Beverage Dispensary License

3rd and 4th waiver

Applicable statute: AS 04.11.330(a)(3). Denial of license or permit renewal.

An application requesting renewal of a license or endorsement shall be denied if the applicant has not operated the licensed premises for at least 240 hours during each of the two preceding calendar years, unless the board determines that the licensed premises are under construction or cannot be operated through no fault of the applicant;

Applicable regulation: **3 AAC 305.120 Waiver of annual operating requirement and minimum operating requirements.**

- (a) Except as provided in this section, the board will deny an application for renewal of a license or a license with one or more endorsements if the licensed premises were not operated for the time required under AS 04.11.330(a)(3) or (d).
- (b) A licensee may submit a waiver application to the board to request a waiver of the operating requirement in AS 04.11.330 (a)(3) or (d). Under AS 04.11.330(a)(3), the board will determine whether, through no fault of the licensee or because the premises are under construction, the licensed premises could not be operated for the required time during the preceding calendar year.
- (c) A waiver application for a calendar year must be made in writing to the board and must be accompanied by the non-refundable application fee of (1) an amount equal to one-half the applicable biennial license fee if a waiver application was not made for the previous year; or (2) double the amount
- of the fee paid for the previous waiver application.
- (d) A waiver application must include a statement from the licensee explaining why the licensed premises was not in compliance with AS 04.11.330(a)(3) or (d). The licensee must provide a copy of the waiver application to any local governing body with jurisdiction over the license and licensed premises.

- (e) The board may deny a third or subsequent, consecutive application for waiver (1) unless the licensee clearly shows that the licensed premises were not operated, because the premises were condemned or substantially destroyed by any cause; or (2) the licensee holds a common carrier dispensary license and is a boat weighing over 1,000 tons;
- (f) Absent circumstances to the contrary, the board will deny a third or subsequent, consecutive application for waiver in the event of condemnation or destruction of the premises if the premises identified on an applicant's license are not leased or owned by the licensee Additionally, a third or subsequent consecutive application for waiver that does not identify a licensed premises location will be denied.
- (g) The board may impose conditions along with the approval of a waiver application.
- (h) If a waiver application is denied, an application for license renewal for the succeeding license period will be denied by the board under AS 04.11.330(a)(3).
- (i) In addition to the application fee under (c) of this section, the applicant shall pay \$1,000 for an application that is received too late for board consideration at its last meeting of the calendar year for which the waiver is requested.
- (j) In the event of the death of a licensee, destruction of the premises, or comparable circumstances showing extraordinary hardship, the board may waive the fees required under (c) and (i) of this section.

Background: These are the third and fourth waivers requested for this license. Licensee states that the Swan Lake Fire of 2019 and the Pandemic lead to an inability to operate the license. They have agreed to terms on a transfer of ownership of this license.

REASONS FOR NON-OPERATION OF LICENSE NO. 975

Licensee: Moosequito Ventures, LLC For Calendar Years 2023-2025

Moosequito Ventures, LLC ("Moosequitos"), is an Alaska limited liability company which was formed in March of 2002 for the purpose of purchasing and operating Alaska Liquor License No. 975 - a beverage dispensary license – and Alaska Liquor License No. 976 – a package license – in Sterling, Alaska. Both of these licenses were subsequently owned and operated by Moosequitos from the same location along the Sterling Highway in Sterling, Alaska for approximately 18 years, until January of 2020. Due to the circumstances beyond our control – the outbreak and subsequent national disaster designation (the "Swan Lake Fire"), immediately followed by the COVID-19 pandemic and the consequences thereof, Moosequitos was unable to operate Liquor License No. 975 for the statutory minimum number of days from 2020 to the present. During that time, Moosequitos lost possession of its leased, licensed premises and, as a result of the two designated disasters and the advanced age of its sole member, has been unable to reactivate either of its liquor licenses. Accordingly, we began marketing both of our liquor licenses for sale during 2020.

