Comment:

I Disagree with these standards all together. I think it is poor judgment to only have investigators that are ex police. I say this because of the experience I have had with one of this type of investigator and on talking to others I found they have been treated the same.

When my cultivation was "inspected" and after scanning the plant tags the inspector looked at me and said " there are a bunch of plants missing, where are they?" I was speechless as I had no idea there were any missing plants. I was treated there on out as if I was pulling a fast one and had been caught. I kept saying that they had to be here as I had no idea where else they could be. The inspector made no effort to resolve the situation. If I could not produce the plants I was lying.

What was the end result? After taking down all the missing plant tag numbers I searched through the room and found all the plants there! the fancy machine that is suppose to read the tags was not doing its job. It was missing a lot of tags. Why didn't the inspector say that perhaps the machine is missing tags and perhaps a quick count of plants in the room might help resolve the situation. I know for a fact that this has happened to other cultivators so the inspectors should be aware of this issue. I think the answer is a policeman is out to catch criminals and when something is off they first suspect a perpetrator is the cause.

We should have investigators who are working with the industry not ones who accuse before the facts are known. That would require a totally different set of requirements for the job, not the ones you are proposing.
