcoming and encouraging Alaskans to be creative and innovative in starting new businesses and fostering a thriving economy, you are creating an environment which is inhospitable to start ups, growth, and investment in our beloved state.

I do not believe these regulations are in the best interests of small business owners like myself or for the state of Alaska as a whole. Thank you for providing me the opportunity to comment on the proposed regulation under 3 AAC 304.390, providing a definition of "other recreational or gaming opportunities". This regulation is meant to clarify language that more broadly prohibits certain licensees from allowing the following in their establishments:

"...live entertainment, televisions, pool tables, dart games, dancing, electronic or other games, game tables, or other recreational or gaming opportunities on the premises where the consumption occurs"

You now seek to define "other recreational or gaming opportunities" to include: 1) festivals; 2) games and competitions; 3) classes; 4) parties, except for private parties limited to specific invited guests; 5) presentations or performances; 6) other types of organized social gatherings that are advertised to the general public.

This proposal is shocking in its breadth and defies common sense understanding of the word "recreational and gaming". While it can be argued that "recreation" has a very broad definition, it is not commonly understood to include educational, charitable, or social causes. You include actions created for the pursuit of societal good (charitable fundraisers for example), created through the efforts of nonprofits, educational organizations, social activists...and have determined that this is now a "recreational activity". These activities do not benefit the premises as much as they benefit the community using that premise. Per your definition, you are no longer targeting the licensee. You are targeting community residents who want to use the licensee's premise for an activity that is not necessarily connected to what is being manufactured or served on that premise. You are effectively regulating the customer, not the licensee, per your overbroad definition.

This does not fit a plain language reading of the law.

It should be the goal of every legislature to craft laws that do not require lawyers to pour through regulations just to understand what their law meant. By this regulation, you defeat that goal and prevent a normal person from being able to understand what is required of them without paying a lawyer to tell them exactly what they need to do. More to the point- keep a lawyer on retainer based on the constant rollercoaster of trying to redefine the legislature's statutes via regulations on what now seems to be an annual basis.

As a final note, it would do well to remember that the ultimate authority regarding the Board's power to regulate rests with the legislature. If the legislature passes a law removing these prohibitions altogether, there will be nothing left for the Board to regulate.

I say this because on Monday, August 26, when these proposed changes were apparently noticed, I wasn't thinking about AMCO, its regulatory authority, or anything to do with breweries, wineries, distilleries, or beverage dispensaries. When I first learned of the proposed changes on Wednesday, August 28, I went to AMCO's website- only to find it outdated and with absolutely no mention of the proposed changes. I had to dig through three pages on the Alaska Public Notice System to finally find the notice. No reasonable average person could have learned what you were proposing without knowledgeable assistance.

When I finally found the notice, my first thought was that this was the definition of insanity. Every year it appears the Alcohol Beverage Control Board is trying again and again to redefine the rules regarding those holding a brewery, winery, or distillery license- even if there is no public interest in doing so outside special interest stakeholders.

In a majority of the United States, breweries, wineries, and distilleries are not regulated the same way as is done in Alaska. These establishments in the lower 48 are serious revenue generators and create a hospitable, family friendly environment that revitalize their communities. As the Alaska economy keeps teetering on the edge, it would do very well for the legislature to reconsider its statutory prohibitions and decide to truly open Alaska up for business.

On Monday, August 26, I wasn't thinking about contacting every State legislator about repealing its prohibitions on these establishments. Now I certainly am doing so, and will encourage others to do the same. Because we can't keep going on this carousel the Alcohol Beverage Control Board has created with these continual regulatory changes.

And if you don't think that's a serious comment, consider how the Marijuana Board feels about hemp these days.

I write to oppose the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board's proposed modification to regulations which would add a new section to define "other recreational or gaming opportunities" at 3 AAC 304.390.

I have lived in Juneau for nearly 17 years. At the moment, downtown Juneau is witnessing, depending on your perspective, a Renaissance moment or a rebirth of its glory years in the food and beverage departments. Leading that charge are new establishments including Amalga Distillery and Devil's Club Brewing, among others. We should be rewarding and encouraging their innovation and efforts to revitalize downtown. Yet, the proposed definition seems to thwart them.

They currently operate under significant restrictions -- no entertainment and they must close by 8:00 pm. Those restrictions alone are more than sufficient to protect the current crop of traditional bars, to the extent they even need (or merit) protection. The ABCB's proposed change would go too far and limit a variety of activities, from fundraisers to friendly gettogethers that are advertised on social media and open to the public. There is no plausible explanation for imposing such restrictions, other than to damage the business prospects of these new ventures.

Further, the proposed definition goes too far. Subsections (3) through (6) go well beyond the plain meaning of recreational and gaming opportunities. Taken together, recreational and gaming activities would ordinarily include contests and competitions where there may be awards and prizes or some type of sporting activity. The proposed definition, however, includes classes, parties, performances and would seemingly include poetry readings, a class on how to write a poem, a fundraiser, and other activities that clearly do not fall within the ordinary meaning of "recreational and gaming opportunities."

For the reasons above, I strongly oppose the proposed definition, I don't believe "recreational and gaming opportunities" needs to be expressly defined, and I think the ABCB's apparent short-sightedness will only undermine Juneau's young, entrepreneurial spirit when it should be doing the exact opposite -- encouraging more of it.

It comes to my attention that AMCO is attempting to regulate where musicians can and cannot perform, where presentations can and cannot be given, where artwork can and cannot be displayed. This regulation of art and expression far exceeds the specific task of "controlling the manufacture, barter, possession, and sale of alcoholic beverages in the state."

AMCO doesn't protect the public with this effort, it is a move to protect a vocal minority of Alaskan bar owners who wield the instrument of bureaucracy to insulate their business models from competition. This is a phenomenon called "regulatory capture" and I suggest you read about how boards like AMCO can be leveraged to entrench private interests rather than ensure an equitable marketplace for all comers.

I do believe it is important that we have rules about serving hours and serving sizes. I do believe we need to maintain a clear understanding of who can manufacture, serve and distribute alcohol. Alaska has many problems stemming from alcohol and AMCO should be striving to recognize and address those problems by providing a framework for the safest and most responsible service.

Instead, AMCO is going out of their way to insulate entrenched small business owners from natural market forces and reasonable competition by discouraging artistic expression.

Why is a coffee shop with a beer & wine license allowed to have performances? Why are performances allowed where temporary alcohol permits are issued? What claim do bar owners have to performances and presentations and displays of creative expression that distillery owners and brewers do not?

I think AMCO is taking a serious misstep here and needs to re-evaluate this whole direction they're going in clamping down on activities rather than service. It goes far beyond the realm of alcoholic beverages and deep into the realm of regulating expression and public performance.

Many distilleries and breweries have built business models with vibrant tasting rooms, which allow them to offer samples of and market their products. To change the rules that informed their business models after so much capital has been invested would be devastating. To change the rules that allow them to be supporters of their communities is unfair to both the businesses and the community members who have collaborated with these businesses to create value and good through fundraisers and limited events.

Damage to the manufacturing industry in Alaska is shortsighted. These small, up-and-coming producers have far greater potential to positively impact Alaska's economy than the bars who would be unfairly coddled by these changes. If we allow for the crippling of producers like Amalga Distillery — a company praised in national and international publications — we are throwing away the chance at bringing in revenue from outside of Alaska.

If we look at Alaskan Brewing Co. as an example, we see that an Alaska-based manufacturer can become a significant player in its industry. Alaskan Brewing has distribution in the entirety of the American West and as far east as Ohio, with fans requesting further expansion all the time. They've overcome the logistics of distributing a perishable product across the country from our remote location, and even now distribute to Hawaii. They employ an evergrowing team of employees in-state and bring outside money into our state. The model they started with assumed a different model than many of the small producers, but the potential for these start-ups is just as brilliant.

This is the future of the alcoholic beverage industry and it is the future of Alaska's thriving economy. Do not hobble these rising stars to protect those who do not have the vision or passion to compete in the free market.

I recently moved to Alaska from a state with a vibrant brewing community that spurred the local economy, supported innumerable local charities, and provided a welcoming atmosphere as a social hub for patrons that desire to support local businesses of all types.

I was very happy to find that I have a local brewery to support, but dismayed to find the number of regulations imparted upon them. I have no problem with a 2 drink limit, in my experience, most brewery patrons self limit their Intake anyway....we aren't looking for a "bar scene" to visit. But other restrictions already limit opportunity for revenue.

When I'm a tourist, I often go out of my way to visit the local breweries of my destination and learn of the local culture, which is most definitely different than visiting a bar. I recently travelled across SE Alaska and visited every local brewery available, even if it meant I had a 30 minute window to get there from my plane or ferry because of the early closure times. During this visit, I met a passionate community that supports Alaska's other unique businesses through their use of Alaskan grains and agricultural products.

History has shown amongst the 7,000+ breweries in the US, that permitting the brewery to serve as a hub of their own product and commerce allows them a fighting chance to survive in an industry that is dominated by predatory conglomerates for shelf space and tap space. INBEV and SABMiller do not care one bit about the strength of the economy in Kodiak or Sitka or Juneau. Yet they will handily force these towns' unique products out of bars and package stores through exclusive selling privileges. There are plenty of local bars across the US that do not even sell beer from the brewery down the street for this exact reason.

Now, with proposed legislation that is circling, Alaska's breweries will possibly face an even tougher time competing. Prohibiting festivals, games, competitions, classes, public parties, presentations, and performances further restricts the opportunity to bring in traffic and makes the brewery seem as a shady, dirty, underground alternative to a bar, rather than the vibrant, community oriented, family operated businesses that they typically are.

If Alaska is truly open for business, the state will do everything they can to support the businesses that create it's unique products.

Although I don't support our breweries solely because of activities such as yoga and painting parties, I realize that these practices have been accepted over the years and are important parts of the tasting rooms' goals to be active participants in their communities.

I was really disappointed when I heard about the proposed rule change barring breweries and distilleries from hosting social events. The role of AMCO is to protect public health and safety on issues related to alcohol and marijuana in Alaska, not enact protectionist rules for specific lobby groups. This proposed rule seems antithetical to protection of public health and safety. I really enjoy going to social events at breweries and distilleries. It's a great way to draw the community together, see friends, and support arts and culture. One of the reasons I like going to breweries and distilleries is that people are only having a few drinks (per the maximum servings rule) and aren't drunk. They're behaving like reasonable adults rather than gigantic toddlers, unlike the few wasted hot messes I always see at bars. I've gone to painting classes at a distillery, and we were focusing on socializing with each other and our paintings, not on the drinking. There are breweries and distilleries that support local artists by participating in First Friday events, bringing the community together. Hosting social events at breweries and distilleries promotes more responsible, tempered drinking behavior than events hosted at bars. A beautiful thing about breweries and distilleries as a venue is that they have an income stream from their brewing and distilling, rather than only relying on sales of alcohol for on-site consumption. They know they'll be selling their products to distributors, restaurants, and bars. They'll probably sell some of their product to individual patrons who enjoyed one of their drinks and want to bring some home for later consumption. So there's no need to push event attendees to drink more than the attendee originally intended (plus the servings are already limited). At a bar, the profits come from drinks sold for on-site consumption, and the business has an incentive to make sure that every patron feeling slightly thirsty has ample opportunity to buy and drink more alcohol.

Please preserve the rights of breweries and distilleries to host social events and support community arts and culture. It promotes public health and safety by providing alternatives to bars for socializing with more reasonable, tempered drinking behavior.