The Swan Lake Fire began on June 5, 2019 on the Kenai River Moose Range at a specific location approximately 5 miles from Moosequitos' licensed premises. Ultimately, that fire destroyed over 160,000 acres of wilderness land on the Kenai Peninsula - most of which was within the Kenai National Moose Range. The fire closed the Isaak Walton Campground in Sterling (which was located directly across the Sterling Highway from Moosequitos) along with just about every other public campground on the Kenai Peninsula during the summer of 2019, thereby eliminating much of the summer recreational traffic to and from the Kenai Peninsula for 2019. The fire also periodically closed the Sterling Highway between Cooper Landing and Sterling without warning, thereby intermittently cutting off all automobile traffic between Anchorage and Sterling and all points south along the Sterling Highway. Even when the Sterling Highway was open for traffic during the summer of 2019, the smoke from the Swan Lake Fire spread throughout southcentral Alaska and served as a constant reminder in Anchorage that the Kenai Peninsula was experiencing a massive fire and should be avoided if possible. Smoke from the Swan Lake Fire also effectively prevented Moosequitos' local customers from using its popular outdoor deck, which overlooked the picturesque Moose River, during the 2019 summer season. One prominent Anchorage band even refused to take our stage that summer when they arrived in Sterling for a scheduled gig because they believed that our ambient (inside) air quality would be too smokey for their expensive electrical equipment to function. (So much for our previously-advertised "smoke free" bar environment that we were known for!) In total, the Swan Lake Fire resulted in a reduction of 40-50% in our historical 2019 summer revenues in the bar and our adjoining package store for the 3-4 months that the fire raged locally. Thereafter, the effects of the fire continued at the same level for the remainder of 2019, first because of the loss of our local summer tourist season and, later, by the indirect damage dealt to Sterling's local economy and our local customers. Ultimately, our local year-round customers disappeared for the remainder of 2019 - first because of the loss of our summer tourist season, followed later by the damage dealt to

By late 2019, we realized that our local regulars had also missed out on their 2019 seasonal work just as we had and, therefore, they had no longer had money to spend for entertainment at Moosequitos. The Federal government quickly designated the Swan Lake Fire as a "National Disaster Area" and offered disaster loans to adversely impacted residents and businesses, but this offer was illusory in light of subsequent developments. While we immediately applied for such disaster relief from the SBA in October of 2019 while we continued to operate our license - at 40-50% below our historic revenue, things did not improve. Finally, in December of 2019, we reluctantly decided to temporarily suspend our operations "for a few months" until the local economy improved and until the 2020 tourism season returned as it always had. Our initial estimate was that the local economy would recover from the Swan Lake Fire by the second quarter of 2020, so we announced a temporary closure from mid-January through about March of 2020 in hopes of reopening in April or May in time for the 2020 summer season. Unfortunately, we were unaware of another national disaster which was lurking around the bend.

In early February of 2020, while we were temporarily closed due to the aftermath of the Swan Lake Fire, the COVID-19 pandemic attacked the world, thereby delaying and disrupting our immediate plans to reopen Moosequitos. By late February of 2020, it became obvious that we could no longer reasonably expect our local economy to rebound from the Swan Lake Fire as quickly as we had initially projected in light of the pandemic. Following our shut down in January of 2020, we continued to pursue our Swan Lake Fire disaster loan application with the SBA but administrative delays caused by overwhelming pandemic demands resulted in unending delays as the SBA seemingly prioritized the national pandemic recovery over the local Swan Lake Fire damages that were incurred. At one point we were told that the SBA email box that we were told to use for our disaster loan application was not being actively monitored and a backlog of over 20,000 unread and unprocessed emails (including our application) were awaiting initial review. Ultimately our Swan Lake Fire disaster loan application became stale, was denied and then, because of our "premature" fire shut down, we were deemed ineligible for later pandemic relief having ceased our operations before the pandemic. Also, during the extended aftermath of the Swan Lake Fire, our lease was summarily terminated by the landlord. At that point we began exploring both the possible relocation of our licensed premises or the sale of our beverage dispensary license. While we have since worked through several possible opportunities in this regard, we were unable to close a viable deal to continue Moosequitos' operations or sell its last remaining liquor license. (Another Moosequitos liquor license - Package Store License No. 976 - was successfully sold and transferred to a new owner during 2022.) Throughout 2023 through 2025, we actively pursued our goal of selling Moosequito's remaining beverage dispensary license (License No. 975), but circumstances did not result in a sale due to the economic aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic. That is, until recently.

Last month we signed a Purchase and Sale Agreement for the sale and transfer of License No. 975. That proposed transfer is now being advertised in the Peninsula Clarion pursuant to applicable regulations. We are indeed now hopeful that the proposed transfer will be consummated as we have agreed and, if that deal falls through, it now appears that there

Provide an explanation as to why the licensed premise was not operated.

