Division of Public Health

The Division of Public Health (DPH) administers grants to afterschool program providers from designated funds that are tied to marijuana taxes referenced in <u>AS 43.61.010</u> and administered under <u>AS 44.29.020</u>.

- Funds to support afterschool programs is vital for Alaskan families and the economy as we move into pandemic recovery. Working families require quality out of school programming for their children. Our youth need to rebuild connections and recover from the long periods of isolation they experienced throughout the pandemic. Afterschool programs can be part of solution in Alaska's pandemic recovery.
- <u>Research</u> shows that participation in afterschool programs reduces risk for substance use among youth and are uniquely positioned to support mental health and social and emotional development of youth. Through social and emotional focused activities and targeted skill building, afterschool programs can help build protective factors and behaviors for all youth, including those who may have an unidentified mental health need. Positive Youth Development Afterschool Programs are also committed to staff professional development. Staff are trained in the principles of positive youth development and trained to support the mental health and wellbeing of youth participants.
- Reduced levels of funding in FY24 would mean either cutting the number of communities that are supported or reducing the amount of support in those communities. Either of these types of reductions would translate to reduced ability of afterschool programs across the state to provide the kinds of services that we know are effective in preventing substance use and improving youth mental health.

Division of Behavioral Health

The Division of Behavioral Health (DBH) has multiple grants and contracts that receive funding through two designated funds that are tied to marijuana taxes: (1) the recidivism reduction fund and (2) the marijuana education and treatment fund. Both funds are referenced in <u>AS 43.61.010</u>.

Marijuana tax revenues will have a direct impact on the division's prevention and early intervention and treatment and recovery program funding.

Recidivism Reduction Fund

The Recidivism Reduction Fund revenues are split between three departments: the Department of Corrections, the Department of Public Safety (Council for Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault), and the Department of Health.

Revenue deposited into this fund are used by the Division of Behavioral Health for Recidivism Reduction and Treatment programs in accordance with <u>47.38.100</u>.

Recidivism Reduction Fund ensures appropriate treatment and recovery options available to Alaskans leaving correctional facilities. Grantees provide direct outpatient and residential treatment for substance use disorder, provide linkage to community-based resources such as rental assistance and food pantries, replace identification cards, linkage to peer support, community support, sober living homes etc.