Comment: I am writing to express my strong opposition to the proposed language at **3 AAC 304.390**. **Definitions**. It is my opinion that such language is a clear example of government overreach, contrary to the wishes of both the Governor and the legislature in promoting new business in Alaska, and will have a detrimental effect on local businesses and tourism.

The rapid growth of Alaska's distilleries, wineries, and breweries has provided a much needed boost to our economies. Marketing changes in the Cruise Ship industry towards a younger audience are not happenstance but rather a reflection of market demographics. This younger audience is not necessarily interested in seeking out the age-old standard business model of a dark, poorly lit bar scene at 5pm but rather desires a distinctly different atmosphere. Research shows 93 percent of travelers seek unique and memorable food and drink experiences.<sup>1</sup>

People want local products served by local people in an environment that is warm and inviting to a broad range of ages and background

Alaska's bars, taverns, and watering holes are not necessarily designed to create such an atmosphere nor should they. These businesses benefit from having the ability to offer all of the services identified at 3 AAC 304.725(c) ("Entertainment") and 3 AAC 304.380(1).

Local communities and not-for-profit have benefited greatly from this new class of businesses as they provide a venue that appeals to a much broader demographic than the current bar-restaurant industry has made available.

Governor Dunleavy has repeatedly said that "Alaska is open for business" and that he would focus his administration to "reform regulations" in a way to boost the economy. The proposed definition at 3 AAC 304.390 is protectionist in nature and obviously seeks to further restrict the ability of these new businesses to grow and prosper. This young labor market is one of Alaska's most valuable and vibrant resources and the propose regulation does little to provide incentives for young entrepreneurs and the "Made in Alaska" brand.

3 AAC 304.112(e) provides the Board with broad discretion over how it selects who will and who will not be considered during the application process.

The factors the board will, in its discretion, consider in determining the public interest include the safety, suitability, and proximity to other licensed premises of the location of the proposed

premises; the size of the proposed premises; community amenities associated with the premises, including entertainment, dining facilities, and tourist accommodations; and preferences or priorities expressed by the local governing body.

IF the Board is to have the subjective role of determining what is in "the public interest" then it must also have the same responsibility of such a determination during the rulemaking process. Eliminating the opportunities for small businesses like wineries, distilleries, and breweries to provide a space for festivals; games and competitions; classes; parties; presentations or performances; or other types of organized social gatherings that are advertised to the general public while at the same time selling locally crafted products does a disservice to the local and business community at large. Restaurants in the vicinity of these establishments are thriving as the result of increased visitors in the area as bars that are open and able to serve interested parties after 8pm.

Alaska's population is stagnating as is the business community due to a number of factors including the general ambiance of our respective "downtowns". If Alaska's leadership, including the Alaska Beverage Control Board, did in fact seek to promote entrepreneurship and demonstrate a state that is "Open for Business" the Board will immediately rescine the proposal to introduce the definition at 3 AAC 304.390.

I am writing to negatively comment on the proposed regulation changes to 3 AAC 304.390

I have been a loyal customer, friend to the industry, and sometimes employee to brewery, distillery, and meadery taprooms. I enjoy many of the characteristics that the tap and tasting rooms provide, and believe that some of the regulatory oversight is done with good-ish intent. I choose to believe that much of the intention behind the language in the regulations is to preserve safety, and the overall business interests of the entire industry. However, I am struggling to understand the intent, and potential improvements that would be made with this proposed change. I do not believe that this change is being made to further the safety of the people of Alaska.

The only rationale that I can see and have been able to understand behind these changes is that of a business decision. It is becoming blatantly apparent that the regulatory body is working to further the interests of the other segments of the industry, that are apparently threatened by the breweries, cideries, meaderys, distilleries, and the like. It is becoming clear that the other segments of the industry (ie. the bars, restaurants, and other drinking establishments) are beginning to feel threatened by the success of the organizations that this regulation change would directly effect. I believe that any change in business that the bars and restaurants are experiencing is directly the result of their business decisions made, and are not something that regulations should swoop in to change. If the bars and restaurants cannot compete with the sales and environment of beer, distilled spirits, cider, wine, mead et. taprooms, than they need to adapt the changing environment, and changing tastes to find success in the environment once again, and not rely on regulation changes to save them.

Let me put this another way, in a way that Darwin discussed several decades ago. If an organism (or business) cannot be successful in their environment, they must adapt to their new environment to survive. Out there in the ocean is an island filled with finches that could not obtain the food that was available to them because of the shape of their beak. Because of this predicament, the finch adapted and changed its beak to allow it to feed, to allow it to be successful. The finch realized that it was necessary to adapt and change or die. What the finch did not do was lobby a higher power to change the island, to place the food on a platter, and to make it illegal for the food to hide in the tree.

The finches, the bars and restaurants, need to learn to adapt to their new environment. What should not occur is the higher power swinging in to change the environment for them, and by that virtue causing harm to those that have found success on this particular island.

To make these changes will have a dramatic and devastating impact on several, if not dozens of small business. This seems like a strange move to occur in a political climate that is characterized by the statement that "Alaska is open for business". To hinder the businesses, in a way that provides no improvement to the overall safety or stability of the overall industry, is

reckless and irresponsible. It is the role of a regulatory body to regulate for the sake fo fairness, safety, and to preserve the interests of the State. this regulation change does not appear to serve any interest other than aiding the bars and restaurants that are struggling to find success in their current environment.

I understand you regulate alcohol servings, tasting room hours, and other aspects of tasting room business to ensure they operate differently from licensed bars and restaurants.

However, regulating music, art, and community events is NOT your business. The proposed new rules are regulatory capture, preferring one kind of business at the expense of another. We need healthy bars and restaurants, we also need healthy distilleries, and they can absolutely all thrive at once.

A liquor license does NOT license a business to hold a music event. Music is not exclusively played in bars, and it should NOT be regulated by AMCO. I realize music is already banned in tasting rooms, and that has always seemed unjust, but with further crackdowns proposed I question the legality of banning should a first amendment challenge be brought.

I had a Restaurant Designation in one location and I was not allowed to have video games or Foosball. I took them out because that was the statute that Richard Finney enforced. And I paid \$125,000 for that license. I just recently tried to get the Red Fox a Restaurant Designation and once more the pool Tables have become an issue.

Dear Alcohol Beverage Control Board Members:

Thank you for your public service. I appreciate your work on behalf of and representing the citizens of Alaska.

I am writing to oppose the proposed changes in 3 AAC 304 adopting 3 AAC 304.390 to define "other recreational or gaming opportunities."

I know that Alaska has social problems with alcohol and that the state has a responsibility to regulate alcohol manufacturing and consumption. I understand that this results in Alaskans and our visitors having a more limited experience at breweries and distilleries in Alaska than those in other states or countries. Limiting the hours and amount of sales address safety concerns.

Change is difficult and it is not surprising that bar owners would like to do business as they have done business in the past and that they would promote regulations to benefit them and hurt the businesses they perceive as competition.

At a time when Alaska is trying to diversify the economy, a government regulator should not promote restrictive regulations that will cripple or strangle a nascent industry in Alaska. Yes, Alaska is different than the rest of the country, but our government should promote business engagement in the community, not stifle it. I urge you to consider regulations that promote new businesses and jobs in the state, not ones that will eliminate those that currently exist and prohibit or discourage future entrepreneurs.

If the state prohibits breweries and distilleries from participating in community arts events, you should prohibit professional firms and ice cream parlors as well. In Juneau, ice cream manufacturers and architect offices participate in vibrant First Friday art exhibits. Those company's primary business is not art. A logical next step in this line of tightening regulation is for the Department of Commerce to prohibit anyone except certified art galleries from exhibiting, selling and advertising local artists' works. Prohibiting architects OR distilleries from participating in local arts events does not make sense for promoting vital community engagement and commerce in Juneau or other Alaskan communities.

Your responsibility to promote the health and safety of Alaskans is a significant responsibility. Alaskans do not visit breweries and distilleries to over indulge in alcohol, and the current regulations prohibit this. Forbidding Alaskans to gather at the place of their choice to participate in a community art event, or listen to a presentation, or contribute to a charity fundraiser does not protect their health and safety. Such prohibitions are simply "unAlaskan."

#### Dear Director McConnell-

My name is Tyler Jones. I've been a professional brewer in Alaska since 1997 and am currently the operating manager of Broken Tooth Brewing, the only allowable non-colocated Brewpub license in the State.

I am writing to you today on this Saturday morning of the Labor Day Weekend to express my opposition to the preposed language to define recreational and gaming opportunities.

I'm sure you've heard from many of my fellow colleagues from within the industry who have waxed eloquence about how this will negatively impact their existing operations. As we have a Brewpub license, these changes wouldn't impact our operations at all (unless the Title 4 rewrite eventually passes - but that's another story for another time).

I'm writing to you as a traveller.

Whenever I go somewhere, be it for work or leisure, I seek out nearby breweries to visit. Sometimes, if time allows, I'll take a tour, because I find it interesting. I obviously know how beer is made so it's not about that for me. Besides the technical stuff that I geek out on, I'm interested to see how breweries bring people together to share stories, catch up with old friends or unwind after a long hike.

Just yesterday, three different groups of tourists stopped by looking for our tasting room. One couple had just landed in Alaska and the first thing they wanted to do was to visit a brewery. Breweries are community centers. They have been for over 5000 years.

If breweries naturally bring people from all walks together, why do we want to tell them that they can't enjoy a game of cornhole while enjoying their freshly made IPA? Why do we want to tell them that they can't take a tour to learn how their delicious Tripel was made? Why do we want to tell them that they can't attend a class to learn the differences between a Lambic and a Kettle Sour?

The answer seems to be all about the BDL. When I read "The board directed staff to strengthen the language to better reflect the legislative intent that these licenses are manufacturers, not retailers," all I hear is Dale Fox's voice. That's his go-to. Protectionism at its finest.

As a fairly new resident to the state of Alaska and former brewery owner and resident of CA, I am concerned and confused with the current and proposed outdated policies from the AMCO. On one hand, the local and state communities promote the craft beer culture and industry in many ways to include but not limited to, advertising with social media, festivals, restaurants, train rides, you name it, however, in reality, the small businesses and start up breweries are being handcuffed by ridiculous rules, policies and regulations. This has a huge trickle effect on down the line of the businesses and those that additionally support them. There are currently over 7000 breweries in the US and that number is growing each and every year.

This opportunity should be supported by all local chamber of commerces, all the way up to the state level. I feel ALL local start up breweries and businesses should be given the opportunity to succeed without the proposed restrictions and enforcement of, "live music, TV's, pool tables, chairs to sit down in etc." The typical start up brewery is a huge undertaking. The proposed change to definition of "other recreation and gaming opportunities" for alcohol manufacturing licenses is detrimental to local small businesses trying to support the community they are in.

Recreation is defined as "refreshment by means of some pastime, agreeable exercise or the like."

Gaming is defined as "the action or practice of playing gambling games."

Defining recreation and gaming as any social gathering open to the public is expanding the limitation of breweries, distilleries and wineries beyond a reasonable degree and against the definition of both words.

If a business wants to raise money for a good cause, it should not be the job of ABC to prevent or limit such events. Additionally, prohibiting classes or lectures is again taking recreation and gaming and mutating it. Patrons come to manufactures to learn about the process to make alcohol and understand the products better. This is only available in the actual space where alcohol is produced and should not be controlled by ABC in anyway.