Mooseguito Ventures, LLC, is an Alaska limited liability company which holds Alaska Liquor License No. 975 – a beverage dispensary license. This license was owned and operated by Moosequitos from the same location along the Sterling Highway in Sterling, Alaska for about twenty years, until January of 2020. Due to a declared national disaster (the "Swan Lake Fire"), followed by a nationwide pandemic and their consequences, Moosequitos was unable to operate Liquor License No. 975 for the statutory minimum number of days from 2020 through 2022. During that time, Moosequito's lost possession of its licensed premises which has made a possible reopening most challenging. The Swan Lake Fire began on June 5, 2019 on the Kenai River Moose Range at a specific location about 5 miles from our original licensed premises. Ultimately, that fire destroyed over 160,000 acres of wilderness land on the Kenai Peninsula – most of which was within the Kenai National Moose Range. The fire closed the Isaak Walton Campground in Sterling (which was located directly across the Sterling Highway from Moosequitos) along with just about every other public campground on the Kenai Peninsula during the simmer of 2019, thereby eliminating much of the summer recreational traffic to and from the Kenai Peninsula for 2019. The fire also randomly closed the Sterling Highway between Cooper Landing and Sterling to vehicular traffic, thereby periodically cutting off all automobile traffic between Anchorage and Sterling and all points south along the Sterling Highway, all without warning. When the Sterling Highway was open for traffic, the smoke from the Swan Lake Fire spread throughout southcentral Alaska and served as a constant reminder in Anchorage that the Kenai Peninsula was experiencing a massive fire and should be avoided. Smoke from the Swan Lake Fire also effectively prevented our local customers from using our popular outdoor deck, which overlooked the picturesque Moose River, during the 2019 summer season. One prominent Anchorage band even refused to take our stage when they arrived in Sterling for a schedule gig because they believed that our ambient – inside – air quality would be too dangerous to their expensive electrical equipment. So much for the previously-advertised "smoke free" bar environment that we always touted! At that point we began exploring both the possible relocation of our licensed premises or the sale of our beverage dispensary license. While we have worked through several possible opportunities in this regard, we have been unable to close a viable deal whereby Moosequitos could either relocate or sell its last remaining liquor license. (Another Moosequitos liquor license – Package Store License No. 976 - was successfully sold and transferred to a new owner during 2022.) We still hope to successfully relocate, reactivate and/or sell Moosequitos remaining beverage dispensary license during 2025, but circumstances have not yet permitted us to put such a deal together in the aftermath of the two national disasters we have encountered. Finally, it should be noted that we had two areas of uncertainty when preparing our Form AB-29 application. First, we are uncertain what number of waiver requests we have "officially" submitted. While we have not operated for several years, one staff member of AMCA opined that we had previously been granted automatic waivers due to the pandemic and, therefore, they did not count against our waiver count. Second, we did not understand how to calculate the "non-refundable waiver application fee" that we owed at this time. Our recollection is that several of our previous fees were globally waived by the Board. We are prepared to pay whatever is the appropriate fee for this request and hope that the enclosed \$2,000 payment will cover any application fee that is now owed. Respectfully submitted, Paul W. Ultimately, that fire destroyed over 160,000 acres of wilderness land on the Kenai Peninsula - most of which was within the Kenai National Moose Range. The fire closed the Isaak Walton Campground in Sterling (which was located directly across the Sterling Highway from Moosequitos) along with just about every other public campground on the Kenai Peninsula during the summer of 2019, thereby eliminating much of the summer recreational traffic to and from the Kenai Peninsula for 2019. The fire also periodically closed the Sterling Highway between Cooper Landing and Sterling without warning, thereby intermittently cutting off all automobile traffic between Anchorage and Sterling and all points south along the Sterling Highway. Even when the Sterling Highway was open for traffic during the summer of 2019, the smoke from the Swan Lake Fire spread throughout southcentral Alaska and served as a constant reminder in Anchorage that the Kenai Peninsula was experiencing a massive fire and should be avoided if possible. Smoke from the Swan Lake Fire also effectively prevented Moosequitos' local customers from using its popular outdoor deck, which overlooked the picturesque Moose River, during the 2019 summer season. One prominent Anchorage band even refused to take our stage that summer when they arrived in Sterling for a scheduled gig because they believed that our ambient (inside) air quality would be too smokey for their expensive electrical equipment to function. (So much for our previously-advertised "smoke free" bar environment that we were known for!) In total, the Swan Lake Fire resulted in a reduction of 40-50% in our historical 2019 summer revenues in the bar and our adjoining package store for the 3-4 months that the fire raged locally. Thereafter, the effects of the fire continued at the same level for the remainder of 2019, first because of the loss of our local summer tourist season and, later, by the indirect damage dealt to Sterling's local economy and our local customers. Ultimately, our local year-round customers disappeared for the remainder of 2019 - first because of the loss of our summer tourist season, followed later by the damage dealt to

By late 2019, we realized that our local regulars had also missed out on their 2019 seasonal work just as we had and, therefore, they had no longer had money to spend for entertainment at Moosequitos. The Federal government quickly designated the Swan Lake Fire as a "National Disaster Area" and offered disaster loans to adversely impacted residents and businesses, but this offer was illusory in light of subsequent developments. While we immediately applied for such disaster relief from the SBA in October of 2019 while we continued to operate our license - at 40-50% below our historic revenue, things did not improve. Finally, in December of 2019, we reluctantly decided to temporarily suspend our operations "for a few months" until the local economy improved and until the 2020 tourism season returned as it always had. Our initial estimate was that the local economy would recover from the Swan Lake Fire by the second quarter of 2020, so we announced a temporary closure from mid-January through about March of 2020 in hopes of reopening in April or May in time for the 2020 summer season. Unfortunately, we were unaware of another national disaster which was lurking around the bend.

