Dear Marijuana Control Board,

I am submitting a comment in advance of your April 10, 2020 meeting: as you are likely aware, the impacts of and characteristics of COVID-19 are still unfolding and will not be fully understood for a long time. However, there is emerging evidence that aligns with common sense: that smoking and vaping products (including tobacco and marijuana) are linked with damage to the lining in the lungs, making them prone to infections and diminished capacity, and are potentially putting current consumers of these products at further risk of serious complications with this virus.

Marijuana stores have been deemed essential businesses, but this raises a serious question: is it smart to allow for continued commercial purchase and consumption of these products, even as emerging and long-established evidence suggests that this will make some people's cases worse?

I put this question to the Board to consider in your deliberations tomorrow, April 10, as part of your duty to balance the interests (particularly financial) of the marijuana industry with the larger health and safety interests of the state. In particular, the implications of loosening any restrictions that would potentially increase consumption of these products during this time, and potential increased load on the health care system if more serious cases develop in the near future. Perhaps more health-oriented ideas could be considered as well: for example, banning sales of combustible or inhaled products for the time being, and allowing only edibles? This would maintain access to these products, and provide a market for processing raw product into edibles, while discouraging people from harmful use. Unfortunately, the latest data from the state's use and attitudes survey (published by DHSS > OSMAP) show that 96% of current consumers are still smoking this product, regardless of what other ingestion or delivery methods they use. This strongly suggests that Alaska's marijuana users are in a higher risk category because they are inhaling combusted smoke.

I am reaching out with a question about state regulations and board actions. At the Juneau board meeting Green Zone in Kotzebue was approved 3 to 2. Their application had been previously delegated because of the concern it might not meet the 500 foot distance requirement from a children's home. There was conflicting surveys. The applicant said it met the 500 foot distance but the local authorities measured it and it did not meet the 500 foot distance requirement they said. The AMCO board members discussed it and Mr. Jones and Mr. Jaime voted against approval because it did not meet the state distance requirement but the other three members noted that if the city wasn't protesting it then they were ok with it and voted to approve it.

My question and concern is what precedence is the board setting when they approve a license that does not appear to meet the states regulations? It took me a very long time to find a location that met the states requirements and I am concerned that the precedence being set for this license will effect future licensing.

Control Board Members:

I am currently a 34% shareholder of E&M Holdings, LLC, a corporation in Ketchikan, Alaska, that does business as The Stoney Moose (retail license 10873) and Stoney Moose Kitchens (product manufacturing license 16991). Recently I have been assigned to a new position in employment in my private life, and the work location is not only overseas in a sensitive area but also in a profession that requires extreme confidentiality. I could be transferred at any moment starting June 1, 2020, and therefore need to remove myself from ownership of E&M Holdings, LLC, effective immediately. Due to those extenuating circumstances, I would like to officially appeal my ownership transfer under 3 AAC 306.095(a) so that the Director can directly approve my removal from E&M Holdings, LLC, without the typical transfer of controlling interest approval from the MCB as per 3 AAC 306.045(a).

My shares/ownership percentage (34%) would be transferred to Eric Riemer, the current Managing Member of E&M Holdings, LLC, who also is the largest shareholder with myself at this time. All the MJ-17 paperwork is completed, minus the notary signature (which I will complete and submit immediately to the Director if I receive approval from this appeal).

Again, what this appeal would allow me to do is remove myself from all ownership, and allow Eric to become a majority shareholder, with Director approval only. What it provides for me is a more discrete way of leaving, while also allowing AMCO to conduct any investigation needed for this type of transfer before granting approval. I am also more than willing to

Thank you for your consideration regarding this appeal, as my transfer was unexpected, but something I have been striving towards my entire life.