When we applied for our license, we were fully aware of the restrictions placed on breweries to limit our hours, and what can be done in the brewery. Hello, my name is Lauren Hopson and I am a young medical professional living in Juneau. Because I grew up in Juneau and now also practice pediatric healthcare in this small town, it is hard to go anywhere without seeing my patients and their families. As a member of a small practice, I understand that I am always representing my workplace when I am out in public and I am held to an especially high standard because I work with children. For this reason, I have spent more time at the Amalga Distillery and the Devils Club Brewery over the past few years than I have at any of the local bars. People sometimes bring their babies and young kids with them to the distillery or brewery because they are viewed as public gathering spaces rather than spaces only intended for consuming alcohol. I feel more comfortable enjoying time with my friends and family in these spaces than I do in a local bar because frankly, it feels more socially acceptable. Some have said that it is elitist to say that drinking in a brewery or a distillery is more socially acceptable. But ultimately, I am continuously being judged on my public behavior and no small business can survive in a small town if you only serve people who think and behave like you. So I try to behave in public in a way that doesn't alienate others.

In the past three years, I have enjoyed wedding parties, First Friday art walks, hearing Sandor Katz speak, and many birthday and holiday celebrations. I think the board is making a mistake by trying to limit the breweries and distilleries' ability to host events and gatherings. Most of the reasonable arguments I have heard are not opposed to them holding events, but rather seem to feel that the bars need some sort of compensation so they do not feel out competed by the breweries and distilleries. As a resident of Fairbanks, various distilleries provide art venues, locations for classes and have provided tours for such events as a statewide education conference. There is no public benefit to the proposed redefinition (I don't think its actually a clarification) and in fact, does public harm by limiting options for communities to engage in public spaces in a variety of ways.

Other than negative feedback from traditional bar owners, I have yet to find a compelling reason for a change. Dear Sir or Madam:

I am providing these comments on your proposed regulation concerning Brewery, Winery, and Distillery Tasting Rooms. I am an attorney licensed to practice law in Alaska and Washington State. I am a resident of Seattle, Washington. I own property in Talkeetna, Alaska and I travel to Alaska regularly to enjoy Alaska's fine craft beer, mead, cider and distilled spirits in the tasting rooms of these establishments.

Tourist visits to these Alaska businesses is an important part of the tourism economy in many of Alaska's communities. Alaska has a reputation for excellence throughout the nation and the world as reflected by Alaska beer sales on Tavour and Alaska breweries' ratings on online forums such as Untapped, Beer Advocate, and member surveys of the American Homebrewers Association. As a National Beer Judge with the Beer Judge Certification Program, I agree that Alaska's breweries, meaderies and cider works are deserving of this national recognition.

Prior to moving to Seattle, I was a resident of Alaska for nearly thirty years and have seen the growth of the craft beer, wine and distilled spirit businesses in Alaska. I am familiar with the history of the laws and regulations governing these entities. I have been a part of the brewing community as a former President and past board member of the Great Northern Brewers, a non-profit organization of homebrewers in the Anchorage area. I

also served as an assistant attorney general in the Alaska Department of Law for some 28 years and have reviewed and advised on many pieces of legislation and regulations.

With this background, I can clearly state that the proposed regulation makes little sense as a matter of policy – either as a regulatory or economic matter – but more fundamentally, that the proposed regulation has substantial legal problems. As I explain below in more detail, the proposed regulation is inconsistent with statute, unconstitutionally vague and ambiguous and, as written, violates the Alaska Constitution's protections for freedom of expression and association. I ask that you withdraw the proposed regulation.

I. The Proposed Regulation Violates AS 44.62.060 because it is Inconsistent with AS 04.11.130(e)(1), AS 04.11.170(e)(1) and 3 AAC 304.380 Under the Cannon of Interpretation Known as *Ejusdem Generis*: When a general term follows specific terms, the general term "will be interpreted in light of the characteristics of the specific terms, absent clear indication to the contrary."

The Alaska Administrative Procedure Act (AS 44.62) establishes the procedures for adoption of agency regulations. AS 44.62.030 provides that an agency regulation must be "consistent with the statute and reasonably necessary to carry out the purpose of the statute." *See also* AS 04.06.100. AS 44.62.060 governing the preparation and filing of regulations provides that

- (b) In the performance of duties under AS 44.62.125, the Department of Law shall advise the agencies on legal matters relevant to the adoption of regulations and may advise the agencies on the need for and the policy involved in particular regulations. In addition, the department shall prepare a written statement of approval or disapproval after each regulation has been reviewed in order to determine
- (1) its legality, constitutionality, and consistency with other regulations;
- (2) the existence of statutory authority and the correctness of the required citation of statutory authority following each section;
- (3) its clarity, simplicity of expression, and absence of possibility of misapplication;

(4) compliance with the drafting manual for administrative regulations.

3 AAC 304.390 is a proposed definition of a general term in AS 04.11.130(e)(1), AS 04.11.170(e)(1), and 3 AAC 304.380 which prohibits "other recreational or gaming opportunities" in a brewery, distillery, or winery tasting room. The tasting room may sell samples of its product if it

does not allow live entertainment, televisions, pool tables, dart games, dancing, electronic or other games, game tables, <u>or other recreational or gaming opportunities</u> on the premises where the consumption occurs.

(emphasis added). As the Alaska Supreme Court has explained:

Under the interpretive canon *ejusdem generis*, when a general term follows specific terms, the general term "will be interpreted in light of the characteristics of the specific terms, absent clear indication to the contrary." *City of Kenai v. Friends of Recreation Ctr., Inc.*, 129 P.3d 452, 459 (Alaska 2006) (*quoting West v. Umialik Ins. Co.*, 8 P.3d 1135, 1141 (Alaska 2000)); *ejusdem generis*, BLACK'S LAW DICTIONARY (10th ed. 2014) ("A canon of construction holding that when a general word or phrase follows a list of specifics, the general word or phrase will be interpreted to include only items of the same class as those listed.").

State v. Planned Parenthood of the Great Northwest, 436 P.3d 984, 995-96 (Alaska 2019).

Consequently, the term "other recreational or gaming opportunities" in AS 04.11.130(e)(1) and .170(e)(1) must be interpreted to have the characteristics of the specific terms "live entertainment, televisions, pool tables, dart games, dancing, electronic or other games, [and] game tables."

The specific terms of the statutes prohibit games, televisions, and dancing at tasting rooms. "Live entertainment" is not defined in statute but the plain meaning of the term is limited to things like live music or entertainment by performers. *See* Miriam Webster "Definition of entertainment, 1a: amusement or diversion

provided especially by performers // hired a band to provide entertainment; b: something diverting or engaging: such as (1): a public performance."

The proposed regulation would expand the prohibitions contained in statute far beyond games and live entertainment by performers to "festivals," "classes," "parties," "presentations," and "other types of organized social gatherings that are advertised to the general public." These proposed prohibitions do not have the characteristics of games or live music or entertainment by performers. Consequently, the proposed definition is inconsistent with statute and violates AS 44.62.030 and .060. It must be withdrawn.

There is no indication that the Alaska Legislature intended to prohibit the recreational activities that are inherently part of a tasting room: social gathering and education focused on the sampling of the product made by the brewery, winery or distillery. The legislative history of the prohibitions on tasting rooms indicates that traditional bar owners did not want unfair competition from tasting rooms. The bar owners did not want tasting rooms to have dancing, live performers, bands, pool tables, video games, bar games, and televisions. In addition, the statutes put limits on hours of operation and the amount of product that could be served at a tasting room. There is no Legislative intent that brewers could not make presentations at their tasting rooms, or host social events to promote their product. These are legitimate functions of a tasting room.

To adopt the new limitations proposed in 3 AAC 305.390 would destroy the division of the roles of bars and tasting rooms set up by the Legislature. Alaska would be best served by allowing bars and tasting rooms to flourish in their delineated roles. The proposed regulation attempts to prevent tasting rooms from functioning as they were intended: to allow breweries, wineries and distilleries to educate the public about their product and to allow tasting and limited sales at their establishments. Presentations about the product, classes educating people about the product, or social gatherings to promote the product are all within the legitimate role of tasting rooms throughout the country. The proposed regulation is both misguided and illegal under Alaska law.

II. The Terms Proposed in 3 AAC 304.390(a)(1)-(6) Are Unconstitutionally Vague and Ambiguous.

The proposed regulation does not define the terms festivals, classes, parties, presentations or organized social gatherings. These terms are hopelessly broad and

vague. Like the term "pollution" in *Stock v. State*, 526 P.2d 3, 7-12 (Alaska 1974), these terms -- without further definition -- do not give a tasting room adequate warning as to what is prohibited. Consequently, they violate AS 44.62.030, .060, and the due process provisions of the Alaska Constitution.

A festival could include advertising a Fresh Hop Festival to be held at a tasting room where the brewery's new fresh hop beers could be sampled. That is a completely legitimate role of a tasting room. A festival that involved live entertainment like jugglers or involved sampling other establishment's product is already prohibited by law. Adding festival to regulation does not serve a legitimate purpose.

Holding a competition in which people sample and vote on an establishment's product in the tasting room is also a legitimate promotional event in a tasting room. A beer, mead, cider, or distilled spirit tasting class that involves sampling the establishment's product is a legitimate function of a tasting room. Presentations by brewers about how their product is made and tours of an establishment are recognized throughout the country as normal activities of a tasting room. "Release parties" are normal activities at a tasting room when a brewery, winery or distillery advertises the release of a special new product for sampling.

Because the regulation does not define its very broad terms, which include legitimate activities or potentially some that are not, the regulation is vague and ambiguous in violation of AS 44.62.060 and could lead to potentially discriminatory enforcement in violation of the Alaska Constitution's due process clause.

III. The Prohibitions on Presentations, Classes and the Like Violates the Establishment's Commercial Speech Rights Under the Alaska Constitution.

The Alaska Supreme Court has recognized that businesses have rights to free speech under the Alaska Constitution. *Holding v. Municipality of Anchorage*, 63 P.3d 248, 251-52 (Alaska 2003). The Court applied the test first articulated in *Central Hudson v. Public Service Commission*, 447 U.S. 557, 564, 100 S.Ct. 2343, 65 L.Ed.2d 341 (1980), and reiterated in *Bolger v. Youngs Drug Products Corp.*, 463 U.S. 60, 68, 103 S.Ct. 2875, 77 L.Ed.2d 469 (1983):

First, we determine whether the expression is constitutionally protected. For commercial speech to receive such protection, it at

least must concern lawful activity and not be misleading. Second, we ask whether the governmental interest is substantial. If so, we must then determine whether the regulation directly advances the governmental interest asserted, and whether it is not more extensive than necessary to serve that interest. *AIRPAC*, 685 P.2d at 1253.

The Alaska Supreme Court recently struck-down an Anchorage Ordinance that regulated the hours of an adult cabaret involving nude dancing. *Club SinRock*, *LLC v. Municipality of Anchorage*, --- P.3d ---- (August 2, 2019). The Court struck-down the ordinance because it found that nude dancing was protected by the free expression protections of the Alaska Constitution and the closing-hours restriction as applied to adult cabarets was not sufficiently narrowly tailored to achieve its ends.

So too, the prohibitions on the owners of tasting rooms from holding classes, presentations, competitions, or social gatherings focused on the tasting of their product would violate protected free expression under the Alaska Constitution. As detailed above, the Board does not have a legitimate compelling reason to advance such prohibitions, nor are the prohibitions "no more extensive than necessary to serve the legitimate regulatory interest." *Holding*, 63 P.3d at 251-52. Consequently, these proposed prohibitions on protected free expression are barred by Article 5, Section 5 of the Alaska Constitution.