In early February of 2020, while we were temporarily closed due to the aftermath of the Swan Lake Fire, the COVID-19 pandemic attacked the world, thereby delaying and disrupting our immediate plans to reopen Moosequitos. By late February of 2020, it became obvious that we could no longer reasonably expect our local economy to rebound from the Swan Lake Fire as quickly as we had initially projected in light of the pandemic. Following our shut down in January of 2020, we continued to pursue our Swan Lake Fire disaster loan application with the SBA but administrative delays caused by overwhelming pandemic demands resulted in unending delays as the SBA seemingly prioritized the national pandemic recovery over the local Swan Lake Fire damages that were incurred. At one point we were told that the SBA email box that we were told to use for our disaster loan application was not being actively monitored and a backlog of over 20,000 unread and unprocessed emails (including our application) were awaiting initial review. Ultimately our Swan Lake Fire disaster loan application became stale, was denied and then, because of our "premature" fire shut down, we were deemed ineligible for later pandemic relief having ceased our operations before the pandemic. Also, during the extended aftermath of the Swan Lake Fire, our lease was summarily terminated by the landlord. At that point we began exploring both the possible relocation of our licensed premises or the sale of our beverage dispensary license. While we have since worked through several possible opportunities in this regard, we were unable to close a viable deal to continue Mooseguitos' operations or sell its last remaining liquor license. (Another Moosequitos liquor license - Package Store License No. 976 - was successfully sold and transferred to a new owner during 2022.) Throughout 2023 through 2025, we actively pursued our goal of selling Moosequito's remaining beverage dispensary license (License No. 975), but circumstances did not result in a sale due to the economic aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic. That is, until recently.

Last month we signed a Purchase and Sale Agreement for the sale and transfer of License No. 975. That proposed transfer is now being advertised in the Peninsula Clarion pursuant to applicable regulations. We are indeed now hopeful that the proposed transfer will be consummated as we have agreed and, if that deal falls through, it now appears that there

ADDENDUM TO FORM AB-29 December 28, 2022

Moosequito Ventures, LLC, is an Alaska limited liability company which holds Alaska Liquor License No. 975 – a beverage dispensary license. This license was owned and operated by Moosequitos from the same location along the Sterling Highway in Sterling, Alaska for about twenty years, until January of 2020. Due to a declared national disaster (the "Swan Lake Fire"), followed by a nationwide pandemic and their consequences, Moosequitos was unable to operate Liquor License No. 975 for the statutory minimum number of days during 2020, 2021 and 2022. In the interim, Moosequito's also lost possession of its licensed premises which has made a possible reopening most challenging.:

The Swan Lake Fire began on June 5, 2019 on the Kenai River Moose Range at a specific location about 5 miles from our original licensed premises. Ultimately, that fire destroyed over 160.000 acres of wilderness land on the Kenai Peninsula - most of which was within the Kenai National Moose Range. The fire closed the Isaak Walton Campground in Sterling (which was located directly across the Sterling Highway from Moosequitos) along with just about every other public campground on the Kenai Peninsula during the simmer of 2019, thereby eliminating much of the summer recreational traffic to and from the Kenai Peninsula for 2019. The fire also randomly closed the Sterling Highway between Cooper Landing and Sterling to vehicular traffic, thereby periodically cutting off all automobile traffic between Anchorage and Sterling and all points south along the Sterling Highway, all without warning. (Another Moosequitos liquor license – Package Store License No. 976 - was successfully sold and transferred to a new owner during 2022. We still hope to successfully relocate, reactivate and/or sell Moosequitos remaining beverage dispensary license during 2022, but circumstances have not permitted us to put such a deal together in the aftermath of the two national disasters we have encountered.

Finally, it should be noted that we had two areas of uncertainty when preparing our Form AB-29 application. First, we are uncertain what number of waiver requests we have "officially" submitted. While we have not operated during 2020, 2021 and 2022, one staff member of AMOCA opined that this was our first "official" request due to the previous automatic waivers that were recognized due to the pandemic. Second, we did not understand how to calculate the "non-refundable waiver application fee" that we owed at this time. Our recollection is that our previous fees were globally waived by the Board for 2020 and 2021. The same staff member opined earlier this fall that our fee would be \$1,500 for our first official request but, of course, it appears that this application is now delinquent since the Form AB-29's are now due in November rather than by December 31 as in previous years. In short, we are prepared to pay whatever is the appropriate fee for this request and hope that the enclosed \$2,500 payment will cover any application fee that is now owed.