In sum, I ask that the Board withdraw the proposed regulation as inconsistent with statute and because it violates provisions of the Alaska Constitution. Finally, I ask the Board to withdraw the proposed regulation because it does not advance legitimate regulatory interests and would constitute bad public policy. Alaska should be promoting the responsible operation of its craft breweries, wineries and distilleries. This proposed regulation is in search of a problem that does not exist. Tasting rooms and bars can co-exist in their respective regulatory frameworks establish by the Legislature. There is no need to adopt this regulation.

### To Whom It May Concern:

I am the owner of Bawden Street Brewing Company. The proposed changes to the definitions of 'recreational or gaming activities' in 3 AAC 304.390(a)(1)-(6) must be withdrawn. Three reasons support the withdrawal. First, the proposed regulation expands the prohibitions beyond what is stated in statute. Second, the terms in 3 AAC 304.390(a) (1)-(6) are hopelessly vague. Third, the prohibitions on classes, presentations, and like activities unduly infringe on commercial speech rights.

#### 1. The proposed regulation expands the prohibitions beyond what is stated in statute

There's a fancy legal doctrine called *ejusdem generis* that states that when a general term follows a list of specific terms, that general term will be interpreted to include only those terms of the same class of listed specific terms. The Alaska Supreme Court explains this in *State v. Planned Parenthood of the Great Northwest*, 436 P.3d 984, 995-96 (Alaska 2019)

AS 04.11.130(e)(1) states, in pertinent part, "a holder of a brewery license may sell not more than 36 ounces a day of the brewery's product to a person for consumption on the premises if [...] the brewery does not allow live entertainment, televisions, pool tables, dart games, dancing, electronic or other games, game tables, or other recreational or gaming opportunities on the premises where the consumption occurs[.]" No further definitions occur in the relevant statute, but the plain reading of the text, *ejusdem generis* aside, shows that the general terms "other recreational or gaming opportunities" ought to be interpreted in light of the specific, context-setting terms of 'live entertainment, televisions, pool tables, dart games, dancing, electronic or other games, [and] game tables". "Gaming opportunities' is obvious: bingo, pull tabs, raffles, and the like are prohibited. 'Recreational activities' seems vague at first, but with the inclusion of specific activities like darts, pool tables, dancing, electronic and non-electronic games, and game tables (objects and activities commonly found in bars and restaurants) it is obvious the Legislature intended to prohibit objects and activities that resemble darts, pool tables, dancing, electronic and non-electronic games, and game tables. The list of terms that the regulation seeks to prohibit does not resemble these terms in any meaningful way.

To wit, the proposed regulation at 3 AAC 304.390(a)(1)-(6) would prohibit festivals, games and competitions, classes, parties (except private parties with specific, invited guests), presentations or performances, and other types of organized social gatherings that are advertised to the general public. With the exception of "games and competitions," which are already prohibited, these activities in no way resemble the activities or objects prohibited by statute, and the justification of a purported resemblance would torture the plain reading of the law. Given that the general terms in question ('recreational and gaming opportunities') ought to be interpreted in light of the specific terms the Legislature intentionally listed, the proposed expansion of these general terms is a regulatory overreach. There is no indication that the Legislature intended to probit the items in proposed regulation 3 AAC 304.390(a)(1)-(6) EXCEPT those specifically mentioned, at which point the proposed regulation becomes redundant and pointless.

As such, the proposed regulation should be withdrawn.

### 2. The terms in 3 AAC 304.390(a)(1)-(6) are hopelessly vague

Even if AMCO were to set aside common sense and add the proposed definitions in 3 AAC 304.390(a)(1)-(6), these terms are hopelessly vague. As such, breweries will not have adequate warning about what activities are prohibited. This will lead to discriminatory or capricious enforcement, costing taxpayer money.

Nowhere does the proposed regulation define 'festival,' 'class,' 'presentation,' or 'performance.' A common sense understanding of 'class' or 'presentation,' without reaching for a dictionary, is the communication of information (of varying degrees of technicality) to an uninformed audience. A class or presentation can occur in a formal setting, with a prearranged time and place, or can be ad hoc and informal. As such, if a customer asks about the ingredients in a beer or how the beer is made, this would qualify as a 'class' or 'presentation': A brewer telling a customer about the alphaamylase/beta-amylase windows during mashing that result in different original gravities would be a class or presentation; a brewer relationship between original gravity and final gravity for a given type of yeast would be a class or presentation; a brewer describing the life cycle and metabolic pathways of various yeasts would be a class or presentation; a brewer detailing the alpha acid isomerization rate during boiling of wort, and the relationship of that rate

of specific gravity would be a class or presentation. Examples multiply.

At least 'class' and 'presentation' have some generally accepted meaning that we can point to; 'performance' and 'festival' are entirely up in the air.

If the proposed regulation were to be adopted, it seems likely that the mere act of listing ingredients to a customer would run afoul of the law. But surely this can't be correct, as answering customer questions and consumer education are common place activities that servers and brewers engage in on a daily basis in brewery tasting rooms. Unless the hopelessly vague terms proposed as a definitions of "recreational and gaming opportunities" are themselves further defined, brewers and tasting room employees will not know with sufficient clarity what is prohibited.

Under the proposed regulation including the vague terms, if a brewer were to describe ingredients, processes, intended results, then anyone could report that brewer as being in violation of AS 04.11.130(e)(1). However, if a bar, restaurant or wholesaler were to describe that brewer's ingredients, processes, intended results, then no violation occurs. This is plainly discriminatory: why should a bar or restaurant receive preferential treatment for otherwise harmless behavior that would earn a brewer a citation?

If brewers aren't on notice that certain activities are prohibited, as would be the case if the hopelessly vague terms were to be adopted, then consistent enforcement of those prohibitions would be either heavy-handed and require more enforcement agents than the state currently has, or random and capricious, dependent on whim.

As such, the proposed regulation should be withdrawn.

### 3. The prohibitions on classes, presentations, and like activities unduly infringe on commercial speech rights.

To include classes/presentations (formal or informal) and other similar activities on the list of prohibited activities is an obvious, grotesque violation on commercial speech rights. Further, there is no public good just clamoring to be met by barring such speech, no public health and safety objectives to be furthered by limiting brewers' commercial speech in this manner, and no protection of fair marketplace competition by preventing such speech. This takes no thought to uncover, but there are anomalous results that seem likely to occur if these hopelessly vague terms were adopted.

If anything, it puts consumers at risk because brewers and taproom employees are prevented from presenting or teaching consumers about what is in the product they are consuming: a customer with a wheat allergy surely would like to know if and how much wheat is in a beer, e.g., What effect, if any, do different styles of mashing have on gluten? A vegan consumer would surely like to know if animal products are used in the production of the beer: does the brewer use isinglass as a kettle fining agent? And if brewers are prevented from educating their consumers, brewers are exposed to product liability claims or other similar torts.

For this reason, the proposed regulation should be withdrawn.

### 4. Summary

For the above mentioned reasons, the proposed changes to the definitions of 'recreational or gaming activities' in 3 AAC 304.390(a)(1)-(6) must be withdrawn. It is the general purpose of regulation to provide the "rubber meets the road" practical application of Legislative intent as enacted by statute, and, generally considered, regulation serves the purposes of promoting health and safety, and providing fair marketplace competition. This proposed regulation does none of the above.

I completely understand the idea behind the different liquor licenses and can see why traditional bars are advocating to keep reduced hours and privileges from the lesser licenses. What I don't understand is the crippling rules about what behaviors are allowed in such cases. I believe that bars are overstepping their grounds with demands that breweries eliminate any form of entertainment. The wine and beer licenses at restaurants permits such activity, why are we punishing these local business establishments that produce beer, wine and distilled spirits? The limits of 36 ounces of beer and the shutdown at 8pm should be more than enough to differentiate the tasting rooms from traditional bar licenses. The bars do not even start live music until after 9pm. They have limited or no food offerings, and First Friday art exhibits are not an option.

I personally am not often a bar patron. The clientele at traditional bars get decidedly more intoxicated. Bar patrons also stay out until 2 AM, a time well past healthy behavior. I am an artist who has made a living selling my art at brewery tasting rooms. If the availability to show my art at tasting rooms were to change that would affect me negatively. I have always found the brewery tasting room to be a preferable place to meet people and to have social encounters. I find them to be cleaner, have food available in trucks, or from an onsite restaurant. These places have a different type of clientele. The alcohol served is fresher and better than from a bar. The brewery is the source for the beer, and the best place to get the freshest beer from that brewery.

With the drink limit set in place there are a lot less overly drunk people loitering about looking for trouble. It is my opinion that the rules are too strict on tasting rooms when it comes to cultural activities. Breweries, wineries and distilleries are a growing sector of Alaskan economic growth, we should not hinder their ability for cultural involvement. This is a place safe for the community to mingle in a safe bright environment. The limiting factors from liquor laws has not improved these places but has allowed bars to become a type of monopoly that allows the establishments to sit on their laurels. It is similar to the cab companies where the few licenses have allowed for bad service and even unsafe practices (i.e. really old cabs). While rideshare services are producing a great experience at a good price. The breweries are paying for a liquor license and they are making the product locally. Breweries are not paying the absurd prices that a "real" liquor license requires on the secondary market. That absurd price is making traditional bars the type of "dive" that I do not want to even want to set foot in.

I am disappointed by the practices of Alaska's liquor licensing. It is making things worse and keeping the free market economy out of the equation. The last thing I want as an Alaskan is to see our vibrant brewery scene hindered further, and to reward a system that is outdated and not working towards its original goals.

Hello - I am writing in support of our new young Alaska entrepreneurs who have opened distilleries and breweries with tasting rooms according to established rules. This new round of rules seems to be unfair and in essence punishes these businesses for being successful and community oriented. I love that these businesses have art shows and classes and other community events. It does not limit or replace the fact that I go out for a glass of wine at my local bars including the Narrows, the Hangar, Island Pub, etc. I probably consume less than 10% of my "going out" alcohol at distillery/brewer tasting room settings. I don't see local bars performing these community functions (except the Hangar which has a rental venue). What purpose does these rules serve other than to limit the perception of competition? I know there are a limited number of liquor licenses and again I don't see the bars in Juneau having fun events other than occasional music. Furthermore many retail establishments do just these very events to promote sales - galleries have art shows (sometimes with wine and cheese), bookstores have classes and books signings and game nights, a local shop in Juneau (Kindred Post) even has poetry readings. Communities lose the kinds of events that make them unique—local arts classes, presentations, performances, etc. These are niche events that don't directly compete with traditional establishments. Banning them won't help anyone, but it will hurt the feeling of community pride and coherence that exists today.

Hello Commissioner Anderson, Deputy Commissioner Springsteen, and Assistant Commissioner Demboski:

As you know, AMCO and the ABC Board have proposed to adopt some very restrictive language to define "other recreational or gaming opportunities". Hosting fundraisers, highlighting local artisans, giving educational beer tours, and providing a safe gathering place are core components of our business model and other breweries throughout Alaska. These practices have been accepted over the years, yet many would be threatened if this language is adopted. It is completely UnAlaskan to start a business centered around something, only to have the chair pulled out from under you.

We are open for business and truly proud of the 15 jobs we have created in less than three years. We are a vehicle of tourism, and the positive economic impact Girdwood Brewing Company has driven to other businesses in Girdwood is undeniable. If this proposed language is adopted, it will hurt our bottom line, and we will be forced to lay off employees. With AMCO now being under the umbrella of the Department of Commerce, Community, and Economic Development, we are hoping you can provide some guidance to modernize our industry and not go backwards. If you truly want to promote a healthy economy, strong communities, and protect consumers in Alaska, then why stifle the growth of a budding industry?

Girdwood has been happy to support numerous non-profits through fundraisers and donations. Some of this has directly contributed to public safety- <u>Glacier Valley Transit</u>, <u>Friends of the Chugach National Forest Avalanche Information Center</u>, and <u>Alaska Avalanche School</u>. Others have brought food to the table- <u>Girdwood community garden</u> and <u>Food Bank of Alaska</u>. Additionally, we have helped <u>Challenge Alaska</u> all the kids' ski programs at <u>Alyeska Resort</u>, <u>Arctic Valley Ski Area</u>, <u>Alaska State Parks</u>, <u>Alaska Trails</u>, <u>Girdwood Mountain Bike Alliance</u>,

<u>Girdwood Turnagain Arm Lions Club</u>, our local school, and numerous other organizations. It would be especially sad if we had to cancel a celebration for our local firefighters this October.

Our opponents say we should only manufacture and have no privileges; current statute and the First Amendment say otherwise. Although they have no numbers to prove it, you may also hear from some old school bar owners that we are infringing on their business. The reality is consumer demand is changing, and people want fresh and local. Eateries and bars with cool concepts and a safe atmosphere are doing well. Lastly the argument that they have "paid to play" with a BDL is flawed as well. Most of these bar owners making a fuss paid little for their BDL and are now being sold for 100K-300K depending on location. The reality is we (a relatively small brewery) have paid over 300K for our brewing equipment alone and another 200K to create a nice bright atmosphere for our town to enjoy. We don't want to be a bar. All we want to do is serve our beer and our community.

In Alaska breweries are already operating under some of the strictest regulations in the country, yet we are still finding a way to scrape by. As some of the only true manufacturers in the state we should be getting a hand up from the State of AK, not continually pushed down by those looking for a handout.

If you could please offer up some assistance of any kind it would be greatly appreciated.

I am writing to protest the proposed changes to the interpretation of the definition of "recreational and gaming opportunities" in the state alcohol regulations. The changes to ban alcohol tasting rooms from being host to "(1) festivals; (2) games and competitions; (3) classes; (4) parties, except for private parties limited to specific invited guests; (5) presentations or performances; (6) other types of organized social gathering" is unnecessarily restrictive and will drive business away from the retail districts of our communities.

These alcohol-producing businesses are already burdened heavily with taxes and regulations, and this latest regulation goes too far. This tightened definition of non-permissible activities seems intended to drive customers away from these tasting room businesses, and that is something that communities badly in need of tourist dollars cannot afford. There may be other voices with political and financial pull who are calling for restrictions to these establishments, but it seems antithetical to the spirit of encouraging entrepreneurship in our state to force these breweries and distilleries out of business by making them unable to attract visitors with programming that similar businesses are allowed.

Strong-arming government to put your competition out of business is not a robust business model. I would say that instead it is time for the bar and package store owners to look to their own backyards, and figure out why places with a two or three drink maximum that close at 8:00 pm are such a threat to their custom. Maybe it the tasting rooms' interest in providing family-friendly, well-decorated and nicely-lit spaces with locally-made products that is making them more popular? Maybe if bar owners did the math they might discover that distilleries and tap rooms are actually driving people to their businesses by providing them a lure to come downtown, where they can then be encourage to "make a night of it" by visiting multiple venues. I am writing to oppose the proposed regulation changes to tasting rooms for breweries and distilleries. The proposal goes way beyond the statute and provide no public safety improvements. They also seem like they are not enforceable. They are very ambiguous besides.

The statute specifically mentions categories that are prohibited. This code change greatly increases that list. For instance how are classes now included? I don'; to see that in the statute. Public parties is an expansion. I've been in tasting rooms where a birthday is being celebrated. Do all these people need to be removed from the premise? Social gatherings? Really? What if a sports team decides to meet at a tasting room before or after their game? Do all the people in the tasting room have to be strangers? I hope they don't get social. Where do presentations come in? I don't see that in the statute. I don't believe that constitutionally you can prevent a presentation in a public space. What other business has that restriction? I don't see how festivals can be included. They are not mentioned in the statute. What if the cancer society wants to hold a rally for their cause at a tasting room? Is this really illegal? What kind of grinch wrote theses changes?

None of the changes improve public safety and only seem to be in place to prohibit these businesses from being successful. They are draconian without having an affect on how alcohol consumption will occur. Is the control board really going to crack down on a business just because they have a class or presentation on the history of Alaska for instance? Where is the public safety in that? It seems more of a punishment, just for having a class.

The statute also doesn't mention anything about advertising. It sounds like these businesses just aren't allowed to advertise for fear they are promoting social gathering. And who can't advertise? Dear Members of the Alcohol Beverage Control Board:

I write today to provide my views on the proposed new language in 3 AAC 304, Definitions, which is out for public comment through October 4, 2019. As stated, the draft regulations seek to clarify the definition of "other recreational and gaming opportunities" as applied to brewery licensees, distillery licensees, and winery licensees.

My concerns about the proposed regulations, 3 AAC 304.390, fall into three main categories: economy, definition, and process. First, it is important to note small businesses, like Alaska's distilleries, breweries, and wineries, employ more than half of the workers in the nation and promote economic growth and product innovation. In Alaska, for example, since the passage of House Bill 309 in 2014, the distillery industry has been steadily growing, creating jobs, purchasing local goods and services, and contributing tax revenues to the State and local communities. The artisans and entrepreneurs in these establishments use local ingredients, such as grain, fireweed, rhubarb, berries, and spruce tips, to craft a uniquely Alaskan experience for their patrons.

Secondly, I find some of the wording contained in the proposed regulations to be vague. For example, how are "presentations or performances" in (a)(5) defined? We know tasting rooms and production facilities draw interest from tourists and provide convivial gathering points for locals. Would the proposed regulations have a chilling effect on the tours these businesses conduct? I can think of no other industry that is prohibited from promoting its product in this manner.

Lastly, as you are aware, the Legislature continues to update the statutes in Title 4. I don't see the proposed definition revisions as particularly time-sensitive and would prefer to see the concepts and language being proposed accomplished within the legislative process.

In conclusion, I encourage additional, thoughtful dialogue, with a wider variety of stakeholders, before these regulations are adopted. Holding the ABC meeting in Nome, which is world-renowned for its colorful nightlife and taverns, but where, according to my research, there hasn't been an operating brewery or distillery in over a century, does not, in my view, provide adequate opportunity for a balanced conversation on the economic benefits of Alaska's small craft businesses.

The way Americans consume and enjoy alcoholic beverages is changing; the industry should change with the times. Thank you for considering my comments.

WHEREAS, Kenai River Brewing Company's tasting room has periodically served as a meeting venue for Tsalteshi Trails Association committees and other administrative purposes of the organization; and

WHEREAS, Kenai River Brewing Company's tasting room has provided a community-oriented public space for Tsalteshi Trails Association users to come together for awards ceremonies and celebration following races and other local events on Tsalteshi Trails Association's trail system; and

WHEREAS, Tsalteshi Trails Association currently lacks its own facilities or ability to secure similar indoor space for its members to gather elsewhere; and

WHEREAS, Kenai River Brewing Company has been a long-time financial supporter of Tsalteshi Trails Association and other local nonprofit agencies; and

WHEREAS, AS 04.06.100 tasks the Alaska Alcoholic Beverage Control Board with adopting regulations that are "necessary to carry out the purpose of this title [*Title 4 – Alcoholic Beverages*] in a manner that will protect the public health, safety, and welfare;" and

WHEREAS, an overly encompassing definition of "other recreational or gaming opportunities" as referenced in proposed section 3 AAC 304.390 provides no additional public health, safety, or welfare benefit while harming Tsalteshi Trails Association's ability to provide and maintain a pristine local trail system beneficial to the health and well being of the local community.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF TSALTESHI TRAILS ASSOCIATION:

- Section 1. Tsalteshi Trails Association respectfully requests that the Alaska Alcoholic Beverage Control Board not adopt section 3 AAC 304.390 as proposed.
- Section 2. The Alaska Alcoholic Beverage Control Board fully consider potential impacts to local nonprofits and community groups with any future regulatory changes in relation to Title 4.

Re: Notice of Proposed Changes on Definitions of Recreational or Gaming Opportunities in the Regulations of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board Dated 26 August 2019.

I am the CEO of Grace Ridge Brewing, Inc. I oppose the implementation of the proposed definitions for many reasons. The ones that I believe are the strongest arguments against the change are detailed below:

- 1. The proposed regulation expands the restraints to free trade. The beverage manufacturing classes are being targeted and prevented from exercising free and open commerce. Every business, to be successful, must become part of the community in which it exists. The proposed definitions restricts the ability of the licensed entity to integrate themselves into those communities.
- 2. The proposed regulation is not an improvement in definition. The substitution of "other types of organized social gatherings advertised to the general public" is equally as undefined as "other recreational or gaming opportunities." Games and competitions are not defined.
- 3. The proposed regulation does not support the purpose of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board. There is no increase, or betterment, to the public health, safety, or welfare. The proposal restricts the building of community that has become a staple of the manufacturing sector tasting room business models. Nothing here supports the health, safety, nor welfare of the public.

Business is constantly changing. Social media and what is happening in neighboring states are exerting pressure on the current business landscape. Businesses must adapt to stay alive, and regressive regulations that do not support adaptations to the changes doom business to failure. It could be argued that the restrictions applied to the manufacturing classes in general are a restraint that should be abolished, but that is a constitutional matter greater than the immediate change proposed.

I realize how difficult your job is and thank you for doing it. I encourage you to <u>not adopt</u> the new regulation.

I would like to state my opinion that I am against the further restrictions against the local breweries and distilleries. My argument is founded upon a number of issues:

- 1) I feel that restricting the events, activities, and otherwise social gatherings at local breweries and distilleries stifles community engagement, networking, and gatherings. With the already restrictive laws in place the people who would choose to go out to these places will simply stay at home not support the businesses, therefore limiting the available capital. This further restricts possible business opportunities from occurring because the people who might have met at mutual gathering places shall be isolated.
- 2) These restrictive community engagement measures will then restrict economic growth by preventing people from meeting, organizing, supporting, and otherwise allowing business to occur and capital to be gained. I am providing these comments on your proposed regulation concerning Brewery, Winery, and Distillery Tasting Rooms. I am an attorney licensed to practice law in Alaska and Washington State. I am a resident of Seattle, Washington. I own property in Talkeetna, Alaska and I travel to Alaska regularly to enjoy Alaska's fine craft beer, mead, cider and distilled spirits in the tasting rooms of these establishments.

Tourist visits to these Alaska businesses is an important part of the tourism economy in many of Alaska's communities. Alaska has a reputation for excellence throughout the nation and the world as reflected by Alaska beer sales on Tavour and Alaska breweries' ratings on online forums such as Untapped, Beer Advocate, and member surveys of the American Homebrewers Association. As a National Beer Judge with the Beer Judge Certification Program, I agree that Alaska's breweries, meaderies and cider works are deserving of this national recognition.

Prior to moving to Seattle, I was a resident of Alaska for nearly thirty years and have seen the growth of the craft beer, wine and distilled spirit businesses in Alaska. I am familiar with the history of the laws and regulations governing these entities. I have been a part of the brewing community as a former President and past board member of the Great Northern Brewers, a non-profit organization of homebrewers in the Anchorage area. I

also served as an assistant attorney general in the Alaska Department of Law for some 28 years and have reviewed and advised on many pieces of legislation and regulations.

With this background, I can clearly state that the proposed regulation makes little sense as a matter of policy – either as a regulatory or economic matter – but more fundamentally, that the proposed regulation has substantial legal problems. As I explain below in more detail, the proposed regulation is inconsistent with statute, unconstitutionally vague and ambiguous and, as written, violates the Alaska Constitution's protections for freedom of expression and association. I ask that you withdraw the proposed regulation.

I. The Proposed Regulation Violates AS 44.62.060 because it is Inconsistent with AS 04.11.130(e)(1), AS 04.11.170(e)(1) and 3 AAC 304.380 Under the Cannon of Interpretation Known as *Ejusdem Generis*: When a general term follows specific terms, the general term "will be interpreted in light of the characteristics of the specific terms, absent clear indication to the contrary."

The Alaska Administrative Procedure Act (AS 44.62) establishes the procedures for adoption of agency regulations. AS 44.62.030 provides that an agency regulation must be "consistent with the statute and reasonably necessary to carry out the purpose of the statute." *See also* AS 04.06.100. AS 44.62.060 governing the preparation and filing of regulations provides that

- (b) In the performance of duties under AS 44.62.125, the Department of Law shall advise the agencies on legal matters relevant to the adoption of regulations and may advise the agencies on the need for and the policy involved in particular regulations. In addition, the department shall prepare a written statement of approval or disapproval after each regulation has been reviewed in order to determine
- (1) its legality, constitutionality, and consistency with other regulations;
- (2) the existence of statutory authority and the correctness of the required citation of statutory authority following each section;
- (3) its clarity, simplicity of expression, and absence of possibility of misapplication;

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(4) compliance with the drafting manual for administrative regulations.

3 AAC 304.390 is a proposed definition of a general term in AS 04.11.130(e)(1), AS 04.11.170(e)(1), and 3 AAC 304.380 which prohibits "other recreational or gaming opportunities" in a brewery, distillery, or winery tasting room. The tasting room may sell samples of its product if it

does not allow live entertainment, televisions, pool tables, dart games, dancing, electronic or other games, game tables, <u>or other recreational or gaming opportunities</u> on the premises where the consumption occurs.

(emphasis added). As the Alaska Supreme Court has explained:

Under the interpretive canon *ejusdem generis*, when a general term follows specific terms, the general term "will be interpreted in light of the characteristics of the specific terms, absent clear indication to the contrary." City of Kenai v. Friends of Recreation Ctr., Inc., 129 P.3d 452, 459 (Alaska 2006) (quoting West v. Umialik Ins. Co., 8 P.3d 1135, 1141 (Alaska 2000)); *ejusdem generis*, BLACK'S LAW DICTIONARY (10th ed. 2014) ("A canon of construction holding that when a general word or phrase follows a list of specifics, the general word or phrase will be interpreted to include only items of the same class as those listed.").

State v. Planned Parenthood of the Great Northwest, 436 P.3d 984, 995-96 (Alaska 2019).

Consequently, the term "other recreational or gaming opportunities" in AS 04.11.130(e)(1) and .170(e)(1) must be interpreted to have the characteristics of the specific terms "live entertainment, televisions, pool tables, dart games, dancing, electronic or other games, [and] game tables."

The specific terms of the statutes prohibit games, televisions, and dancing at tasting rooms. "Live entertainment" is not defined in statute but the plain meaning of the term is limited to things like live music or entertainment by performers. *See* Miriam Webster "Definition of entertainment, 1a: amusement or diversion

AMCO SEP 0 5 2019 provided especially by performers // hired a band to provide entertainment; b: something diverting or engaging: such as (1): a public performance."

The proposed regulation would expand the prohibitions contained in statute far beyond games and live entertainment by performers to "festivals," "classes," "parties," "presentations," and "other types of organized social gatherings that are advertised to the general public." These proposed prohibitions do not have the characteristics of games or live music or entertainment by performers. Consequently, the proposed definition is inconsistent with statute and violates AS 44.62.030 and .060. It must be withdrawn.

There is no indication that the Alaska Legislature intended to prohibit the recreational activities that are inherently part of a tasting room: social gathering and education focused on the sampling of the product made by the brewery, winery or distillery. The legislative history of the prohibitions on tasting rooms indicates that traditional bar owners did not want unfair competition from tasting rooms. The bar owners did not want tasting rooms to have dancing, live performers, bands, pool tables, video games, bar games, and televisions. In addition, the statutes put limits on hours of operation and the amount of product that could be served at a tasting room. There is no Legislative intent that brewers could not make presentations at their tasting rooms, or host social events to promote their product. These are legitimate functions of a tasting room.

To adopt the new limitations proposed in 3 AAC 305.390 would destroy the division of the roles of bars and tasting rooms set up by the Legislature. Alaska would be best served by allowing bars and tasting rooms to flourish in their delineated roles. The proposed regulation attempts to prevent tasting rooms from functioning as they were intended: to allow breweries, wineries and distilleries to educate the public about their product and to allow tasting and limited sales at their establishments. Presentations about the product, classes educating people about the product, or social gatherings to promote the product are all within the legitimate role of tasting rooms throughout the country. The proposed regulation is both misguided and illegal under Alaska law.

II. The Terms Proposed in 3 AAC 304.390(a)(1)-(6) Are Unconstitutionally Vague and Ambiguous.

The proposed regulation does not define the terms festivals, classes, parties, presentations or organized social gatherings. These terms are hopelessly broad and

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vague. Like the term "pollution" in *Stock v. State*, 526 P.2d 3, 7-12 (Alaska 1974), these terms -- without further definition -- do not give a tasting room adequate warning as to what is prohibited. Consequently, they violate AS 44.62.030, .060, and the due process provisions of the Alaska Constitution.

A festival could include advertising a Fresh Hop Festival to be held at a tasting room where the brewery's new fresh hop beers could be sampled. That is a completely legitimate role of a tasting room. A festival that involved live entertainment like jugglers or involved sampling other establishment's product is already prohibited by law. Adding festival to regulation does not serve a legitimate purpose.

Holding a competition in which people sample and vote on an establishment's product in the tasting room is also a legitimate promotional event in a tasting room. A beer, mead, cider, or distilled spirit tasting class that involves sampling the establishment's product is a legitimate function of a tasting room. Presentations by brewers about how their product is made and tours of an establishment are recognized throughout the country as normal activities of a tasting room. "Release parties" are normal activities at a tasting room when a brewery, winery or distillery advertises the release of a special new product for sampling.

Because the regulation does not define its very broad terms, which include legitimate activities or potentially some that are not, the regulation is vague and ambiguous in violation of AS 44.62.060 and could lead to potentially discriminatory enforcement in violation of the Alaska Constitution's due process clause.

III. The Prohibitions on Presentations, Classes and the Like Violates the Establishment's Commercial Speech Rights Under the Alaska Constitution.

The Alaska Supreme Court has recognized that businesses have rights to free speech under the Alaska Constitution. *Holding v. Municipality of Anchorage*, 63 P.3d 248, 251-52 (Alaska 2003). The Court applied the test first articulated in *Central Hudson v. Public Service Commission*, 447 U.S. 557, 564, 100 S.Ct. 2343, 65 L.Ed.2d 341 (1980), and reiterated in *Bolger v. Youngs Drug Products Corp.*, 463 U.S. 60, 68, 103 S.Ct. 2875, 77 L.Ed.2d 469 (1983):

First, we determine whether the expression is constitutionally protected. For commercial speech to receive such protection, it at

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least must concern lawful activity and not be misleading. Second, we ask whether the governmental interest is substantial. If so, we must then determine whether the regulation directly advances the governmental interest asserted, and whether it is not more extensive than necessary to serve that interest. *AIRPAC*, 685 P.2d at 1253.

The Alaska Supreme Court recently struck-down an Anchorage Ordinance that regulated the hours of an adult cabaret involving nude dancing. *Club SinRock*, *LLC v. Municipality of Anchorage*, --- P.3d ---- (August 2, 2019). The Court struck-down the ordinance because it found that nude dancing was protected by the free expression protections of the Alaska Constitution and the closing-hours restriction as applied to adult cabarets was not sufficiently narrowly tailored to achieve its ends.

So too, the prohibitions on the owners of tasting rooms from holding classes, presentations, competitions, or social gatherings focused on the tasting of their product would violate protected free expression under the Alaska Constitution. As detailed above, the Board does not have a legitimate compelling reason to advance such prohibitions, nor are the prohibitions "no more extensive than necessary to serve the legitimate regulatory interest." *Holding*, 63 P.3d at 251-52. Consequently, these proposed prohibitions on protected free expression are barred by Article 5, Section 5 of the Alaska Constitution.

In sum, I ask that the Board withdraw the proposed regulation as inconsistent with statute and because it violates provisions of the Alaska Constitution. Finally, I ask the Board to withdraw the proposed regulation because it does not advance legitimate regulatory interests and would constitute bad public policy. Alaska should be promoting the responsible operation of its craft breweries, wineries and distilleries. This proposed regulation is in search of a problem that does not exist. Tasting rooms and bars can co-exist in their respective regulatory frameworks establish by the Legislature. There is no need to adopt this regulation.

I am reaching out to you today to voice my opposition to the proposed changes of definitions of recreational or gaming opportunities, as I find that this new proposal compromises the integrity of promoting small business in Alaska.

This event brought hundreds of people out to show their support for a fellow community member and help him outfit his house with the appropriate equipment to help improve his quality of life. This is the Juneau community that I know and love. This is a community that I want to be apart of. These are the types of businesses that I want to see prosper. Businesses like Amalga and Devil's Club are comprised of fellow community members who provide a forum and tradition of promoting community. The list of examples goes on. What has your local bar done for the community recently? Please, do not restrict a business from continuing to hold events like these. It is simply regressive and needlessly obstructive.

Thank you for taking the time to read the concern of a Juneau community member and Alaska resident. I do hope that the Alcohol and Marijuana Control Office makes the right decision in allowing these businesses to continue doing their best to succeed and promote the good of the community. I request you take my first hand witness of the good these businesses do in our state into consideration before adopting the amended definitions. **Please do not approve this action.**

I agree with the Commerce Dept commissioner that the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board's proposed changes are restrictive and do not support a business inclusion initiative. To prohibit social gatherings advertised to the general public would harm the viability of these establishments and restrict freedom of participation in local events like First Fridays.

Breweries and distilleries and vineyards nationwide have become a defining part of their communities as both productive commercial ventures and as positive social centers offering venues which are natural as gathering places. Americans young and old have embraced these businesses, which foster a local sense of community, of engagement with fellow citizens. The trends in food and beverages strongly demonstrate that people now prefer their culinary and beverage experiences as close to the garden, the vines, or the barrel, as possible. Farm-to-table and on-site production, consumption, and social interactions are the current model people want and businesses must serve. It is obviously where the industry is going. Older regulations not recognizing these trends would irreparably harm Alaska's growing breweries and distilleries, and unfairly so.

I am writing in opposition to the proposed changes in 3 AAC 304, which would restrict the abilities of breweries and distilleries to host certain public events.

These public events - including First Fridays, live music, classes, presentations, and other social gatherings - are integral to our community, and breweries and distilleries are the only logical option. These events allow breweries and distilleries to focus on activities other than drinking and should be expanded and encouraged, rather than curtailed.

Bars are open late, legally serve drinks to already-intoxicated customers, and do not create any products on their own. In my perspective, they simply serve as a legal space for people to get drunk.

This is a far cry from the role that breweries and distilleries have in our communities. These are staffed by people who are innovating and locally creating new products, are intimately familiar with the products they create, are directly interacting with their customers to explain flavor profiles and the processes of brewing or distilling beverages. The staff are personally invested in their products, and the focus is on savoring an artisanal product rather than slamming mass-produced alcohol shipped in from the Lower 48.

Take a tour of breweries right before last call. Do you see belligerent customers or people about to drive drunk? Now look at bars right before last call. These are two vastly different types of establishments, and breweries and distilleries should be embraced as a much safer establishments with significantly lower social costs. Breweries and distilleries are already subject to stringent laws (3 drink limit, close by 8pm, etc.) that place them at a competitive economic disadvantage to bars. Breweries and distilleries should be promoted, not further punished.

Curtailing breweries' and distilleries' ability to foster community only hurts residents and the same people that the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board is intended to serve.

It means that we can still continue to provide amazing experiences where people who are home bound due to the their disability or lack of accessible destinations in town are able to come together and go for a horseback ridge in the Chugach Mountains or go halibut fishing or dip netting and provide fish for their family or connect with others and share laughs and stories. Dear representatives of the Alaska Alcohol and Marijuana Control Office,

I am writing in regards to the proposed regulatory changes in 3 AAC 304 of the Alaska Administrative Code, dealing with the definitions of recreational or gaming opportunities, and to express my firm opposition to adopting these new regulations as written. The statute allowing brewery retail sales has been in place since 2006, and only under the current AMCO director have we seen an effort to create additional restrictions beyond those set by the original statute.

Breweries, distilleries, and wineries (including cideries and meaderies) have opened and based their business plans on AMCO's long-standing interpretation of the statute, which allowed activities so long as they were not expressly prohibited by the statute. As Alaska continues to struggle to grow its economy, breweries are one of the few bright spots, despite the current restrictions in place on servings, operating hours, and entertainment. Why would the state seek to further hamper jobs and economic growth with these regulations?

The regulations are anti-small business and will inhibit tourism and general commerce. "Beer tourism" is a growing segment in the travel industry; tourists visit breweries for a sense of local flavor (literally), meet locals, and support local, independent businesses. Just as locals enjoy talks, presentations, classes, tours, and other activities at breweries, tourists expect such activities because they are common, welcomed aspects of the brewery experience in other states. Growth in the industry supports these conclusions – in 2014 there were 22 breweries operating in Alaska, in 2019 there are 45. Why would AMCO seek to stifle a growing industry that is creating jobs, substantial local economic impacts across the state, and seeing consistently increasing consumer demand.

The regulations conflict with AMCO's statutory authority to protect public safety, health, and welfare. The statute allows breweries to serve up to 36 ounces of beer per person per day; giving consumers reasons to drink slowly – by enjoying or participating in presentations, classes, and other activities (other than games, live entertainment, or other activities excluded by AS 04.11.130(e)) promotes public safety and welfare.

For all of the above reason, I am opposed to the new regulations proposed at 3 AAC 304 of the Alaska Administrative Code. I believe these unfairly target small- entrepreneurs and will have cascading effects on communities and local business unlike.

I strongly urge that these proposed regulations be removed from considerations for formal implementation.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the proposed definition changes to "entertainment and recreational" activities for craft breweries, distilleries or wine tasting rooms. I do not support a narrow and restrictive definition that prohibits local small businesses from engaging in and contributing to their communities.

As a Juneau community member who works for a local nonprofit, I have hosted both a fundraiser and a letter-writing event (social justice advocacy-related) at Amalga Distillery within the past year for my work. I have attended other nonprofit and legislative receptions at Amalga, as well as political candidate campaign events at Devil's Club Brewery. I also enjoy stopping by both businesses on our monthly First Friday art walks and have purchased local artists' crafts at each location, when I may not have otherwise.

Prohibiting these businesses from engaging in these types of activities and giving back to the community hurts more than just the businesses. In my experience, it can be very difficult to find a venue people want to visit that is also willing to host certain events, like a nonprofit fundraiser, political candidate meet-and-greet, or advocacy event. If the proposed restrictive definition is adopted, my options for work-related event venues becomes even more limited.

These would prevent distilleries and similar business from hosting classes, exhibitions, or performances, as outlined in the draft, and would harm the Alaska arts community as a result.

Walk through one of Alaska's major cities on First Friday, and you'll find a multitude of events hosted at a multitude of venues. Of these, distilleries and breweries are the most important. They provide a welcoming atmosphere to adults without the noise or mess of a bar. Just as one example, Amalga distillery in downtown Juneau has hosted galleries of everything from photos to crafts to woodworking. Add in musical and dance performances, and you can see these places provide a useful venue for the arts.

The change, in addition to the policy to which it's being added, seems designed to funnel more business to bars. This is ludicrous, especially for the arts. McGivney's might host a rock band, true, but a flute quartet? People go to Squirez to get drunk after a long week of fishing, not to peruse a photo gallery. ### Dear AMCO regulatory office:

I oppose the proposed additional regulations upon in-state craft breweries for the following reasons. I have no ties of any sort with any part to the controversy; hence, these are strictly my personal observations and opinions.

1. There is a general market and social trend away from traditional bars and similar facilities toward in-state craft breweries. Rather than regulations specifically intended to hobble a less-traditional outlet in favor of bars and the like, regulation at worst should be neutral rather than tilted toward bars and distributors of out of state manufactured products. The market and our evolving preferences should determine which are successful and which will fade. Otherwise, you are artificially distorting the market and that rarely turns out well in practice.

Otherwise, we are in a sense being socialistic, using regulations to favor fading but still wealthy sectors serving hard licquor over new, popular ones that have started as grassroots local efforts that serve only beer and wine made on premises.

- 2. I visit these facilities only on occasion but I have observed that their atmosphere tends to be far more cheerful, functioning as friendly neighborhood gathering centers similar to the neighborhood Italian-style trattorias that I fondly recall from growing up in Eastern Pennsylvania. The local craft breweries are not oriented toward the heavy drinker who seeks to get "hammered". If you seek to actually control excessive alcohol consumption, might I suggest from 42 years of practicing law in Alaska, that you start restricting bars and other facilities serving hard licquor instead.
- 3. These are local Alaska-made products that are now achieving a national reputation and are one of the evolving bright spots in our state economy. Don't hamstring them. Across the US, the presence and growth of local craft breweries turns out, upon study, to be one of the several consistently positive indicators of local community rejuvenation and renewed economic growth. When we have had groups from friendly foreign countries visiting us in Soldotna, one of the favorite trips has been to local craft breweries for tours and meetings.
- 4. If you ban fund-raisers and other gatherings at craft breweries, then you should similarly ban them at traditional facilities like restaurants.
- 5. The proposed regulations have a strong anti-competitive flavor to them, which is contrary to both the spirit of anti-trust law and the Alaska spirit. The proposed regulations are not neutral in spirit.

6. There is a significant sense that AMCO regulations are part of the ongoing attempt to "hijack" legal regulation in an attempt to suppress local manufacture and neighborhood gathering spots and to favor traditional bars and distributors of out of state beverages. Let them compete in the market and in society instead.

Dear Alcohol Beverage Control Board Members:

The definition of "other recreational and gaming opportunities" in 3 AAC 304.390 is an over reach or unnecessary language.

As you know, the statutory context for this definition is AS 04.11.130 and AS 04.11.170.

AS 04.11.130 (e) (1) lists as examples of recreational and gaming activities these prohibitions: "live entertainment, televisions, pool tables, dart games, dancing, electronic or other games, game tables..."

This list is focused on games and entertainment and communicates that as the legislative intent. Adding classes, presentations and organized social gatherings to this list of recreational opportunities in the statute is not a reasonable interpretation of the original intent. Festivals is a term that is as ambiguous as "other recreational activities" so does not assist with interpretation. The parts of 3 AAC 304.390 that are in keeping with the statutory reference are "performances" and "games and competitions." These additions are unneccesary because a common sense interpretation of "live entertainment" in the statute would include "performances" and similarly, "other games" in the statute includes "games and competitions."

Please do not adopt 3 AAC 304.390. Adopting this regulation does not enhance the safety of Alaskans, and would prohibit Alaskan's rights to assembly beyond the statutory intent or needlessly define activities that are already prohibited by the statute.

The Alaska Cabaret, Hotel, Restaurant, and Retailers Association (CHARR) – as a representative of Alaska's alcohol industry as a whole – opposes the regulation project which would add a new section 3 AAC 304.390 to define "other recreational or gaming opportunities" for the purpose of manufacturing licenses in Alaska. As a nonprofit business association with a vast membership of restaurants, liquor stores, bars, manufacturers, hotels, and other businesses statewide, we have grave concerns about the precedent that the regulatory overreach in this draft language may set.

Clear, consistent, and practical laws and regulations – and the interpretation and enforcement of such – is vital to ensuring the success and compliance of the industry while preserving public health and welfare. While it is evident that many sections of Title 04 of Alaska Statutes and Chapter 304 of the Alaska Administrative Code require revisions and/or clarification, the proposed language in this draft does nothing to decrease ambiguity of manufacturing restrictions.

Sedentary recreational activity such as board games, lectures, classes, and presentations are acceptable in a variety of small licensed premises, including establishments licensed under AS 04.11.130 and AS 04.11.170.

"Recreational opportunities" in regulatory definition should be consistent with AS 04.11.210, recreational site licenses or AS 04.11.225, outdoor recreation lodge licenses. Moreover, alcohol can be consumed during bowling and golfing recreational activities, under beverage dispensary and golf course licenses.

If the proposed definition prohibiting advertising of gatherings or festivals passes, larger licensed premises will still enjoy opportunity to publicly advertise social gatherings that brewery, winery, and distillery premises will not get to enjoy. It is unfair that a sports bar would be able to advertise SuperBowl festivities with drink specials, food, and door prizes and a brewery could not advertise a gathering to celebrate public release of a new award-winning Alaska-made product.

"Games" should be limited to games of chance, particularly games of chance regulated under other statutes and where there are monetary transactions, e.g. pull tabs. Friendly board games where money is not exchanged are acceptable in a variety of locations. It is unfair that clubs, sports bars, and licensed premises that sponsor special events such as the Rondy DASH can have boisterous low-skill games, competitions, and door prizes, but a brewery couldn't allow board games or a spelling bee.

The proposed regulatory definition limits activities of local businesses that offer choices that aren't available in other licensed premises. Restaurants with high customer traffic, cabarets with live entertainment and noise, or bars with televisions, hard alcohol, and late hours are different than a brewery offering fish-themed beer and fly tying before 8 pm.

A long term solution to reduce conflict among commercial entities vying for market share is needed. One option is for the Board to ask the Governor to propose legislation creating special events permits for smaller licensed premises to offer activities that don't conflict with physical recreational opportunities or games of chance. The Board could proactively list acceptable opportunities in regulations instead of prohibiting fun in some of the best establishments in Alaska.

I encourage you to drop the move toward more regulations aimed at the craft breweries' and distilleries' ability to host events on-site. These proposals are unfair and unwarranted.

Craft alcohol businesses already have heavy regulations in place that put them at a competitive disadvantage with bars: they're only open for a few hours, having wait to open unti afternoon, then close early with strictly limited pours. They're not allowed to have seating at their serving bars and are strictly regulated regarding food.

The fact is, the market is rapidly changing and consumers demand more fun and specialized experiences; fewer people - including myself - want to go into a traditional bar setting. Many bar owners have simply failed to recognize this and failed to keep up with the market. The local craft breweries and distillery are very community-minded, and have picked up the flag to offer places for small groups to gather, have fun, raise funds for community causes, and showcase local art. Further, these operators donate product and merchandise to local causes. Since all activities and the operations themselves must close by 8PM, I fail to see any harm to bar owners

I would like to comment on the proposed regulation designed to limit events at breweries and distilleries.

I am concerned that such a regulation would have the effect of curtailing the market to negatively impact breweries and distilleries. I can say that my local breweries and distilleries are hugely beneficial to positive development in my community in that their events are often positive, safe, and family friendly in ways that other venues that serve alcohol are not. This may have to do with the times at which they are open and consumption limits but I think just as much attributed to the *kinds* of events that my local breweries and distilleries are apt to hold.

The last event I attended was a reception for the Girdwood Fungus Fair at Girdwood Brewing Company. The brewery became a space for fungus nerds of all ages (and I mean there were little ones there, under the age of 5) to convene, talk mycology and *taste* beer. I am putting an emphasis on taste because folks just don't go to breweries or distilleries to drink and get drunk, they go to taste and converse. The brewery was also providing a space for the fungus club to sell retail and raise money for their little organization in order to host future events.

Another brewery I like to visit is Midnight Sun Brewing for the purposes of tasting beer and looking at art, a feature that might be illegal under the new regulation. If you took the art away from Midnight Sun you would take away the soul of their tasting room.

Anchorage Brewing Company is host to an event called "Culture Shift," put on by the Alaska Humanities Forum on the last tuesday of every month. It is an event literally designed to bring people together and discuss how to make the world a better, more inclusive place. I encourage members of AMCO to look up this Culture Shift and attend one in order to comprehend the importance of this event and others put on by our local breweries and distilleries.

My last point is directed at the idea that breweries and distilleries are competing with bar clientele. I'm writing to you to voice my concerns about your proposed regulations on breweries that you have tried to call "clarifications" to current laws. Alaska already has some of the most strict regulations for breweries and taprooms in the country, and your proposed regulations would make laws even more strict, which will only serve to hamper a growing and prospering industry in our great state. (If what I'm reading online is correct and this is due to pressure from the people who say they were unfairly "forced" to pay for a liquor licence, then shame on you. The cost of an alcohol license is sadly due to the free market economy and is a fight best saved for another day).

Breweries and taprooms (and tasting rooms) currently host events that serve to highlight charities and fundraisers, support local artists, and bring communities together in an environment that is safe, fun, and relaxing. Ask any patron of a brewery tap room why they love it and they'll tell you that brewery tap rooms are places that are LOCAL, they are family friendly, and they are engaging with customers. Your proposed regulations will make them less family friendly and less able to engage with their community and customer base.

Tap rooms provide breweries the opportunity to reach out to their customers and provide many communities with places to gather and celebrate life in the 49th state. They attract tourists and allow for people to enjoy a drink or two without encountering inebriated patrons (thanks for the 36-oz rule, which I actually love and support). Your proposed legislation would stop breweries from hosting fundraisers (to benefit their communities), from giving tours (to educate people and make them more interested in brewing), from offering classes and presentations (usually not about beer or brewing, and usually offered for free from/to the general public), and would add more confusion to the laws surrounding breweries.

In reading your proposed regulations, I'm left confused. What defines a "social gathering"? How are breweries and tap rooms supposed to draw in customers if they don't "advertise to the general public"? If a tap puller educates a customer on the difference between a saison and a tripel, does that count as a "presentation" or a "class"? If I ask a brewer for a tour of his brewhouse, will he have to say that he legally can't give me one? When my friends and I bring a board game to our favorite brewery, will we not be allowed to stay and play it? If a brewery wants to collect money for a charitable event or cause, will the state come in and confiscate it?

Your current regulations already do enough to hinder breweries and their ability to be successful in Alaska. And most of them have succeeded even with tough restrictions on games, television, music, and entertainment. Your proposed regulation "clarifications" would only make things worse and would threaten the jobs of many hardworking Alaskans. You'll take away gathering places and opportunities for Alaskans to help each other through fundraising, educational classes, and festivals to celebrate living in our great state. It has come to our attention the Alaska Alcohol & Marijuana Control Office is considering regulations that would further limit the rights of breweries and distilleries to hold various types of events. Alaska's brewers and distillers have been diligently following the law as they understand it. This proposed change in regulation by your office would do harm to small businesses across Alaska and conflict with the intent of the law as it was passed.

Past Legislatures successfully amended AS 04.11.130-140 to outline the types of activities which breweries and distilleries are prohibited from making available in their establishments. Many of us helped work on these bills and believe brewers and distillers are acting in accordance with legislative intent. Taprooms have always been intended to be venues where gatherings can be held.

If there is a discrepancy in statute that needs clarification, then we implore AMCO to allow the Legislature to revise the statute through legislation during the 2020 regular session rather than disrupt local businesses. We ask AMCO to put these regulations on hold to allow the Legislature time to deliberate. If AMCO implements these regulations ahead of the regular legislative session in January, it would damage the brewing and distilling industry.

Brewers and distillers are a small, but growing manufacturing industry in a state where it is difficult to start a business and maintain it during this current economic turndown. Heavy-handed regulation could stifle those successes.

WHEREAS, the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board has issued notice of a proposed change to Section 3 AAC 304.390, to define "other recreational or gaming opportunities" to include festivals, games and competitions, classes, non-private parties, presentations or performances, or other types of organized social gatherings that are advertised to the general public; and

WHEREAS, the City of Soldotna contains one licensed brewery, Kenai River Brewing Company, centrally located within its municipal boundaries; and

WHEREAS, Kenai River Brewing Company supports a broad range of community organizations such as the Kachemak Heritage Land Trust, the Tsalteshi Trails Association, the Kenai Watershed Forum, the Kenai Peninsula Orchestra, and other organizations through its nonprofit beer lines and corresponding public launch events to raise donation funding; and

WHEREAS, the Kenai Peninsula Relay for Life has established an annual "Brewery to Bathroom" public event held at the brewery for the American Cancer Society, which has grown in two years to become the second-largest fundraiser for the Kenai Peninsula Relay for Life; and

WHEREAS, Soldotna-area breweries have benefited the local business community as an informal venue for events such as the First Friday meet-up of the Kenai Young Professionals, as well as hosting an event during the 2018 Alaska Startup Week; and

WHEREAS, the growth in community-oriented tasting rooms has contributed to Soldotna's economy and downtown development, by engaging locals and tourists alike; and

WHEREAS, AS 04.06.100 tasks the Alaska Alcoholic Beverage Control Board with adopting regulations that are "necessary to carry out the purpose of this title [Title 4 – Alcoholic Beverages] in a manner that will protect the public health, safety, and welfare;" and

WHEREAS, the proposed definition provides no additional public health, safety, or welfare benefit while conversely introducing possible harm to Soldotna's downtown development and community;

Then I stepped back and looked more deeply why, the bars and the restaurants complaining we are over stepping boundaries of licensing seems to be the main support to these changes.

Articles I have read and bar owners I have talked to there are lots of complaining that we didn't have to buy liquor license, we are depleting the value of the liquor license allowing breweries to operate like they are currently, we are in unfair advantage not having to make this capital investment on licensing.

To me this corelates exactly like the commercial mining or fishing in the State of Alaska. At one-point claims were virtual free and commercial fishing permits were there for the taking. Until a max number was reached or the resource itself needed regulations to be protected, but all the individuals that put in the hard work to help develop the industry at the start got a bonus for that, a claim or a permit that they could sell. Liquor license are the same way, at some point a bar license was over the counter permit, but that person who got that permit had to take a risk and start a new industry in Alaska.

Just like the breweries are doing now. A new blooming industry coming into Alaska. And now instead of seeing the millions of dollars of investment these companies are putting into small communities we want to slow this progress with more regulations. And regulations mainly pushed by a user group that is just not wanting new competition in their fields. The economic term of it is rent-seeking. Trying to knock down new competition and capitalism through new regulations to benefit the already established companies.

If the bars are worried people will go to breweries instead of their bar, they are more than capably of getting a brewery license and investing the money into equipment to give the people what they want. But they don't want to do that, they just don't want the option out there so people can't make the choice on where to go.

I would hope the state would not slow economic growth to protect old user groups. And I feel there is even different user groups in this equation. As an induvial the last time I went to a traditional "bar" was well over 10 years ago, in my younger days, but I visit breweries every chance I get. If there is not a brewery option in a community, I just don't go out. I would grab another Alaska beer at the liquor store instead. Sadly the only thing this truly hurts is helping fill a social void in small communities like Valdez that doesn't want another bar, but a more community hang out than a bar normally provides.

I hope the AMCO highly considers these unneeded regulation changes. And I hope that state Senate follows in the coming months by allowing more social activities at local breweries. I am all for max drinks and hours, but restricting activates further only tries to protect a different user group and it is not progressive and beneficial to the States diverse economic growth.

It has come to our attention the Alaska Alcohol & Marijuana Control Office is considering regulations that would further limit the rights of breweries and distilleries to hold various types of events. Alaska's brewers and distillers have been diligently following the law as they understand it. This proposed change in regulation by your office would do harm to small businesses across Alaska and conflict with the intent of the law as it was passed.

Past Legislatures successfully amended AS 04.11.130-140 to outline the types of activities which breweries and distilleries are prohibited from making available in their establishments. Many of us helped work on these bills and believe brewers and distillers are acting in accordance with legislative intent. Taprooms have always been intended to be venues where gatherings can be held.

If there is a discrepancy in statute that needs clarification, then we implore AMCO to allow the Legislature to revise the statute through legislation during the 2020 regular session rather than disrupt local businesses. We ask AMCO to put these regulations on hold to allow the Legislature time to deliberate. If AMCO implements these regulations ahead of the regular legislative session in January, it would damage the brewing and distilling industry.

I have reviewed the proposed definitions for "other recreational or gaming opportunities" for the purpose of AS 04.11.130, AS 04.11.170, and 3 AAC 304.380, and I oppose the proposed list.

I **do not agree** with the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board clarifying the definition to restrict breweries and distilleries from holding (1) festivals; (2) games and competitions; (3) classes; (4) parties; (5) presentations or performances; (6) other types of organized social gatherings that are advertised to the general public.

I **do not agree** that such events like First Friday art exhibits, charity events, or celebrations like Oktoberfest should be regulated by the proposed definitions.

I agree that clear, consistent standards for licensure to protect the public from harm are necessary, as stated in the ABC board's mission statement. However, the discrepancy between the standards for brewery/distillery tasting rooms and bars/restaurants (e.g. liquor licensees) is already mitigated with the tasting limit (in particular, AS 04.11.130 (e)). The 36 oz limit in and of itself is protection for the public. Bars (and restaurants) are not held to the same stringent standards for patronage and alcohol consumption.

Personally, I prefer tasting rooms that breweries and distilleries offer over traditional bars. The limit restriction generally means that there aren't intoxicated persons, the hours of operation are limited, the product quality that these businesses offer is exceptional, and often their environments are family-friendly. What this means for me is I have a well-lit, family-friendly, clean, and safe environment in which to socialize and find the feeling of community and connection. These definitions aim to take away the most important element, gathering and *community*.

I believe the proposed definitions are a regulatory overstep that are a disadvantage to business owners and their patrons.

I am writing to voice my opposition to the proposed addition of Article 304.390 of Section 3 of the Alaska Administrative Code that expands upon the list of activities restricted from taking place on the premises of alcohol manufacturers. In my opinion, the State has no business restricting the practice of otherwise lawful gatherings and activities on the premises of an alcohol manufacturer's tasting room unless there are clear impacts to public safety. The fact that these restrictions are proposed only for alcohol manufacturers (that have existing on-premises consumption limits) and not bars (that have no specific on-premises consumption limits) seems to make clear that the proposed restrictions have nothing to do with public safety. 
